SMU Libraries

- •7 Physical libraries
- •3 Technical Services units
- •3 DDA plans
- •1 EBA plan
- Over 4 million volumes
- •Annual expenditures: ~\$4.8 million

A short history of DDA at SMU

- •Feb. 2011: SMU goes live with ebrary DDA
- •2012: SMU's Bridwell Library starts EBL DDA
- •Nov. 2013: SMU decides to switch to EBL as the preferred vendor for DDA
- •Dec. 2014: We add EBSCO as a manual-add DDA provider
- •Mid-2015: TexShare adds ProQuest SciTech ebook subscription
- March 2017: We start investigating JSTOR DDA
- •July 2017: We're switched from EBL/ebrary to Ebook Central
- •Jan. 2018: We turn off DDA due to budgetary shortfall
- •Nov. 2018: EBC/EBSCO DDA turned back on after detailed review
- May 2019: We go live with JSTOR DDA
- •July 2019: We go live with JSTOR EBA



One more adjustment...there. That's it.

Why change our setup?

- Attractive purchasing models
 - ProQuest Access-to-Own
 - More \$ goes toward purchase price, less on 1x fees
 - JSTOR Evidence-Based-Acquisition
 - Significantly expands selection pool, priced competitively
 - JSTOR DDA: No short-term loans (easier invoices)
- Familiar platforms
 - JSTOR DDA chapter level searching, DRM free
 - JSTOR: multi-publisher, more scholarly publishers, better alignment
 - Selectors have less time to do title-by-title selection



Let's see there...yes, worse than I thought.



1. Review approval & DDA profiles

- •We have DDA set up through GOBI. DDA is based on slip profile.
- Meet with each subject librarian to review current approval profile (LC ranges, auto-books, slips)
- Compile list of changes and send to GOBI
- Review and refine publisher list and send to GOBI
 - Find weird publisher names that allow GOBI to add any new publishers
 - AP Plus!
 - Generic Trade Press, Generic Assn Press, Generic UP, Generic ... Press

This looks pretty good!

2. Set up JSTOR DDA

- •Plan was to use our LC based approval profile with GOBI for JSTOR. Then we tried LCSH.
- •JSTOR does not class using LC but rather BISAC
- •Chose individual disciplines, focusing on only humanities and social sciences
- •Sent JSTOR a current ISBN holdings file to create a corpus of titles we do not yet have in print or electronic format that meets our discipline criteria
 - We broke their script. That took time to fix (theirs).



3. Create GOBI second profile to avoid duplication with JSTOR

- Send GOBI a list of the publishers we chose for JSTOR DDA
- •Limit profile to exclude any of the JSTOR DDA publishers from the humanities and social science areas in the JSTOR profile
- •GOBI should still profile DDA titles for ProQuest and EBSCOhost that are science related from the JSTOR DDA publishers

4. Set price limits and publication date ranges for each profile

- •Previously when manually limiting the DDA pool, subject librarians decided how many years back of content they want per discipline.
- •GOBI ProQuest EBSCOhost
 - Keeping the librarians' decisions in mind, no area asked for DDA content older than 10 years.
 - Went with 2010 to present after looking at the size of the DDA pool, total cost, and historical spend percentages

•JSTOR

- Similar methodology to GOBI
- Also compared with other comparable institutions corpus size and spend
- Pricing mostly stayed with previous limits of \$250 max per title

5. Review title lists from GOBI

- •We found more BL-BX's
- Books in German about multiple choice test design
- Books over the price cap

•New collections = new duplication! We got O'Reilly for Higher Education and realized we

needed to remove those too.

Find those stray theology titles!

6. Set up ATO – can we?

- •Send ProQuest list of profiled DDA titles from GOBI to see which are ATO eligible
- Confirm the ability to set-up ATO as our preferred purchasing method
- Confirm invoicing process
- Set up pricing caps within LibCentral directly

7. Update holdings with JSTOR for new corpus

- •About a year later from initial JSTOR corpus creation, send JSTOR a new ISBN holdings file
- •Receive and review list of possible DDA titles in the corpus
- •GO LIVE!
- •Ensure that we received the correct bib records and that the appropriate titles were activated

8. Monitor usage, invoicing, and spend over Spring semester

- •Creating PO lines and invoices manually was a good way to catch duplication and billing errors.
- •A spreadsheet was used to keep track of numbers of titles, loan and purchase costs, and subject areas, and to compare them across the various programs.

- •ATO had highest cost per title during Spring semester, while DDA had the lowest why?
- •Top 10 subjects: Applied physiology & wellness, History, Sociology, Education, Business, Psychology, Philosophy, Women's & gender studies, English, Political science

9. Adding JSTOR EBA through SCELC


- Spring 2019, SCELC offer for JSTOR EBA program
 - Access to about 42k backlist titles on the JSTOR platform
 - Very good pricing
- •Think about how this will work with our already set-up DDA program
- How to avoid more duplicate purchases through GOBI
 - Remove JSTOR platform as an option for ebooks
 - Communicate to subject liaisons
 - Keep ISBN holdings updated in GOBI

Lessons Learned

- •Talk to the technical contact, not the sales contact
- •There are so many ways to misunderstand each other. Communicate early and often!
- •Make sure the titles turned on are the ones you wanted

Roads we did not take

- •Single-vendor EBA: Too much money, too narrow subject focus
- •E-approvals in GOBI
- Moving away from GOBI for DDA





 - Title removals over price caps
- •Is managing DDA via GOBI a good idea for us in the long run?
- •How will all of this change with Rialto?
- •EBA still needs a maintenance plan
