## FALL FESTIVAL OF DANCE SET

The program in dance in TWU's department of performing arts will hold its annual Fall Festival of Dance at 8 p.m. on Fri., Nov. 22, and at 2 and 8 p.m. on Sat., Nov. 23, in Margo Jones Performance hall. The works of Master of Fine Arts and senior choreographers will be featured in all three performances. More than 10 dances will be featured, including:

- "Falling Angels," choreographed by graduate student Vanessa Sau Mui Cheung, which examines destructive tendencies and alienation among people;
- "Ascent to Glory," choreographed by Kathleen Dominiak, which is based on the existence of angels in people's lives on earth and their secret missions to help human beings understand and discover their own angelic qualities;
- Elusive," which explores the way in which people behave in relationships when they are protecting, sharing or discovering secrets;
- "The Slip Society," a satirical look at women and their femininity, choices in men, relationships with other women and the way in which they view their bodies;
- "Zip Pop Blitz!?\*@? Zip Zae," choreographed by Angie Dutton, examines acceptable and unacceptable social behavior;
- "Nature's Fury," choroeographed by Jill Belger, focuses on external and internal storms by looking at the qualities of a dancer's movement (which exemplifies the spiraling, rolling and pounding of storms);
  - "NEXT," a humorous look at how easily people are distracted in their relationships;
- "Sieve," choreographed by Sarah Imhoff-Jones, reflects the movement, manipulation, themes and development of dance; and
- "Translucent Shell," which addresses the internal struggle of solitude, confusion and pain in a shell of thoughts and insecurities.

# ITS ADVISORY COUNCILS HELP WITH PLANNING (4th in a series)

Because TWU faces new challenges in distance learning and instructional technologies, the office of information technology services was created by Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) to provide the university with support for the effective use of technology. Part of that effort includes the creation of several advisory councils that play a major role in providing planning ideas, priorities and feedback from the "user community." Those councils are described below.

■ Academic Advisory Council -- This group provides a direct means of communication between the technology committees formed in each academic component and ITS. This council's charge is to review and recommend priorities, policies and procedures related to the effective delivery of technology for the direct support of faculty and instruction. All formal recommendations and reports of the council are forwarded to the director of ITS and the vice president for academic affairs for review.

Its objectives are to review requests for technology and recommend priorities, based on availability of funds; to review and encourage migration to standards for hardware and software systems; to provide feedback from faculty to ITS related to service, training and other support issues; to work with the recommendations of the task force on evolving instructional technologies to help implement practical solutions and pilot programs; and to prepare an annual report on the state of technology for academic support at TWU and review the effectiveness of the council. - Web/Intranet Advisory Council -- The council, which reviews issues related to the explosive growth of Internet-based services, comprises three subcommittees: policies and procedures; design and development; and student Intranet development.
