"We learn to do by doing."

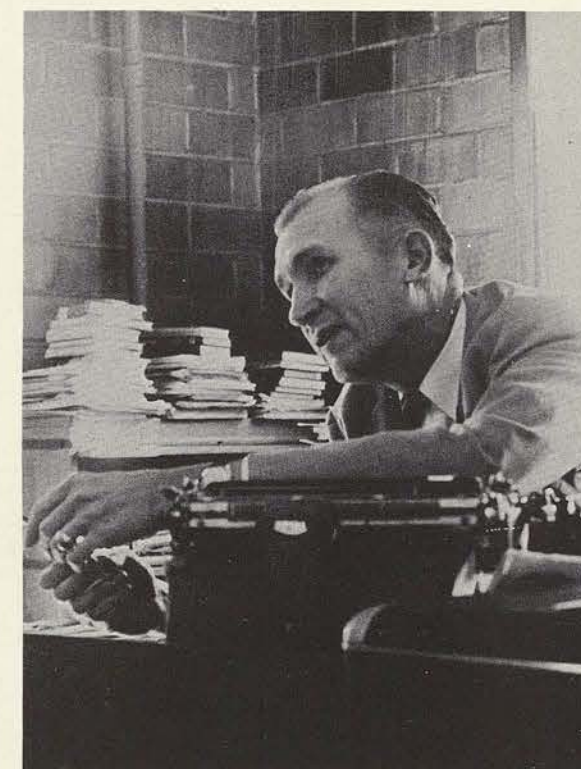

where we ate in the companionship of our class and dined off of white table cloths on Saturday nights and Sundays.

