ACTF CALLS!

The results are in -- and so is TWU's production of *Waiting for the Parade*. TWU Theatre 98's first fall production and official entry for the Kennedy Center/American College Theatre Festival will take center stage during the Region VI competition -- which, incidentally, will be held at TWU in February.

During the KC/ACTF state festival in Plano this fall, *Waiting for the Parade* scored a hit with audiences and judges alike. The TWU KC/ACTF entry was voted both "Director's Choice" and "Respondents' Choice"; as a result, *Waiting for the Parade* was nominated for advancement to the regional festival in February.

The 13-member regional committee met in Arlington this past weekend for its annual deliberation meeting. From over 60 productions performed in the nine state festivals during the fall semester, 19 entries were nominated for possible advancement to the regional level. From those 19 plays, seven were then chosen to represent the 'best of the region' in the spring festival.

"*Waiting for the Parade* was one of the seven just selected for the regional competition -- moving it one step closer to the national festival, which will be held at The Kennedy Center in April," said Charles Harrill (performing arts, drama), who directed the production. "The work of all TWU faculty, staff and students was praised highly, as well as the success of last year's regional conference that we coordinated. As you know, we again will host this important event in February, but this time our own students will be featured when the KC/ACTF national selection team arrives on campus!"

TWU productions have been showcased at the Region VI festival six out of the past 10 years. Additionally, in 1995 and 1997, TWU was named "first alternate," narrowly missing a performance slot at the regional festival. "Our students showed well, and I know that we all are proud of their accomplishments," added Harrill.

Waiting for the Parade centers on five Canadian women who struggle with the pressures of wartime and the necessity of independence and interdependence during World War II. The plot involves Catherine, whose husband enlists in the Canadian Forces, forcing her to find new strengths and resources for survival on the home front; Janet, whose husband chooses to remain in Canada to participate in "essential services"; Eve, a young woman whose husband is too old to volunteer; Margaret, a widow with two sons of eligible age but differing sentiments; and Marta, a single woman of German heritage

whose father is placed in a detention camp in Canada.

Students won other honors at the state festival, too. Certificates of Excellence went to Eric Cope for lighting design; Bill Owen for sound design; Jennifer Massingale for costume design; Karen Dietrich for graphic design; Mary McGrew for hair and makeup design; and Patrick Watson for scenic design. The entire acting company for *Parade* received a Certificate of Excellence for ensemble acting. Brooke Evans and Helen Dewey Reikofski won Irene Ryan Scholarship nominations and will compete at the regional festival.

ENGINEERING WEEK CITED BY AASCU

One hundred examples of effective programs at public four-year colleges and universities were highlighted at a meeting of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), held Nov. 22-24, in San Francisco, including a project at TWU. The association released *Commitment and Success: A Compendium of Best Practices at AASCU Institutions* to illustrate that many state colleges and universities have responded to calls from policymakers and others for more efficiency and accountability.

During the association's annual meeting, presidents and chancellors of public institutions were presented with an agenda for action that asked them to ensure that they could assess the quality of their educational product, that their institutions were serving the communities and

regions where they are located, that they were taking steps to ensure access and diversity, and that they were making efforts to communicate to the public and policymakers what they are doing. (AASCU is a Washington-based higher education association of more than 425 public colleges and universities and higher education systems across the United States and its territories.)

The publication provides examples of programs which illustrate that schools already are producing results in many of these areas, including TWU's Engineering Week, which was held last spring and is scheduled again for March 1 to 5 in 1999. The program last year incorporated the Harlan Miller Mathematics Lecture Series and the university's first "Edible Car Contest." Faculty members in the

department of mathematics and computer science are planning to expand the event next year and hope to involve more students, faculty and staff.

TWU NETS \$1 MILLION FEDERAL GRANT

Faculty and administrators in the TWU department of reading and bilingual education believe that educators should "grow their own" -- in other words, helping more limited-English-proficient children means training more bilingual teachers to work with them.

As a result, the TWU department (part of the College of Education and Human Ecology) has received a \$1 million grant from the U.S. Department of Education that will provide \$200,000 for student scholarships in bilingual teacher education from the from the federally-funded Title VII career ladder teacher training plan. TWU developed the plan -- titled "Building Bridges in Education" -- in collaboration with the Dallas Independent School District and the Dallas County Community College District (specifically Brookhaven College). The continuation grant, which must be renewed annually during the five-year period, covers support for tuition and fees; a book allowance also is available.

"We are extremely excited to receive this grant because we believe that this area -- and Texas as well -- continues to see the need grow for bilingual education in our classrooms, particularly in elementary schools," said Dr. Rudy Rodriguez (reading and bilingual education). TWU already has awarded scholarships to some of its bilingual education majors this fall.

"The purpose of the grant is to increase the number of qualified bilingual education teachers to serve the growing number of LEP children in the Dallas public schools," he added. "In 1997, for example, more than 51,000 LEP students in Dallas were reported speaking 58 different languages. A majority (45,497) speak Spanish as their first language. And the students are concentrated mainly in the early grades and are 'economically disadvantaged.'"

Dallas officials predict -- in order to adequately serve all elementary school LEP students -- that the district must recruit 200 certified bilingual education teachers per year for the next five years and also retain 100 percent of all teachers who already are under contract with Dallas ISD.

The "Bridging Futures in Education" comprises a high school component designed to recruit students into the teaching profession; a community college/TWU program involving both paraprofessionals in the Dallas "Grow Your Own" program and full-time TWU students; and a mentor support program which will be incorporated as part of the bilingual

training plan for students in the field-based professional education program and for beginning bilingual teachers who graduate from the program.

Students who enroll in the program and receive scholarship funds must pursue certification in elementary-bilingual education, with concentrated study in early childhood education or special education. "This comprehensive teacher training plan is aligned with the state's curriculum standards, plus the standards established by the State Board of Educator Preparation," said Rodriguez. - Demonstration of ability to relate well to all members of the university community, including students, faculty, staff and alumni;
- Demonstration of outstanding personality traits such as loyalty, dedication, enthusiasm, initiative and reliability; and
- Demonstration of that individual's support and understanding of the university's activities and mission.

Spring semester staff scholarships -- a limited number -- are available through the office of enrollment management for interested persons. "To be eligible for the scholarship, you must be a full-time or part-time permanent TWU employee, have been employed at TWU for at least 12 consecutive months by the start of the spring 1999 semester and be a TWU degree-seeking student," said David Peat (enrollment management). Previously enrolled students must have at least a 2.0 cumulative grade point average. The scholarship will pay one-half of tuition and fees for up to one three-hour course, which can be at either the undergraduate or graduate level. Scholarship request forms are available through the office of enrollment management. (Note: Scholarships will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis until all available money is expended. Preference will be given to those staff members who have not received a previous fall staff scholarship, according to Peat. If the staff member withdraws from the course for anything except medically-related reasons, the scholarship must be repaid. All undergraduate or graduate admission requirements must be met as well.
