COMMUNITY LEADERS SEE TWU "BUILDING" ITS FUTURE

TWU's annual community leaders breakfast on Sept. 13 drew representatives from city government, area businesses, education and civic organizations who came for an update on the university and a glimpse at what the 1995-96 academic year will bring. Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) greeted the guests, introduced TWU's two new vice presidents and acknowledged special visitors during the early morning event. She discussed enrollment, the appointment of Dr. Jim Alexander (history and government) as legislative liaison for TWU, the faculty/staff general increase, state appropriations and special line items. Surles also thanked members of the Denton community "whose outpouring of sympathy and support to TWU and to the (Robert) Benfield family provided strength during a most difficult time" following his death in July.

During her main presentation, Surles described the following stages of construction and renovation on campus during a slide presentation for those who attended the breakfast:

- The first step in this two-year period of change will be the removal of Smith-Carroll Hall in late September or early October; it has stood empty for more than a decade.
- Additional parking for students and clients in the Multipurpose Classroom Laboratory Building will be built where Smith-Carroll stood previously.
- The next step is the removal of Bralley Hall, which began as a library and most recently was used for storage. It is structurally unsound and also will be taken down this fall -- probably in October. After Bralley Hall is gone, the area will be landscaped.
- Relocation of the tennis courts on Bell Avenue to a new site near the old track has begun. A new track will be built in the wooded area behind the library; the woods will be preserved.
- Construction of the Movement Science Complex should begin in late spring of 1996 and will be completed in approximately two years.
- The old Physical Education Building will be removed once academic departments have moved into the new Movement Science Complex. The area will become green space, which will open the view from Bell Avenue to the library and Hubbard Hall.
- A renovation of Hubbard Hall also will begin this fall. The first stage of the renovation process begins in October with student dining rooms on the north side. When the total renovation is complete, the building will have two new entrances on the east side of the building, three restroom facilities on the first floor, two elevators and remodeled kitchen facilities.
- The addition of sprinkler systems in residence halls, beginning with Guinn and Stark, also is included in the renovation plans.

At the end of her presentation, Surles reiterated that TWU's mission would remain constant. She told the audience that task forces in the areas of mission preservation, enrollment management, community service and technology had met throughout the summer. She said, "We will share with you the reports from these groups, which should form the basis for strategic planning as we approach our centennial year. We will seek your input and your advice on how to shape these plans to ensure that Texas Woman's University remains a unique institution among institutions of higher education in Texas."

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ARTISTS IN EXHIBIT ARE "FAR FROM THE BORDER"

An exhibition featuring the works of Hispanic artists who are removed from the Mexican-American border -- called "Far from the Border" -- will be displayed at TWU from Oct. 2-27 in the Fine Art Gallery. The show, curated by Paul Rogers Harris, is free and open to the public on weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. An opening reception will be held on Fri., Oct. 6, from 6 to 8 p.m. in the gallery. 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DANCE ALLOY FEATURED AT TWU AND UNT

Dance Alloy, a Pittsburgh-based contemporary dance company, will enjoy a 10-day residency at TWU and the University of North Texas, providing students at both universities with an opportunity to participate in a lecture performance and to attend an on-stage performance of the troupe, accompanied by area musicians and community members.

Dance Alloy, with artistic director Mark Taylor of New York, will provide a free lecture performance at TWU on Tues., Oct. 3, from 7:30 to 8:30 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Several days later, on Fri. and Sat., Oct. 5 and 6, the company will perform at 8 p.m. each night in the UNT Theatre on Welch Street.

Tickets are \$15 each for general admission; \$7 each for TWU and UNT faculty and staff, plus senior citizens; or free for TWU and UNT students with valid identification. Tickets may be purchased with a credit card; call the UNT University Union box office at 565-2611. Tickets also are available in the TWU office of student activities, SC second floor.

During their Friday and Saturday programs, Dance Alloy will perform two of its works with the Denton-based music group "Brave Combo." Another work, David Rousseve's "Crossings," will feature a community gospel choir. Eight student dancers from TWU and UNT will have an opportunity to perform in the premiere of a new work choreographed by Taylor, and another work will include 40 community and student dancers.

Dance Alloy's residency is made possible with funding from the TWU office of student activities, the TWU President's Council, the UNT Fine Arts Series, Mid-America Arts Alliance, the Greater Denton Arts Council and the National Endowment for the Arts. The TWU program in drama will sponsor a trip to London in December for its semi-annual London theatre tour, scheduled Dec. 26, 1995, through Jan. 2, 1996. The cost to join the tour is \$1,180 per person, double occupancy; single rooms are available at additional cost, and a delayed flight return also is available. But time is running out for TWU students, faculty and staff -- and non-students -- who would like to go! A \$200 deposit must be paid by Sun., Oct. 1; the balance is due on Nov. 20. "Although theatre will be the focus of our tour, there will be plenty of time to explore and discover many of London's other cultural and historic resources. TWU's London Theatre tour, which is designed to coincide with university and public school holiday schedules, provides travelers with basic services at the most economical prices available."

The package price includes: round-trip economy class airfare between Dallas/Fort Worth and London Gatwick on British Air; round-trip transfers from Gatwick Airport and the hotel; hotel accommodations for six nights, complete with a continental breakfast; a London orientation session before departure and a London orientation tour upon arrival; currency exchange before departure; three theatre tickets to *Sunset Boulevard*, *Richard III* and *Indian Ink* (a new play by Tom Stoppard); a day trip to Stratford-upon-Avon; a seven-day tube pass for use on the London bus or subway system; and a backstage theatre tour of the National Theatre complex or the Royal Shakespeare Company's Barbican Center.