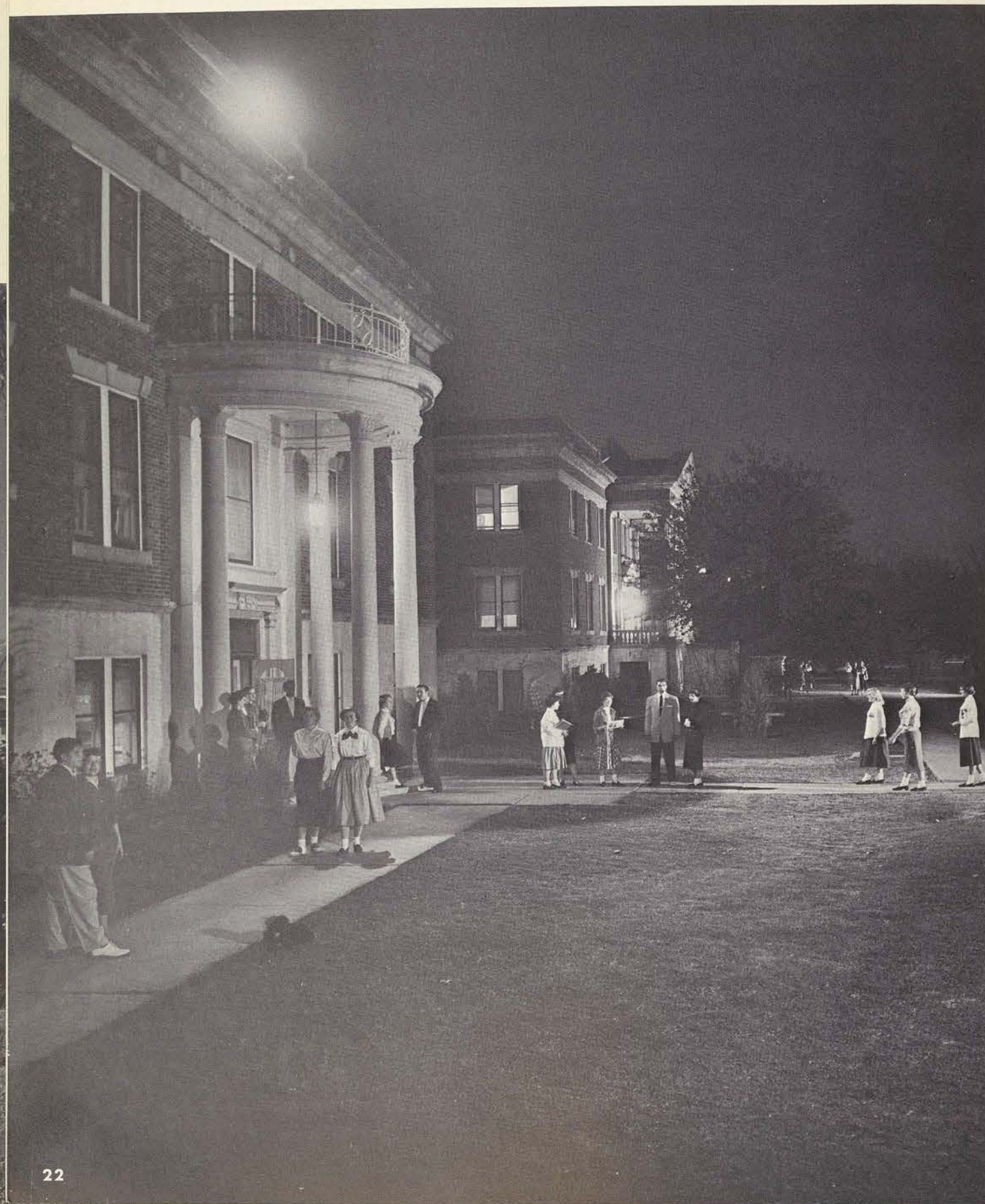


little chapel-in-the-woods

 who passes through the Chapel doors.

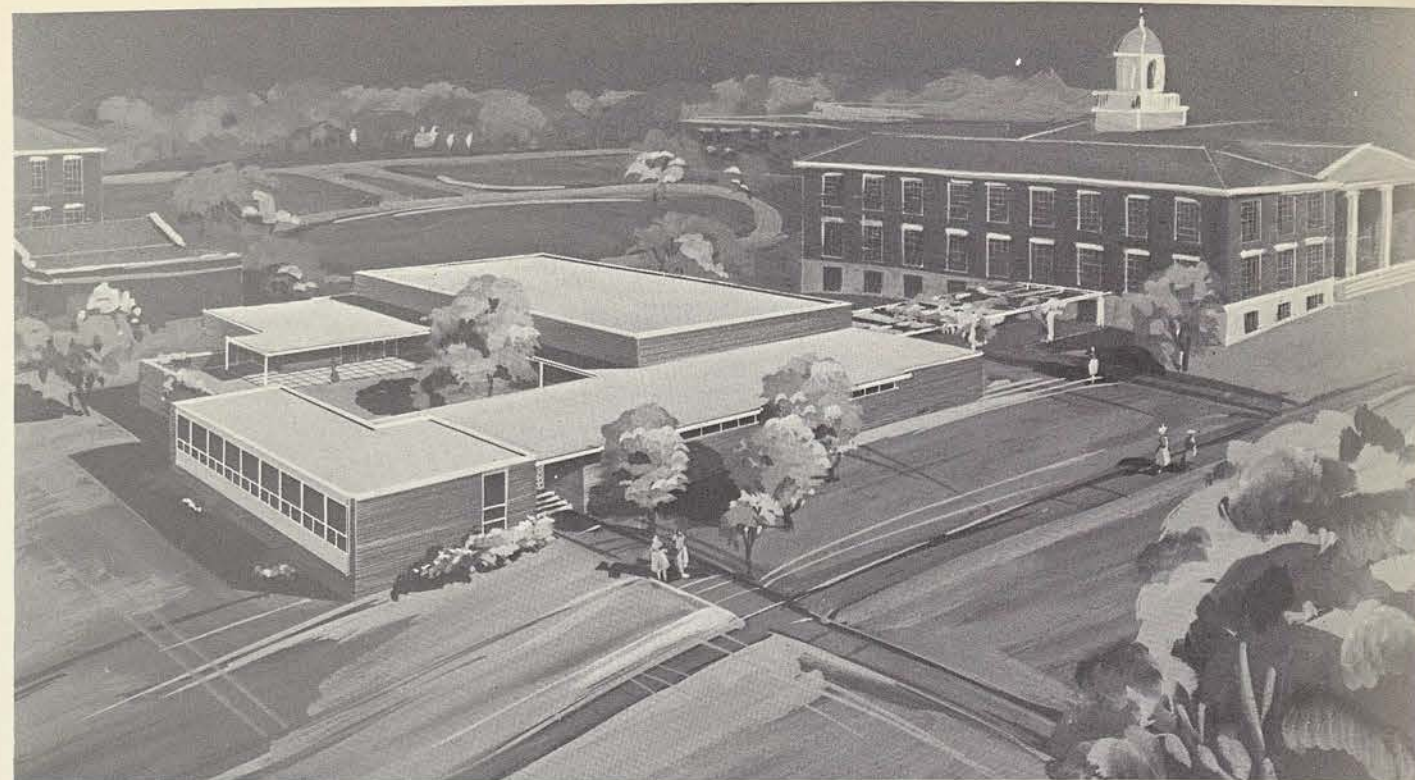
Rushing to make the 11 o'clock closing hour,

 and where we gathered on Tuesday nights for recreation after a tiring day.



