REGENTS OKAY GENERAL INCREASE, BONDS, POLICIES

During its quarterly meeting, the TWU board of regents approved a number of matters that affect everyone in Denton, Dallas and Houston, including a 4 percent general increase for all faculty and staff members who received satisfactory ratings on their personnel evaluations this fiscal year. The increase is effective Sept. 1, 1995. Other matters acted on by the board included:

- approval of fiscal 1996 budget guidelines;
- adoption of separate ethics policy documents for TWU employees and the board of regents;
- adoption of a sexual harassment policy and procedures;
- approval to issue \$17 million in bonds for construction of the Movement Science Complex;
- approval to issue \$7 million in bonds for renovation needs in Hubbard Hall and installation of a sprinkler system in Guinn and Stark Halls;
- approval to take down Smith-Carroll and Bralley Halls;
- approval of a request to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board for a Doctor of Science in Nursing degree in Houston;
- approval of list for tenure, promotion and emeritus status (see separate story/listing).

Fiscal Affairs

Most of the board's discussion and time during the Houston meeting were spent on budget items, policies and bond approvals. Robert Benfield (fiscal affairs) informed regents, "The total amount of funds available for the fiscal year 1996 budget is projected to be \$47.2 million. Approximately \$38.6 million are state-appropriated general revenue funds, and \$8.6 million are education and general funds (E&G) and other local funds." He provided the following guidelines:

- A 4 percent general increase will be awarded to all regular continuing faculty and staff employees. The cost of this adjustment is approximately \$1.3 million. Not included in the adjustment are adjunct faculty, student employees and temporary staff. Pay scales for graduate assistants will receive market adjustments.
- A \$120,000 budget will be used for faculty tenure, promotions and market/equity adjustments. Each faculty member who receives tenure or promotion will be awarded an additional \$1,000 (or \$2,000 if she or he receives both tenure and promotion), plus the 4 percent general increase.
- An \$80,000 budget will be provided to adjust staff positions to market.
- Five new faculty positions will be added.
- Three new staff positions will be added.
- The legislature appropriated funds for two new special items: 1) nurse practitioner program (establish program and hire faculty in Denton) -- \$133,500 for FY 96; and 2) Federation of North Texas Area Universities -- \$68,847 for FY 96 (for administrative costs during TWU's rotation to run the program).

- Increases in M&O (maintenance and operations) and travel budgets will be held to a minimum.

Dr. Wilkes Berry (academic affairs) stated that the market/equity adjustments for faculty would probably involve approximately two dozen faculty members and that "department chairs and deans will have to bring forth competitive data to justify it." Of the \$120,000 approved for tenure, promotion and market/equity adjustments, approximately \$30,000 will be used for tenure and/or promotions and about one-third of the remaining \$90,000 will be used for market/equity adjustments. "The rest will go to new faculty positions, when they are required," said Berry.

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) said this process "will be done on a systematic basis."

The regents, all of whom were present, approved the guidelines and accepted Benfield's proposed FY 1996 budget planning schedule, which covers related activities during the summer months. They addressed the contents of two proposed ethics policies -- one for employees and a similar document for the board of regents -- that were written by John Lawhon (general counsel), who also is TWU's ethics officer. Lawhon stated that there is "a great deal of emphasis at the state level concerning ethical practices by state employees," which is why TWU and other public colleges and universities are adopting such documents. The regents discussed nepotism in relation to hiring and decided to approve both documents with two changes.

Permission to issue bonds for new construction and renovation also were approved. The regents okayed issuing bonds for \$17 million to build the new Movement Science Complex, based on HEAF (Higher Education Assistance Fund) money appropriated by the Texas legislature. Beginning Sept. 1, 1995, TWU will receive \$6.8 million annually for 10 years for capital improvements. HEAF money cannot be used for salaries, travel or M&O, Benfield told regents. TWU will spend about one-third of its annual \$6.8 million HEAF appropriation to pay for the Movement Science Complex and its debt service. With the approval of this bond, Benfield projected that groundbreaking for the building may occur in January 1996.

The second bond request (\$7 million) comprises general revenue bonds, which TWU must pay back with general revenue fees and auxiliary enterprises revenues. No state money can be used. The funds will be used to renovate Hubbard Hall and to add sprinkler systems in Guinn and Stark Halls. The regents approved both bonds and gave permission to the university to tear down Smith-Carroll and Bralley Halls, which have been vacant for at least 10 years. The removal of Smith-Carroll will give TWU an opportunity to provide parking near MCL, where a severe shortage of spaces exists for students, faculty and staff, as well as community members who use clinics and services that are based in MCL. The Bralley Hall land will become a green area.

