The CFLE designation recognizes a broad, comprehensive range of issues constituting family life education. It acknowledges the preventive focus of family life education and assures that the designate has met or exceeded the high standards and criteria needed to provide quality family life education.

Filippenko was awarded the 2001 Guggenheim Fellowship, and was named the 2000 Professional Astronomer of the Year by the Astronomy Association of Northern California. Students voted him "Best Professor at UC Berkeley" in 1995.

He holds a bachelor of arts degree in physics from the University of California at Santa Barbara and a doctorate in astronomy from the California Institute of Technology. His work has appeared in 322 scientific publications.

The lecture series is made possible through a grant from The Templeton Foundation and the American Scientific Affiliation. Dr. Jack Sibley (philosophy) of TWU won the grant through The Templeton Science-Religion Course Award.

Sibley said the Templeton Foundation has a contest that offers a \$10,000 award for creating a course dealing with science and religion and having it become part of a university curriculum.
