TWU BLACK ALUMNI ASSOCIATION TO MARK HISTORIC EVENT

The Texas Woman's University Black Alumni Association is celebrating the 50th anniversary of integration at TWU with a weekend event at the university Sept. 17-18.

Activities include panel discussions on TWU's integration with several of the university's first African-American students and their families, a luncheon and a gala dinner. TWU Regent and Distinguished Alumnus Lola Chriss will serve as the guest speaker at the gala dinner Sept. 17.

In 1961, the TWU Board of Regents voted to change the admissions policy to allow black women to apply to the university. In September 1961, Alsenia Dowells became the first African-American woman to enroll at TWU, and by the next year six more African-American students were accepted to the university. In 1966, TWU had its first African-American graduates.

Established in 2010, The TWU Black Alumni Association seeks to create a sense of community among TWU black alumni, to explore the rich history of TWU black graduates, to mentor current students toward graduation and to establish a scholarship endowment.

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COORDINATING BOARD AWARDS TWU GRANT FOR G-FORCE PROGRAM

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) has awarded Texas Woman's University a \$300,000 grant for the university's student mentor G-Force program, which is designed to increase enrollment among first-generation college students in Texas.

G-Force members mentor high school students, participate in college enrollment workshops and help to staff TWU-sponsored Go Centers in area high schools. A Go

Center is a physical space in a high school that offers students admission and financial aid application assistance and other information to encourage greater participation in higher education by potential first-generation college students.

"The TWU G-Force program has been a great success in exposing more potential first-generation students to the college experience," said Dr. Richard Nicholas, TWU vice president for student life. "I am proud that the Coordinating Board is recognizing the achievements of our G-Force program and is rewarding the students with these funds."

The two-year grant will allow G-Force members who qualify for state work-study — where students are paid for their on-campus or select off-campus jobs with state funds as part of their financial aid — to be hired as TWU student workers and be paid for their mentorship, presenting workshops and Go Center staffing hours. The students, who will work an average of 15 to 20 hours a week, will receive these work-study wages in addition to stipends from TWU, which range from \$500 to \$1,500 per semester.
