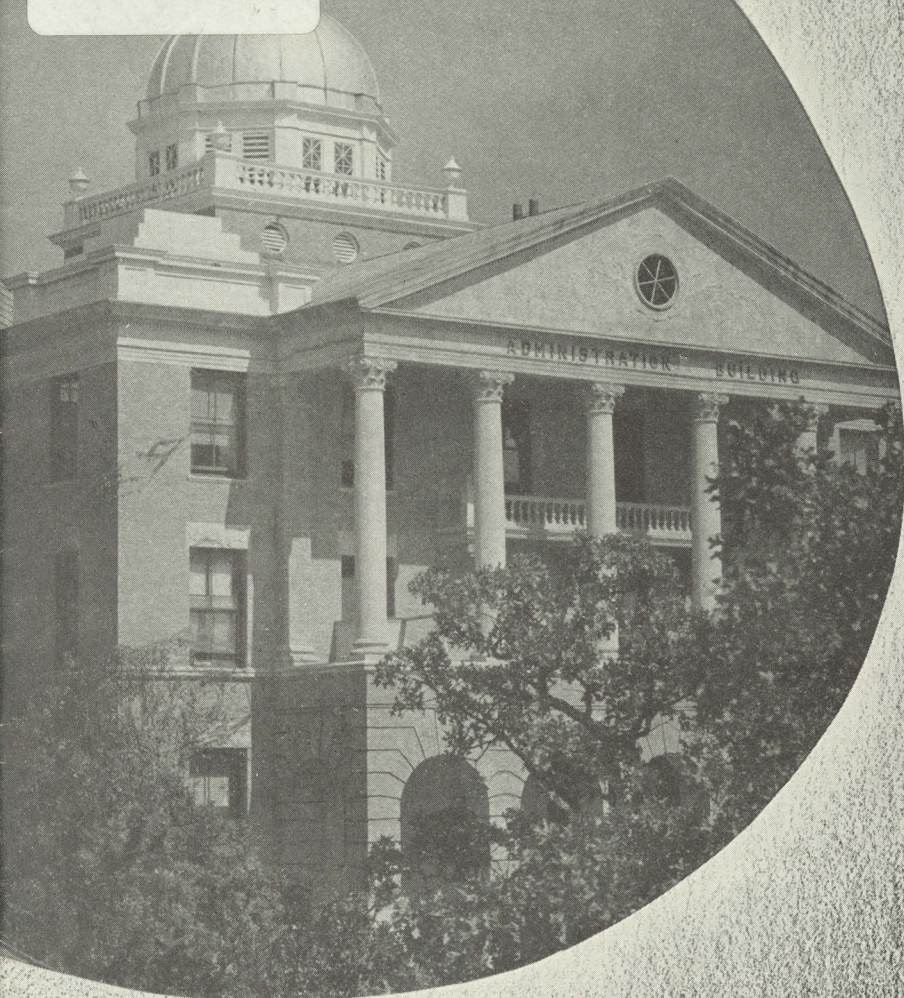
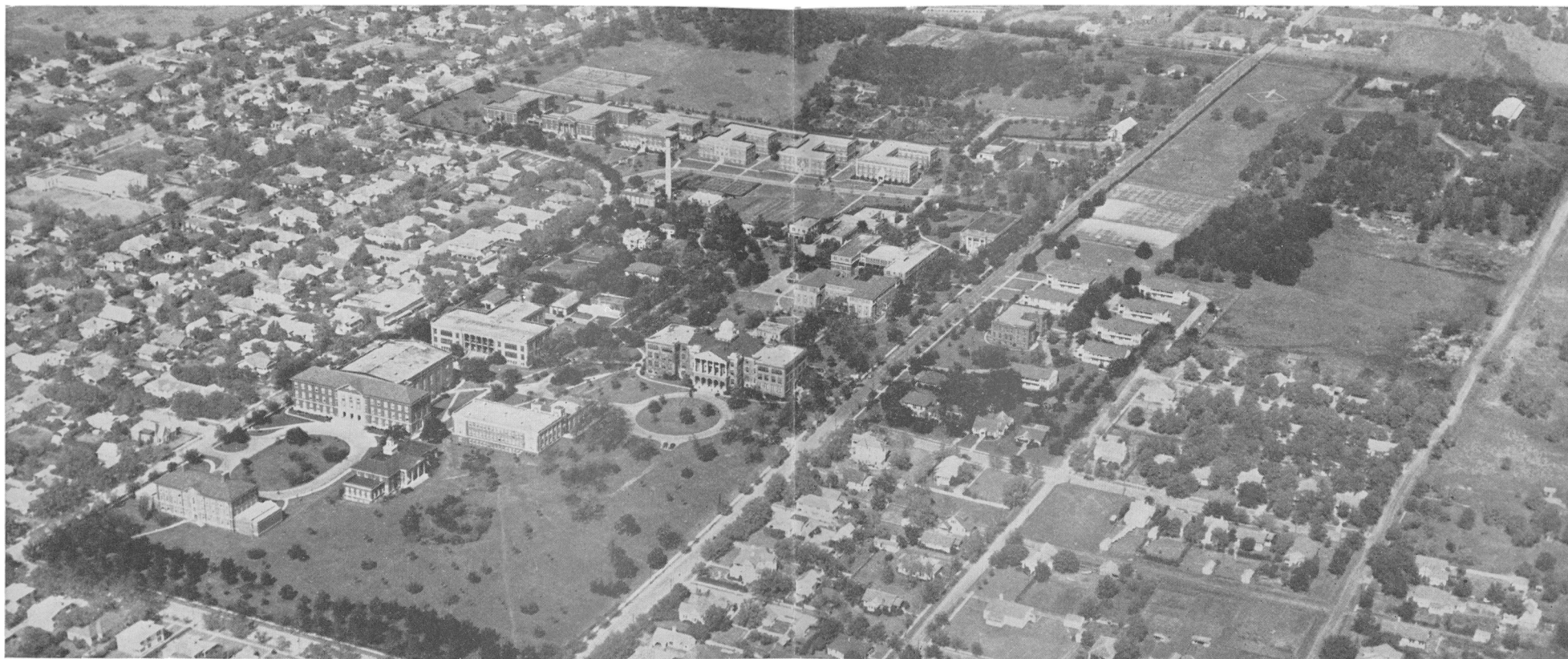