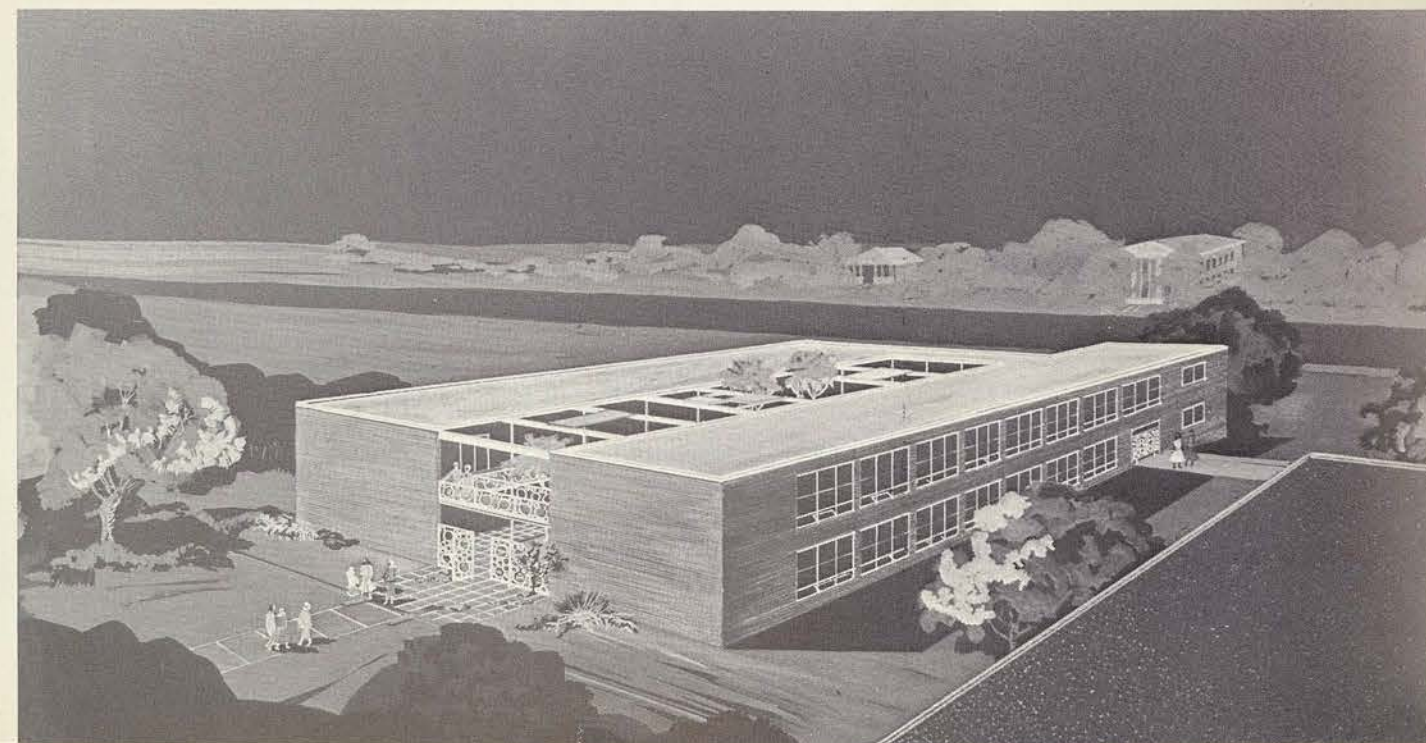


LIBRARY SCIENCE BUILDING

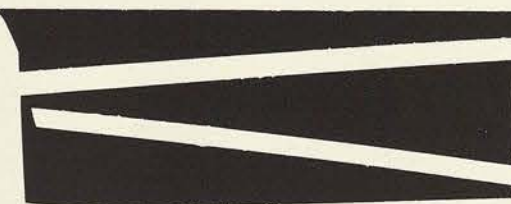
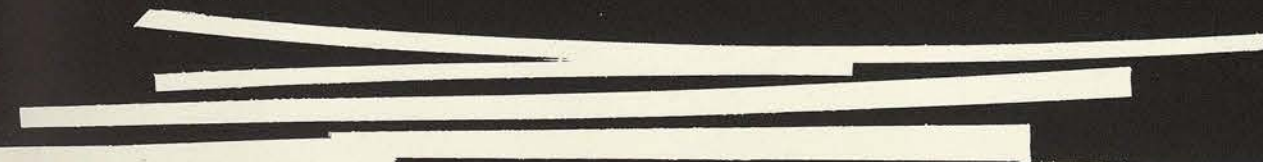
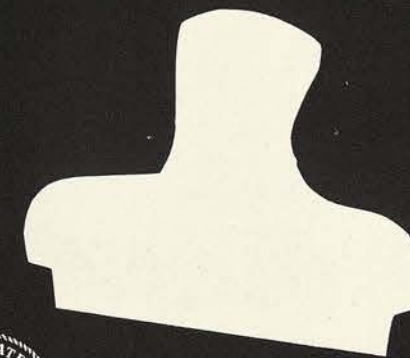
Contracts were let in January and construction began in February on TSCW's four-fold building project.

