
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PIONEERS KICK OF ATHLETIC SCHOLARSHIP CAMPAIGN

Since 1984, TWU has been striving to help its students become pioneers in athletics, scholarship and citizenship through the Pioneer Athletic Scholarship Campaign. Former athletics director Jo Kuhn and retired faculty member Kitty Magee started the campaign to help TWU student-athletes meet the rising costs of education and athletics. This year's campaign begins with a kick-off breakfast on Tues., Feb. 9, at 7:30 a.m., in Magee Arena (Pioneer Hall). Cathy Jacobson, a member of TWU's softball team -- recognized as a National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-Academic Team -- will speak at the breakfast, which will be underwritten by corporate sponsor GTE.

"We have a very motivated athletics department and a group of athletes who excel not only on the field but also academically," said Greg Sawko, the 1998 and 1999 campaign chair and an attorney with the law firm of Sawko and Burroughs. "We need to support them so that they can succeed and shape our future communities. We're investing in our future."

Athletes at TWU (a member of the Lone Star Conference) compete in five major sports -- softball, basketball, gymnastics, volleyball and tennis -- but they receive no state or university-allocated dollars for athletic scholarships. Instead, they rely primarily on contributions donated to the Pioneer Campaign, which is an effort driven by volunteers, for financial support.

This year's goal is \$80,000, and every dollar raised goes directly to scholarships. A new aspect of this year's campaign is an advisory committee comprising Denton community leaders like Magee and Denton Mayor Jack Miller; members assist with campaign planning duties. "We want to be inclusive and to get the TWU community, alumni and the Denton community involved in the campaign," Sawko added. "The athletes themselves participate in their own fundraising activities."

A student-athlete must have earned two or more letters in one sport, or one letter in two or more sports to qualify for nomination. She also must have completed a bachelor's degree and must have completed her eligibility at least seven years prior to consideration for selection. The student-athlete must have demonstrated attributes of good citizenship after leaving the institution. A coach, athletics administrator, support staff person or others must have left that position for at least five years prior to consideration for nomination and, in all cases, must possess an individual record of outstanding merit in athletics so that no question arises concerning that person's qualification for induction into the Hall of Fame.





Governor Jackson (financial aid) participated in a symposium titled "Higher Education Issues and the 76th Texas Legislature" on Jan. 11 at the University of Texas at Austin. Higher education professionals and policy makers joined Texas Rep. Irma Rangel, chair of the House Committee on Higher Education, in a discussion about higher education legislation, college enrollment and retention issues, financial aid proposals and debt management issues for students.