## College Home Life

The college operates nine completely equipped, modern dormitories that offer everything in the way of home life that a college woman could desire. For students who can not afford financially to live in the regular dormitories, the College has a coöperative housekeeping system, built near to and coördinating with Smith-Carroll dormitory. ## Health, Recreation, and Entertainment

The hospital with its physicians and staff of trained workers, takes care of the students who become ill and also carries forward a program of health education and prevention of illness. The College has an unusually fine student health record.

The physical education and recreational facilities include all kinds of athletic and recreational activities of interest to the modern college woman.

In addition to the well-equipped modern gymnasium and the athletic fields on the college campus, the College has several substantial, attrac-

tive camp houses on the shores of Lake Dallas—eight miles distant from Denton—where delightful picnics and swimming and rowing parties contribute to the pleasure of the student.

The College has a varied and excellent program of entertainment presented by artists and lecturers of unquestioned distinction, including many national and international celebrities. The students have the rare opportunity of attending these programs as a part of their cultural education and without additional fees.

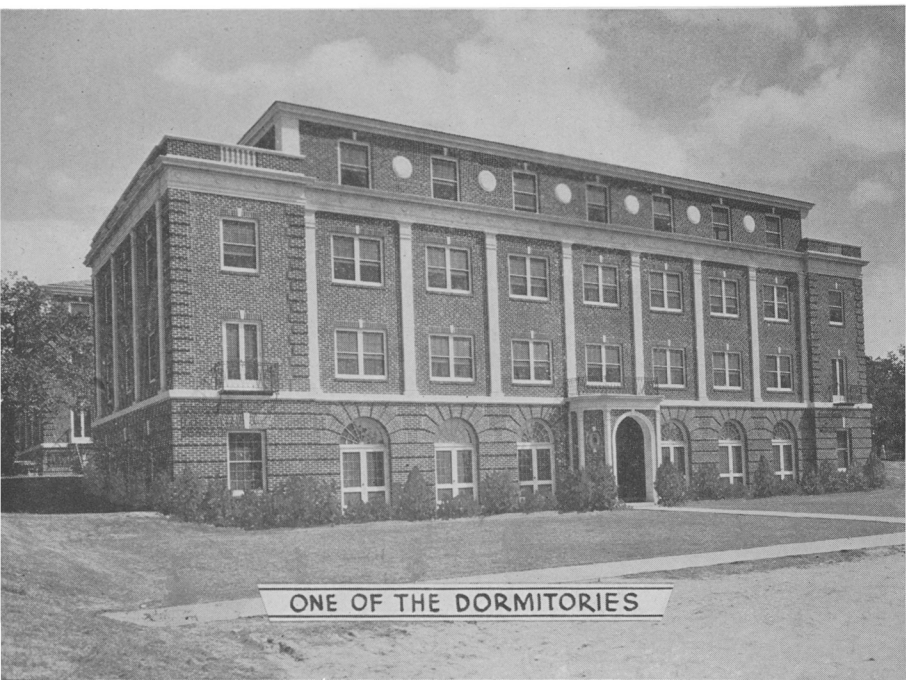
## The T. S. C. W. Spirit

The spirit of the student body is exceptionally fine. The question of discipline is handled through student government that actually works. There is hearty coöperation between students and faculty. The student body is democratic. It includes very wealthy students as well as students who earn part of their college expenses. The democratic spirit of the campus is evidenced by the fact that many of the highest honors bestowed by vote of the student body are conferred upon those who work their way through college.

The T. S. C. W. students are not required to wear uniform, but are expected to maintain the College tradition of good taste, simplicity and economy in dress.

The Texas State College for Women is a college of the first class, fully accredited and standardized. It is on the officially approved list of the ASSOCIATION OF AMERICAN UNIVERSITIES and has membership in the

The college has a faculty of 150 men and women.

The student body of 2,477 enrolled during the first semester, 1937-38, is larger than that of any other residential college for women in America.

The campus has 173 acres exclusive of the recreation grounds on Lake Dallas.

A \$1,300,000 building program has just been completed.

The college plant is valued in excess of \$4,000,000.

## Cost of Attendance

The College charges for the nine months' session are as follows:

Tuition .....	\$ 50.00
Book-rental, laboratory, medical, and student activity fee (optional) .....	20.50
Room and Board .....	257.00
Total .....	\$327.50
(Charges for the Summer Session in proportion)	

In addition, a library deposit of \$6.00 must be paid on entrance, and is refundable at the end of the session, less damages or losses incurred by the student.

If the students desire to do so, they may pay the College charges in monthly installments.

Note: For students unable to pay the regular dormitory charges the College maintains a cooperative housekeeping system where a student's expenses for the nine months' session for room, board, tuition, etc., are reduced to approximately \$160.00. Application for admission should be made to the Dean of Women, T. S. C. W. Station, Denton, Texas.