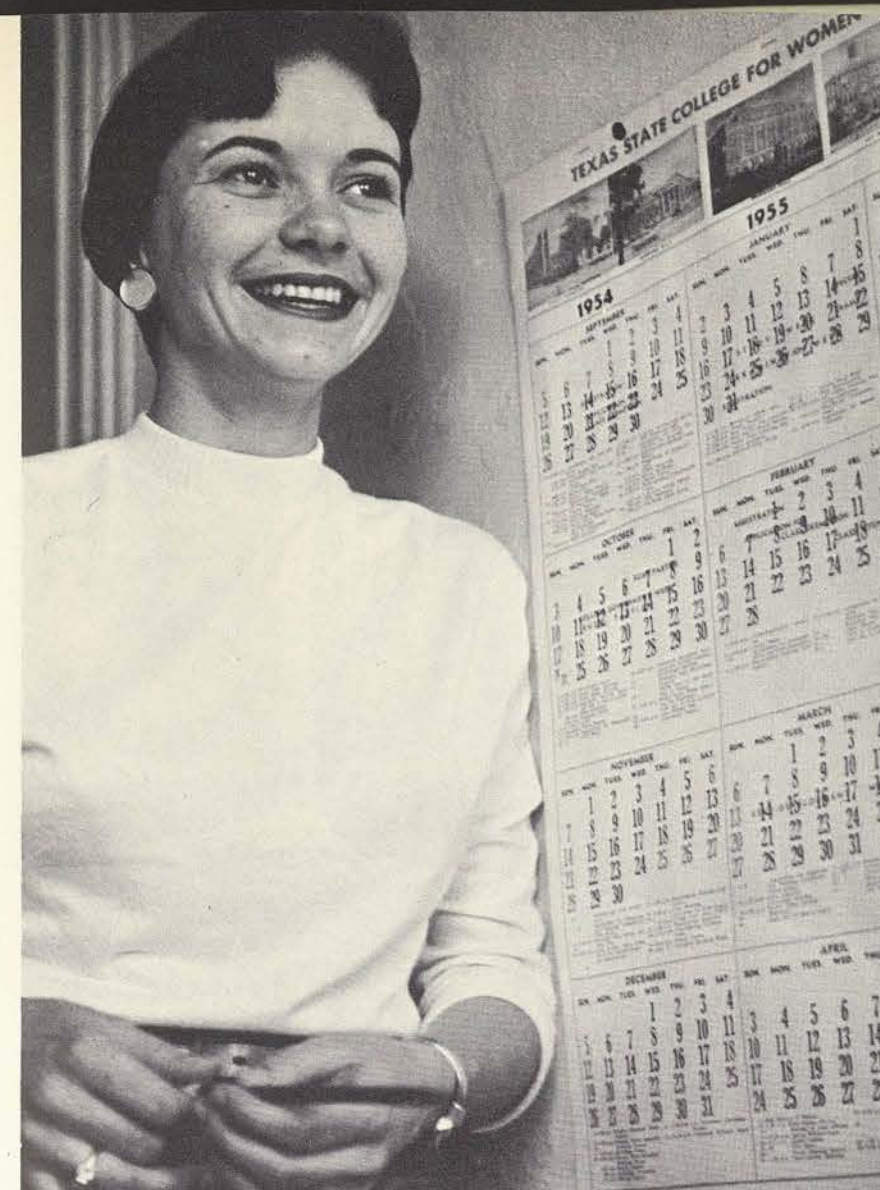
MARCIA DEAN

