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## **NOTED AUTHOR, PLAYWRIGHT VISITING TWU**

Nationally noted African-American author and playwright J. California Cooper will visit TWU on Tues. and Wed., Feb. 6 and 7, to help TWU celebrate her work. An award-winning author, Cooper will conduct several sessions and discuss "In Search of Satisfaction" -- the title theme for her presentations at TWU, as well as the name of her latest book.

The general public, the campus community and other interested persons are invited to attend a two-hour presentation on Tues., Feb. 6, from 7 to 9 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. The cost to attend is \$3 for general admission; all TWU faculty, staff, students and alumni will be admitted free. On Wed., Feb. 7, Cooper will meet students, faculty, staff and others during a book signing at 9 a.m. in SC 207. She then will conduct a free open presentation that morning at 11 a.m. in MCL auditorium. Everyone is invited.

All activities for the two-day event are presented by the TWU department of English, speech and foreign languages, the office of student activities, the office of intercultural services and the committee for campus climate and community.

Cooper, who was named Black Playwright of the Year in 1978, is the author of two novels: *Family* and *In Search of Satisfaction*. She also has written 17 plays and four collections of short stories: *Homemade Love*, winner of the 1989 American Book Award; *Some Soul to Keep*; *The Matter Is Life*; and *A Piece of Mine*. Her work often is described as stories, parables and monologues filled with wisdom and memorable, down-to-earth characters. In 1988, Cooper received the James Baldwin Award from the American Library Association. A native Texan, the famous author and playwright lives in northern California; she lectures and tours nationally.
