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BRADSHAW LECTURE/SEMINAR SET

The TWU School of Library and Information Studies will present the 11th annual Lillian Bradshaw lecture and seminar on Thurs., April 24, on the Denton campus. Michael Gorman, dean of library services at the Henry Madden Library at California State University-Fresno, will be the featured speaker. The program, which is free and open to the public and the campus community, will begin at 8 p.m. in ACT 301. For information, call ext. 2602.

Gorman will discuss "Cataloging. Chaos. Cataloging the Chaos?" -- a look at the present state of bibliographic control, the chaos of the Internet and the application of standard cataloging to electronic documents...tying bibliographic control to the preservation of the human record. In addition, the guest speaker will conduct a related seminar this summer at TWU from July 7-22, Monday through Thursday, from 1 to 5 p.m. He will teach the seminar using a combination of campus visits and interactive videoconferences.

Gorman is the first editor of the *Anglo-American Cataloging Rules* (second edition) and of that work's revision. He is the author of *The Concise AACR2*; co-author of *Future Libraries: Dreams, Madness and Reality*; editor of and contributor to *Technical Services Today and Tomorrow*; and editor of *Convergence* (proceedings of the 2nd national LITA conference) and *Californien: Henry Madden and the German Travelers in America*. He is a Fellow of the British Library Association; the 1979 recipient of the Margaret Mann Citation awarded by the American Library Association; and the 1992 recipient of the Melvil Dewey Medal, also awarded by ALA.

Each year the endowment for the Bradshaw Visiting Scholar -- named in honor of Lillian Bradshaw -- enables TWU to bring an outstanding scholar to present the Bradshaw lecture and to conduct a summer seminar. "Bradshaw's career manifests the highest aspirations of professional librarianship," said Dr. Keith Swigger (Library and Information Studies). "Her leadership, energy, intelligence and astuteness have inspired those who share her belief that strong libraries are essential public institutions assuring every person opportunities for education and growth."

Bradshaw was director of the Dallas Public Libraries from 1962-1984. In 1971-72, she served as president of the American Library Association. She earned her bachelor's degree at Western Maryland College and her master's degree in library science from Drexel University, where she later was honored with the degree of Doctor of Letters. Bradshaw was a librarian at the Utica Public Library and the Enoch Pratt Free Library in Baltimore before coming to Dallas.