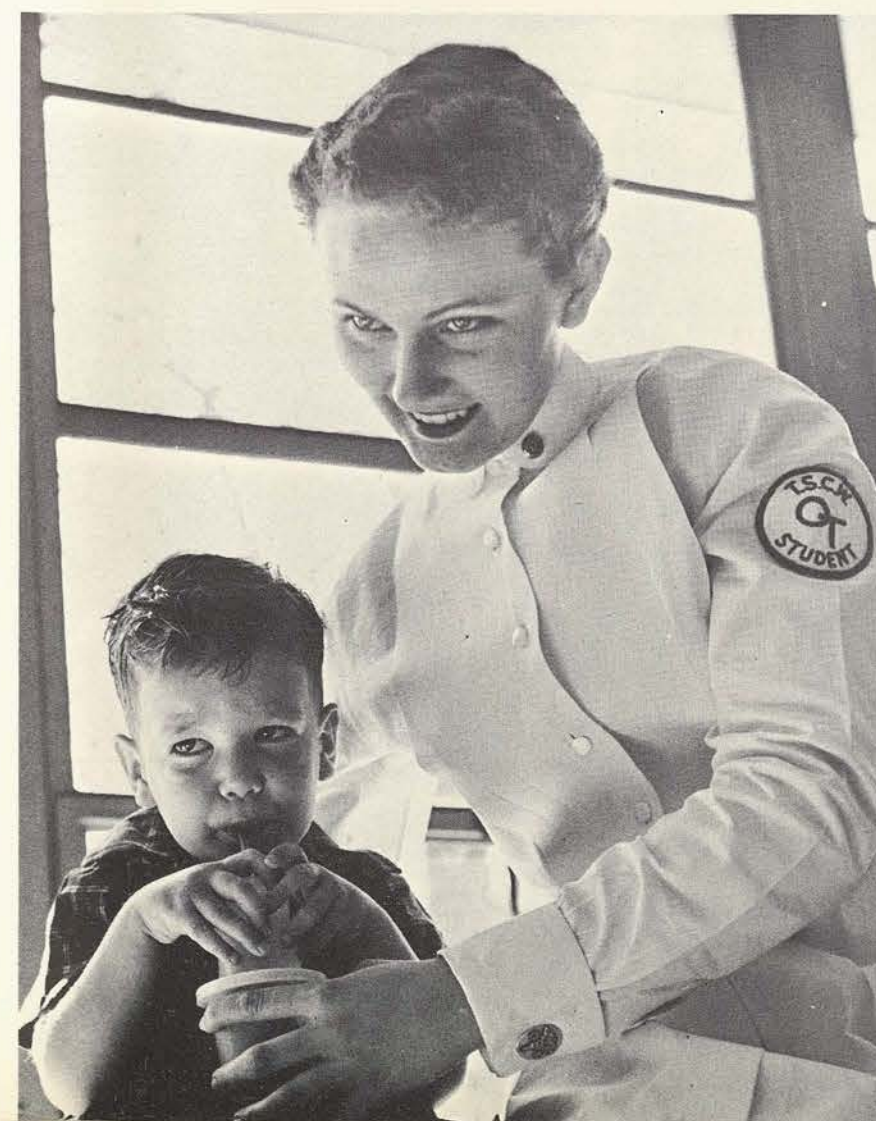
KATHERINE HADDAD

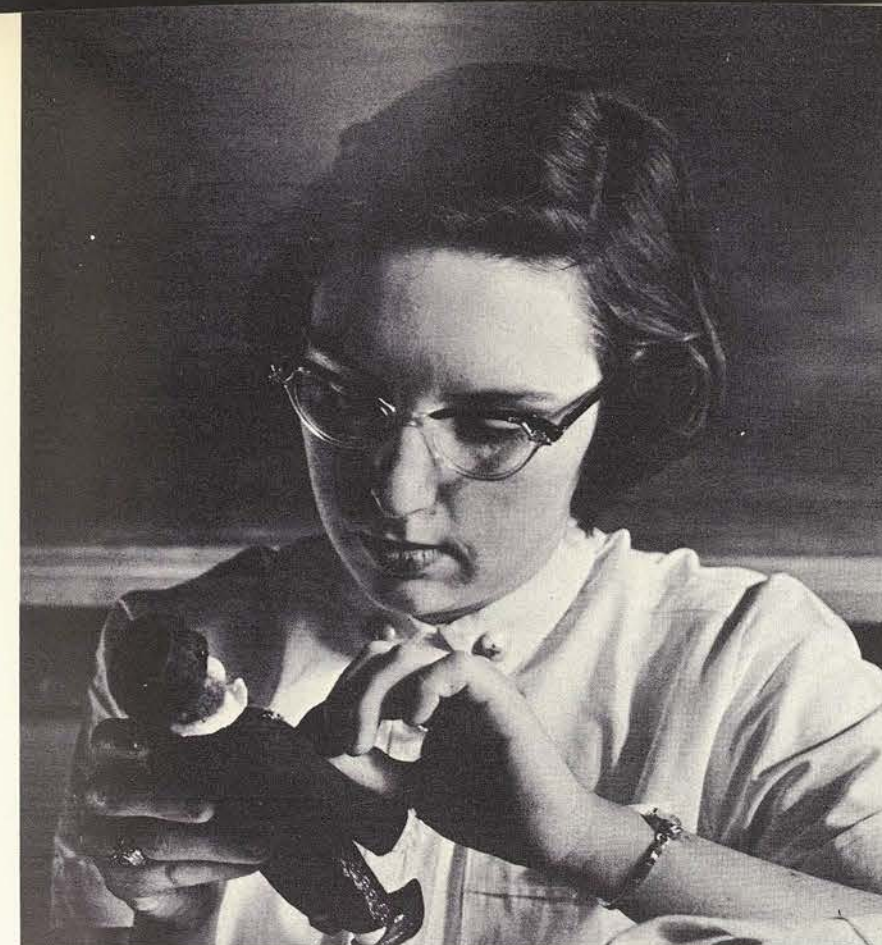