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PIPER PROFESSOR NOMINATIONS SOUGHT

Each year the Minnie Stevens Piper Foundation chooses 10 professors who are recognized for their dedication to the teaching profession and their outstanding academic, scientific and scholarly achievements. Honorees receive certificates that name them "Piper Professors of 1996"; a cash honorarium of \$2,500 each; and gold commemorative pins.

"The awards give recognition to the teaching profession, rather than to research, publication, administration or other related activities," said Dr. Carolyn Rozier (Physical Therapy), chair of the TWU faculty awards committee. Nominations must be received with supporting documentation no later than noon on Wed., Oct. 18. They can be mailed to Rozier in the TWU School of Physical Therapy, P.O. To be eligible, nominees must be full-time instructors. Nominations must be submitted on two-part forms that are available from the faculty awards committee; call Dr. Robert Littlefield (psychology and philosophy) at ext. 2303 for copies of the form. "Part A" is an institutional form which should be completed by the nominee's department head. "Part B" should be completed by the nominee. (Please note that the forms submitted for committee consideration will be draft copies; they will be retyped and signed by the appropriate individuals before they are submitted to the Piper Foundation.) No more than five letters of recommendation may be submitted with the forms. Submit all nomination materials to Rozier as noted above.

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FORM HEALTHY HABITS AT THE WELLNESS CENTER

The TWU Wellness Center encourages faculty, staff, students and community members to get in shape and stay healthy by using the center's equipment, classes and programs. Here are some helpful items to know:

■ Wellness Center hours, expanded for the fall semester, are Monday through Friday, 6 a.m. to 10 p.m.; Saturday, 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Sunday, 1 to 6 p.m.

■ Swimming programs now are held in the indoor pool. Hours for lap swimming are Monday/Wednesday/Friday from 6:30 to 7:30 a.m.; Monday and Wednesday from 12:15 to 1 p.m.; and Monday and Thursday from 7 to 8:30 p.m. The pool is open on weekends from 2 to 4 p.m. for family swimming; the cost for the Saturday/Sunday swim is \$2 per person (Wellness Center members and TWU students swim free with valid ID).

■ The nutrition clinic at the Wellness Center will offer a six-week fall semester weight loss challenge program beginning Wed., Oct. 4, in JH 201. The group will meet every Wednesday from 6:30 to 8 p.m. through Nov. 8. The cost of the entire program is \$20 for TWU students and employees (\$25 for community members). However, participants can earn back \$1 for each week that they meet their goals. Topics will include dining out, label reading, exercise, eating favorite foods, menu planning, eating motivations and assertiveness training.

■ The center's staff encourages the TWU campus community to participate in the American Heart Association's annual Heart Walk on Sat., Sept. 30. Registration begins at 7:30 a.m. and the walk starts at 8:30 a.m. Walkers do not have to collect donations; those who would like to do so can call Julie Jordening at ext. 2900 for a donation envelope. Anyone who wants to walk on the Wellness Center's team should call the same number.

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RELAY FOR LIFE NEEDS TWU TEAMS

Hundreds...possibly thousands...of Denton-area residents will lace up their athletic shoes, hit the track and run circles in Fouts Field at the University of North Texas in October as they participate in the American Cancer Society's "all-nighter" -- Relay for Life. This team-oriented event will give people a chance to remember cancer survivors and victims as they walk a mile (or more) in their shoes to raise money for cancer research. Anyone from TWU interested in participating can form a team (from 10 to 15 people). The team entry fee is \$100 (\$10 or less per person, based on the number of persons on a team), and each team member is asked to seek additional donations for the relay as well.

Event co-chair George Young said with a laugh, "Do you know 10 people whom you would like to spend the night with? Then you need to sign up for Relay for Life on Oct. 6 and join us in Denton for a 12-hour relay that means fun, food, games and a good time -- as well as dollars for cancer research and an increased awareness of a disease that strikes in many forms and touches the lives of everyone."

Beginning at 7 p.m. on the UNT track at Fouts Field, Relay for Life kicks off and continues through 7 a.m. Saturday. Teams of 10 to 15 participants must keep one participant on the track at all times during the 12-hour event. "The participants can run, jog, walk or even crawl," said Leslie Weber, event co-chair. "We just want people to participate and have a good time."

Relay for Life is the signature fundraising event for ACS, which depends on voluntary contributions for all of its programs and operations. ACS receives no funds from the federal government. Unlike other fundraising events, Relay for Life, according to Young, is a team event that involves corporations, businesses, service clubs, youth groups, neighborhood organizations and friends who can join together to raise money for the fight against cancer.

The non-stop relay features non-stop fun as dusk fades to night, and the night turns to dawn! Groups of volunteers have planned a 12-hour marathon of games, food, musical entertainment and time for talking with each other. While the event means fun and fundraising, it also means remembering victims and honoring survivors. Cancer survivors will take the first lap around the track at 7 p.m., and luminarias will ring the track either in memory of or in honor of individuals who have battled cancer. (A luminaria ceremony will be held at 10 p.m.) Donations for luminarias (a minimum of \$5 each) are used for research and may be purchased in advance.
