TWU TO CONDUCT WINTER COMMENCEMENT DEC. 16 AND 17

Texas Woman's University awarded one degree during its first commencement ceremony in 1904. The university will reach a milestone during fall 2011 commencement ceremonies as the 100,000th degree is awarded.

The first degrees awarded by what then was the Girls Industrial College were the equivalent of junior college degrees. Baccalaureate degrees first were awarded in 1915. The first master's degrees were awarded in 1931, and the first doctorates in 1953.

Fall 2011 ceremonies are scheduled Friday, Dec. 16 and Saturday, Dec. 17 on TWU's Denton campus.

Students and family members who have tickets are invited to attend. The ceremonies, which include graduates from the Denton, Dallas and Houston campuses, will take place in the Kitty Magee Arena in Pioneer Hall, located on Bell Avenue. Receptions hosted by TWU Chancellor Dr. Ann Stuart will follow each ceremony on the second floor of the Student Union, located on the southwest corner of Bell Avenue and Administration Drive.

Approximately 782 undergraduate and 700 graduate degrees will be awarded during the ceremonies.

State Rep. Eric Johnson of Dallas (District 100) will deliver the commencement address for Ceremony I, scheduled at 10 a.m. Friday, Dec. 16. State Rep. Rafael Anchia of Dallas (District 103) will speak during Ceremony II, scheduled at 2 p.m.

Ceremony III will begin at 10 a.m. Saturday, Dec. 17, with Douglas D. Hawthorne, FACHE, chief executive officer of Texas Health Resources, addressing the graduates. Lori Palmer, CEO of Girls Incorporated of Metropolitan Dallas, will speak during Ceremony IV, scheduled at 2 p.m.

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TWU'S FOGG AND WILSON RECEIVE NATIONAL AWARD

Texas Woman's University's Niki Fogg and Jennifer Wilson are among only three nursing faculty in the nation to receive 2011 Novice Faculty Teaching Awards from the American Association of Colleges of Nursing (AACN).

Launched earlier this year, the AACN Novice Faculty Teaching Award recognizes excellence and innovation in nursing education by early career faculty at AACN member schools. Two awards are presented each year: one for didactic teaching and the second for clinical teaching. Ms. Fogg and Ms. Wilson are joint recipients for the clinical teaching award.

The AACN represents more than 670 nursing colleges and schools at public and private institutions nationwide.

"To have two of our nursing faculty recognized by this important national organization speaks to the quality and reputation of TWU's College of Nursing," said Dr. Patricia Holden-Huchton, dean of the TWU College of Nursing. "I know I join Ms. Fogg's and Ms. Wilson's colleagues in congratulating them for this prestigious honor."

Both Ms. Fogg and Ms. Wilson are assistant clinical professors at the Houston J. and Florence A. Doswell College of Nursing at the TWU T. Boone Pickens Institute of Health Sciences-Dallas Center.

In fall 2008, they assisted a TWU faculty team in developing a new child health competencies course. Using simulation and laboratory activities, they implemented innovative, student-centered teaching strategies to integrate theory and clinical practice, thereby encouraging clinical reasoning.

"I am grateful and proud to be part of a talented teaching team that is creative, supportive and diverse in clinical backgrounds," said Ms. Wilson, MSN, RN, CPN. "I attribute my success to their support and mentoring."

Ms. Fogg, MS, RN, CPN, said, "I think it is important to find new ways of facilitating learning in the clinical setting that is educational and enjoyable to students. As a novice educator, it is a privilege to work with such a wonderful team of experienced faculty in the TWU College of Nursing who are supportive of these educational innovations."