LOYAL McNAIR

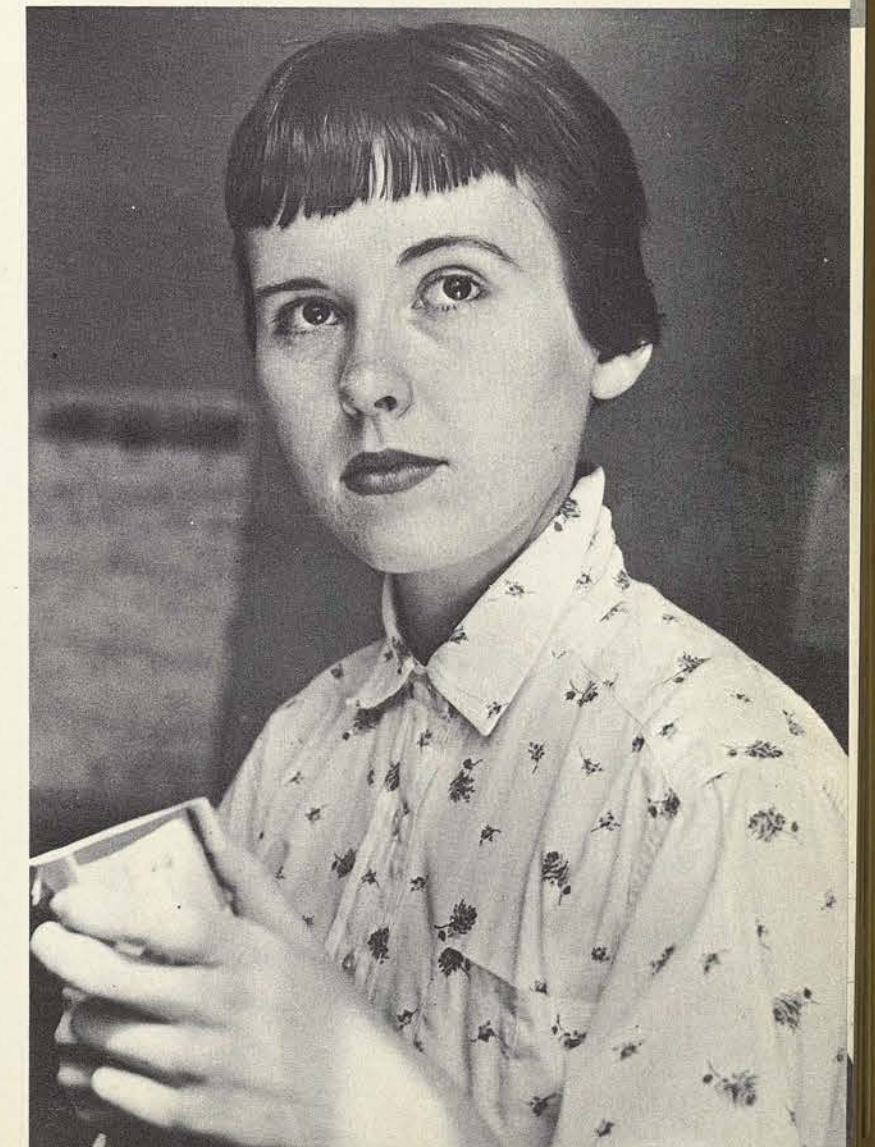
TOMMYE MILLER