Academic Affairs

Aside from tenure, promotion and emeritus status items, Dr. Wilkes Berry asked the regents to allow TWU to request a Doctor of Science in Nursing degree in Houston. "We have the resources and the history to do this here without duplicating programs elsewhere," he explained, "and it would not require additional funds." Three other institutions in Texas have made the same request, but Coordinating Board staff members recommended against approval. This degree would be a clinical track, according to Berry, and it is "a logical direction for us to go...without

asking the state to put out the resources to start a brand new program at another institution." The regents approved Berry's request, and he will submit TWU's proposal to the Coordinating Board later this year.

Regents then discussed and approved the proposed sexual harassment policy, which now includes procedures for filing complaints. TWU now will seek an EEO executive assistant to the president, and the university will conduct a search to find that individual. Dr. Rudy Rodriguez (reading and bilingual education) has agreed to chair the search committee, according to Surles. Berry also introduced Dr. Diane Ragsdale (Nursing, Houston), who informed regents that she will bring a proposal forward this fall for their approval that involves the establishment of a nurse-managed clinic in Houston for AIDS patients and their family members.

Student Life and Institutional Advancement

Dr. Glenda Simmons (student life) was "pleased" to report to regents that she would make "no request for an increase in the student service fee. Using projections based on enrollment, we can fund our needs without an increase." That budget will be distributed at the next board of regents meeting in August. Simmons reported that the basic analysis of the Student Opinion Survey has been received. Initial results reflect a "high level of satisfaction with the campus environment and services...but there are some areas noted for improvement." Information from the survey will be broken out in other areas for further analysis.

Kathleen Gigl (institutional advancement) reported on the renovation of the "Little House" facility that will be used by alumni relations with office space leased to the TWU National Alumnae Association. She also noted that the number of donors and amount of gifts to the annual fund and Pioneer Athletic Scholarship Fund both have decreased this year (excluding endowments) and that members of the institutional advancement staff are engaged in many personal visits to decrease the gap in annual fund.

President's Report

During a brief report, Dr. Carol Surles discussed activities on campus, outreach efforts related to the President's Council and progress on the search for the vice president for academic affairs. She also discussed ongoing efforts of the Strategic Planning Committee and its four task forces, adding that she would like to organize some roundtables for further discussions this fall.

As the meeting concluded, board chair Jayne Lipe thanked all of the regents for their support and hard work during her tenure as chair. Nan Bailey and Sheila Whitaker-Kellagher then were elected chair and vice chair, respectively. The board will hold its next quarterly meeting on Aug. 25 in Denton.

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TOP COPS TAKE TOP HONORS IN POLICE OLYMPICS

Three bike patrol officers in the TWU department of public safety left a lasting impression of skill, grit and determination with other officers from across Texas and several other states when they competed in the Texas Police Olympics, held June 5-9 in South Padre. While the setting was idyllic, the competition was not. Officers Vicky Hendrix, Sgt. Brent Mast, Sgt. Ken Adams and Capt. Tom Foree competed in a variety of events. Efforts by Hendrix, Adams and Mast netted a total of 11 medals: 8 gold, 1 silver and 2 bronze.

Hendrix, who previously has competed in the Texas Police Olympics, earned gold medals in all six of her events: co-ed softball, women's softball and the police bike events of 100-yard sprint, obstacle course, co-ed relay (with Mast) and team relay. She rides every day on TWU's bike patrol (unless it's raining) and "did endurance training the month before we went. We also worked out on sand to prepare for our events." Hendrix, who was an officer with the University of Texas at Austin before she joined the department at TWU, competes in the games because "I meet officers from across the state and the U.S. It enhances communication between departments, and it encourages people to be physically fit."

Mast, whose performance at the games is connected directly to his work on the TWU bike patrol, earned gold medals in the police bike co-ed and team relays, a silver medal in the obstacle course and a fourth-place finish in the 100-yard sprint. Adams earned one bronze medal each in bench press and power lifting (which includes squat, bench and deadlift). Foree competed in golf.

Mast added, "Riding on campus is excellent training -- 8 hours on a bike in the heat with a gun belt, vest and other equipment builds endurance. I can practice on the stairs, sprint on the hills and ride every day, weather permitting." He and his teammates plan to participate in the Police World Games in Houston next year, which will be held in place of the state competition.

Although the officers are proud of their accomplishments in the games, they all stress the importance of the bike patrol on campus and invite comments and suggestions about the program, which began Oct. 3, 1993. "We want to help make TWU a safer place," said Mast. "We can do this by being on the 'inside' of the campus instead of riding in a patrol car. We can interact with people. We have found that people do talk to us and are more comfortable approaching us."

Hendrix agreed. "We are always trying to improve the program," she said. "We get some feedback from people, but we'd like to have more." And the officers also thanked administrators, faculty, staff and students for their support both on the beat and for the games.
