TWU TO HOST WINTER COMMENCEMENT CEREMONIES

The fall 2005 semester draws to a close Saturday and Sunday, Dec. 17-18, as Texas Woman's University hosts commencement ceremonies in Denton and Houston.

The Denton ceremonies, which include graduates from the Denton and Dallas campuses, are scheduled at 9 a.m., noon and 3 p.m. in the Kitty Magee Arena in Pioneer Hall. Receptions on the second floor of the Student Union will follow each ceremony.

The commencement ceremony for TWU's Institute of Health Sciences-Houston Center will take place at 2 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 18, in the Edwin Hornberger Conference Center.

TWU Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart will preside at each ceremony.

Approximately 515 undergraduate and 623 graduate degrees will be awarded during the Denton and Houston commencement ceremonies.

Times for the Denton commencement ceremonies reflect candidate assignments based on specific schools and colleges participating in the ceremonies. Ceremony I, at 9 a.m., is for candidates from the College of Arts and Sciences. TWU Regent Ken Ingram, senior manager for all public fund activity in the Dallas-Fort Worth market for Wells Fargo, will address graduates during the morning ceremony. Ceremony II, at noon, is for candidates from the College of Health Sciences and the College of Nursing. Congressman Pete Sessions, who represents the people of the 32nd Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives, will speak during the noon commencement. Ceremony III, at 3 p.m., is for candidates from the College of Professional Education. Dr. Lottye Brodsky, a TWU alumnus and president of Lottye Brodsky and Associates in Dallas, is the speaker for the afternoon ceremony.

State Rep. Martha Wong will address graduates during the Houston commencement ceremony. Rep. Wong has served State District 134 since 2003.

FIRST YEAR SUCCESS PROGRAM SEEKS MENTORS FOR SPRING

The First Year SUCCESS Mentoring and Advising Program is recruiting faculty and staff mentors to work with students during the spring semester.

TWU Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart congratulated the Denton, Dallas and Houston campuses on "the overwhelming success" of the 2005 State Employees Charitable Campaign. In a letter to the university community, Dr. Stuart wrote, "The phenomenal result of the campaign is a reflection of the steering committee's superb leadership abilities and the generosity of the TWU family — proof positive that 'together we care.' Thank you on behalf of those who benefit from your efforts." TWU raised a total of \$65,629 in 2005, exceeding its goal of \$55,000. The Houston Center raised \$3,160, with 23 percent participation.