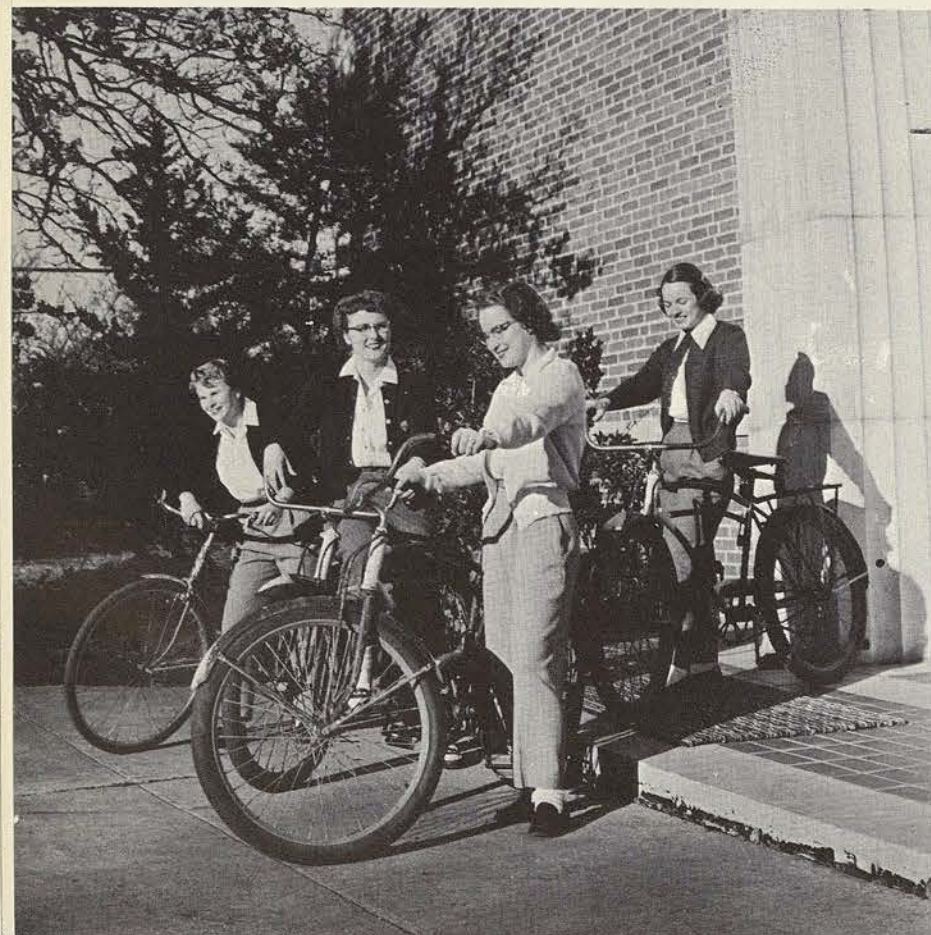

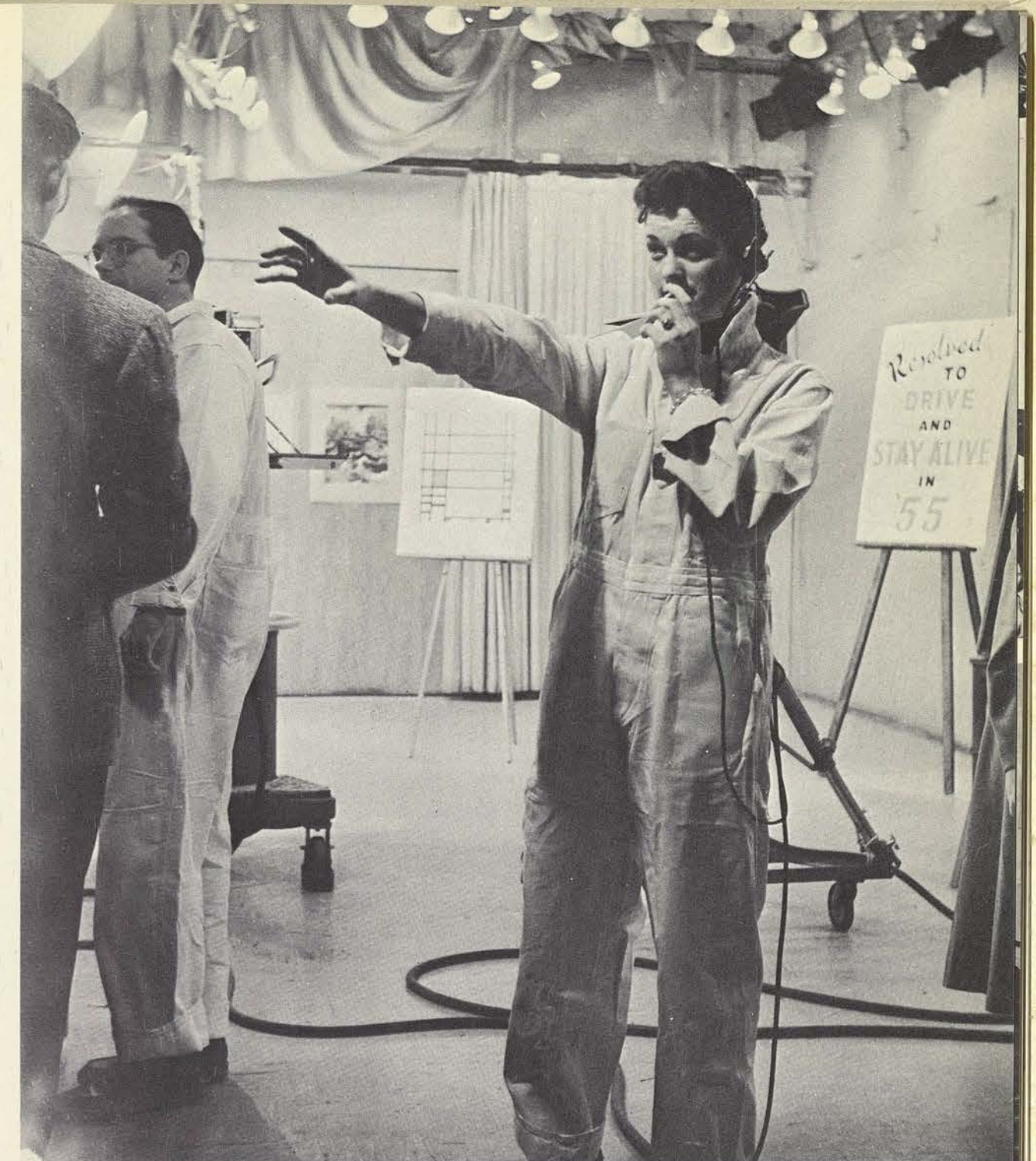
