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THEATRE TAKES FESTIVAL HONORS

Two Rooms, a TWU Theatre '95 fall production, recently won the Critic's Choice Award during the Texas State Festival of the Kennedy Center/American College Theatre Festival. Winning the Critic's Choice Award allows TWU's production of *Two Rooms* to advance to the regional festival and competition scheduled in February 1996 in Oklahoma. TWU has advanced to the regional level annually since 1991 with productions of *Daisy Pulls It Off*, *Playing for Time*, *Vital Signs*, *Eleemosynary*, *Chicago* and *Two Rooms*.

Several people involved in the production of the October show also earned honors:

- Peter James Carver, a graduate student from Greenville, S.C., directed *Two Rooms* and is the only non-faculty director to participate in the Texas festivals this year.
- Sonya Worden, a sophomore from Little Rock, Ark., was recognized for scenic design.
- Mark Delancey, a senior from Gainesville, earned honors for lighting design.
- Holly Ann Kinney, a graduate student from Harrison, Ark., received an Excellence in Stage Management citation for her supervision of the production and the touring company.
- Alison Trapp, a post-baccalaureate student from Denton, and Cindy Matthews, a graduate student from Houston, both were nominated for the regional Irene Ryan Acting Scholarship competition for their performances in *Two Rooms*.

The awards presented to TWU's theatre production continue a legacy of honors and advancement in the American College Theatre Festival's annual competitions, including a trip to the Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts in Washington, D.C., in 1990 when TWU's production of *Six Women with Brain Death...or Expiring Minds Want to Know* placed as one of eight national finalists.

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CONCERT CHOIR TO PERFORM AT THE MYERSON

The TWU Concert Choir will hold its fall concert at 8 p.m. on Mon., Nov. 20, in Margo Jones Performance Hall. 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EXHIBIT EXPLORES ATOM BOMB

Thirty-two segments of "The Ribbon," a series of painted, embroidered, appliquéd and beaded cloth panels focusing on the destructiveness of nuclear war and world peace, is on display at TWU. The exhibit is located in the Woman's Collection of the TWU Blagg-Huey Library through Thurs., Feb. 29. "The Ribbon" is free and open to the public from 8 a.m. to midnight, Monday through Thursday; from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Friday; from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Saturday; and 2 p.m. to midnight on Sunday.

The project was the brainchild of Justine Merritt, a Denver teacher and grandmother. The theme of "The Ribbon" is "What I cannot bear to think of as lost forever in a nuclear war" and was designed to remind decision-makers of the value of human life and civilization. The exhibit was originally scheduled only to circle the Pentagon on Sun., Aug. 4, 1985, just before the 40th anniversary of the bombings of Hiroshima and Nagasaki. However, because of overwhelming response from volunteers world-wide, approximately 15 miles of panels were contributed to the project -- enough to circle the Washington mall and the Capitol building as well.

The library also is the repository for "The Ribbon" archives and the panels that were not returned to their states of origin. For information, call the TWU Woman's Collection at ext. 3752.

FACULTY SENATE MEETING SUMMARIZED

During the Nov. 10, 1995, meeting of the TWU Faculty Senate, Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) told members about a recent retreat held by the TWU board of regents. During that retreat, regents decided on a new format for committee and board meetings, which will be held over a two-day session. On the first day, two of the four board committees will meet simultaneously in the morning; the other two will meet in the afternoon. The formal board meeting will be held during the morning on the second day, and the luncheon for regents previously scheduled on Fridays has been moved to Thursdays. Surles told the Faculty Senate: "The format is an improvement because issues will be discussed in more depth than before and will come before the regents in a more timely fashion."

Notices that detail committee and board meeting times and locations will be posted in Austin, TWU libraries, the *Lasso* and at the appropriate county courthouse. The next meeting of the TWU board of regents is scheduled on Dec. 7 and 8 in Denton. Other items during the senate meeting included: the formation of an ad hoc committee to examine the annual evaluation performance methods currently in use; a request for marshals to serve at all three December graduation ceremonies; and the receipt of an advanced research grant from the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board of \$150,000 to Dr. Lynda Uphouse (biology).

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HEALTHY WOMEN NEEDED FOR CROHN'S STUDY

The TWU department of nutrition and food sciences is continuing a study that began last spring to determine if dietary factors affect the loss of bone in women who are diagnosed with Crohn's disease. The purpose of the study is to help identify women who may be at risk developing osteoporosis (which is considered a major health concern in the United States) and to determine what role diet may play in the development of this condition.

The department now is seeking healthy women between the ages of 25 and 45 who want to participate in this study who do not smoke and who are premenopausal. (The department has filled its need for Crohn's patients who wish to participate in the project.) As part of the study, qualified participants will receive a free dietary analysis (a \$38 value), a free bone density mineral test (a \$375 value) and free, personalized recommendations that will help them decrease their risk of developing osteoporosis.
