RESEARCH DAYS ARE ON THE WAY

No more "best kept secrets." No more "I didn't know you do that!" It's time to unveil the campus wide efforts in research conducted at TWU and to let others know the depth and breadth of those projects. With that purpose in mind, Research Days -- March 6-8 -- will give faculty and students engaged in research an opportunity to share their ideas and programs with the campus community and others in a three-day event culminating with a keynote address by Dr. Vivian Pinn, director of the Women's Health Initiative at the National Institutes of Health. Her keynote address, scheduled Fri., March 8, at 10 a.m. in CFO 205, is titled "Hope for Tomorrow: Improving Women's Health through Research Today."

"Research Days, a special event for TWU, extends to faculty and students throughout the university the opportunity to share their investigations," said Dr. Sondra Ferstl (research and grants). "The spotlight for Research Days is on research in its many forms -- basic or applied, quantitative or qualitative, in progress or completed." There is no registration fee; however, seating is limited at some programs, so registration is required. Contact Ferstl at ext. 3375.

TWU faculty and students submitted more than 130 abstracts in response to a call for entries earlier this year. As a result, three poster sessions are scheduled -- Thurs., March 7, morning and afternoon, and Fri., March 8, morning; approximately 40 projects will be displayed at each half-day session. "The researchers who are involved will stand by their displays for an hour during the session to share their projects with visitors," explained Ferstl. "These poster sessions continue the student research symposium begun on the Denton campus by students enrolled in the Minority Biomedical Research Support program."

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SAVING AT-RISK CHILDREN IS FOCUS OF CONFERENCE

Children in need...children at risk...youngsters who need help...will be the focus of a conference sponsored by TWU, the National Coalition for At-Risk Children and Youth, March 7-9 in Denton at the Radisson Hotel. This second annual event will explore an integrated approach to emerging trends and issues that have a direct effect on at-risk children and youth in three main areas: medical issues, education and interagency issues. Several national experts will speak.

The conference is presented by the TWU College of Education and Human Ecology and the departments of early childhood and special education, educational leadership, family sciences, and reading and bilingual education. The cost to attend is \$150 for regular registration, which includes instruction, continental breakfast and course materials. A Saturday workshop is an additional \$65. More than 50 breakout sessions will include topics such as child abuse, children with disabilities, HIV/AIDS education, summer retention programs, picture communication boards, public health and community violence, family social support networks and other areas as well. Presentations have been developed for a target audience that includes educators, counselors, psychologists, family therapists, law enforcement officers, attorneys, interagency professionals, health care professionals, social workers, sociologists and others who work with at-risk children.

Speakers will include Fort Worth pediatrician Dr. Julian Haber, also an adjunct professor in speech-language pathology at Texas Christian University. His current research interests include the ability of primary care physicians to identify disabilities in a high-risk population and the creation of a screening instrument for mental health. Dr. Robert Barr, dean of the Boise State University College of Education, will conduct a general session on March 8. He holds a doctorate from Purdue University and has written or co-authored four books on social studies education, at-risk youth and alternative education.

Another featured speaker, Dr. Dan Miller (psychology) -- an expert in brain mapping -- will conduct a general session on ADD/ADHD research. He currently serves on the faculty and as director of the school psychology training programs at TWU. Other TWU faculty conducting workshops include Drs. Jane Irons, Linda Sluder and Lloyd Kinnison (educational leadership), and Drs. Jennifer Martin and Lillian Chenoweth (family sciences).

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WOMEN'S WORKS: A WAVE OF INSPIRATION

The TWU department of visual arts, in conjunction with the Dallas-based forum of women artists -- WAVE -- is sponsoring an exhibition about the history of women's art from Mon., Feb. 26, through Fri., March 15. Titled "Heros: Women Who Have Inspired," the exhibition is on display weekdays from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the fine arts gallery of the Arts Building. 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SELF-INSURED RESERVE FUND STATUS DISCUSSED

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) and Don Henry (finance and administration) have made the following announcement, dated Feb. 19, 1996, regarding the status of the self-insured reserve fund: "The university has received a preliminary opinion from the Vinson and Elkins law firm regarding the distribution of the self-insured reserve fund. We expect to have a final opinion within the next few days or so. Based upon the preliminary opinion, the university will begin now to consider the specifics of our recommendation which will require board (of regents) approval.

University administrators are in the process of establishing a timetable that would enable them to submit a proposal to the TWU board of regents at their June 1996 meeting. This will allow staff time to review participants' files and other documents placed before them, prior to finalizing the university's recommendation. This process will be expedited, to the extent possible, to bring closure to this matter."

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UPDATE ON TWU PEOPLE

Sympathy is extended to **Teresa Sparlin-Yzaguirre** (Student Center) and her husband, Chavel, following the death of their 10-month-old son, Hunner. Hunner, who had been undergoing treatment to relieve swelling and inflammation in his brain, died on Sat., Feb. 10, in Children's Hospital; the funeral was held on Feb. 16.