daedalian quarterly

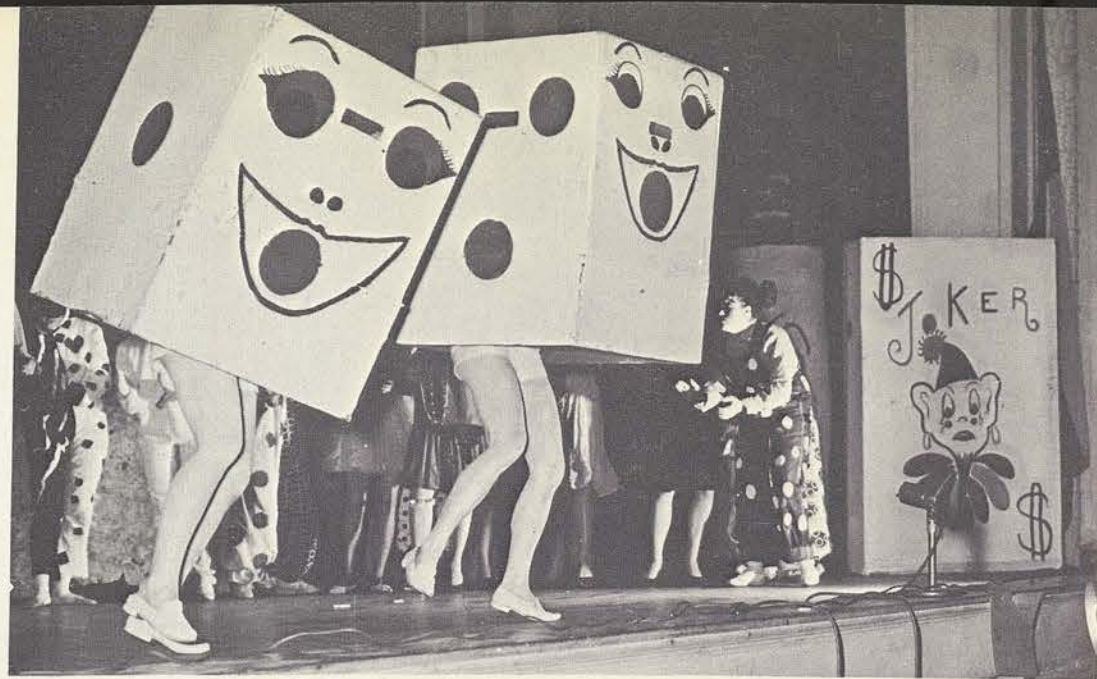
