PUBLIC HEARING SET ON PROPOSED FEE INCREASE

TWU will hold two public hearings -- one a video teleconference -- for students, faculty and staff to discuss a proposed increase in the general use (or building use) fee...an increase of \$7 per semester credit hour, changing the current fee from \$12 per semester credit hour to \$19 per semester credit hour, effective fall 1996.

The first public hearing will be held on TWU's Denton campus from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. on Mon., April 29, SC 006-007. A video teleconference presented by Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) is planned on Mon., May 6, from noon to 1 p.m. that will originate at the TWU Institute of Health Sciences Dallas Center (Parkland, DED 230) and will be transmitted to the Presbyterian site (room 109) and to the Houston center (Nursing Building, room E-83).

The general use fee supplements general revenue appropriations and tuition. It pays for general operations of the university, including faculty and staff salaries, building maintenance and operations, scholarships and other expenses authorized under state statute. In particular, this fee increase will be used along with the state-mandated tuition fee increase this fall for several major budget guidelines approved by the TWU board of regents during their March 14-15, 1996, quarterly meeting, *contingent upon approval of the proposed increase in the general use fee*. Those budget guidelines are: to keep up with inflation; to provide faculty tenure and promotion increases; to fund general faculty and staff salary increases; to provide essential faculty support to sustain present academic programs; and to support additional administrative positions for technology and information systems management.

The general use fee may not exceed the tuition fee per semester credit hour, which will be \$32 per semester credit hour in fall 1996. Many other universities in Texas already have increased the general use fee, and several others are proposing an increase this fall -- some to the current maximum of \$32 per semester credit hour, equal to the tuition rate.

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LEARN ABOUT MAPPING THE FUTURE

Shrinking budgets and growing enrollments are creating dual challenges for universities and colleges across the United States. These institutions must find innovative and cost-efficient ways to teach children of the nation's "baby boomers" as well as the growing number of adult

learners who need to develop new skills. During the broadcast, participants will see ways in which schools are confronting needs and economic demands as they extend access and maintain quality. During the videoconference, the audience will visit schools demonstrating three difference models that use technology to deliver instruction both on campus and at a distance:

- Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University is developing a cyberschool concept -- constructing a new type of college from social interactions made possible by new technologies.
- Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute has created a new "studio" approach to college physics and calculus courses. To provide a more efficient and effective way of handling laboratory courses with large enrollments, RPI has redesigned the entire teaching and learning process.
- The Education Network of Maine has re-engineered organizational policy and process to implement a statewide distance education system. Using many technologies, they deliver instruction to more than 2,600 students at 101 sites across the state.

Key speakers will include William H. Graves, associate provost for information technology at the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill; James Mingle, executive director of the State Higher Education Executive Officers; Diana Oblinger, IBM academic programs manager; and Carol Twigg, vice president of EDUCOM.

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LIBRARY ADDS NEW DATABASES

With assistance from academic computing services, the TWU Blagg-Huey Library has expanded information access through VENUS by adding several new electronic databases and library services. The LI option on the VENUS menu now includes five new databases: ABI/INFORM (business-related resources); Periodical Abstracts database; the Federal Register; SPIN (Sponsored Programs Information Network); and IRIS (Illinois Research Information). The content focus of SPIN and IRIS is on research and grant information. In addition, VENUS users now have access to the Denton Public Library's on-line catalog. 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SIFE CO-FELLOWS FROM TWU SELECTED

Three TWU faculty from the department of business and economics recently were selected as Sam M. Walton Free Enterprise co-Fellows for Students in Free Enterprise (SIFE). Dr. Cindy Istook, Sherrill Taylor and Chandra Schorg will serve in that capacity for the 1996-97 academic year. SIFE is a partnership between business and higher education whose mission is to build collegiate SIFE teams to teach free enterprise in their communities, according to Istook. "Student SIFE teams conduct educational outreach programs throughout the year and then present their projects to a panel of national business leaders at regional and international SIFE competitions."

Although team projects usually do not begin until the fall semester, the three TWU co-Fellows were encouraged to take student projects completed during the past year (before SIFE was formed on campus) to the regional competition this spring. A 26-student team competed with other well-established SIFE teams on April 24. "Student involvement in competitions provides the additional benefit of direct contact with business leaders across the U.S. and often results in job offers for graduating seniors," said Istook.

Students involved in SIFE projects for more than 50 hours during the year will receive certificates signed by the SIFE board of directors and will gain valuable experiences that strengthen their resumes, according to Istook. The co-Fellows will begin their recruiting activities across campus soon, and their goal will be to include faculty and students from all departments.
