

WINTER COMMENCEMENT SCHEDULED

The fall 2001 semester will draw to a close as commencement ceremonies take place Saturday, Dec. 15 in Denton and Sunday, Dec. 16, in Houston.

Students and family members who have tickets are invited to attend. The Denton ceremonies are scheduled at 9 a.m., noon and 3 p.m. in the Kitty Magee Arena in Pioneer Hall. Commencement speakers for ceremonies I, II and III, respectively, are Dr. Alice Hines, a TWU graduate and professor of English at Hendrix College in Conway, Ark.; Dr. Phyllis Bridges, a TWU professor of English; and Louise Kuehn Appleman, a TWU Distinguished Alumna and owner/principal of Appleman and Associates, a relocation consultants firm.

Times for commencement reflect candidate assignments, based on specific schools and colleges participating in the ceremonies listed below:

- 9 a.m. Ceremony I for candidates from the College of Arts and Sciences. A reception will follow from 9:30-11:30 a.m. on the second floor of the Student Center.
- Noon Ceremony II for candidates from the School of Occupational Therapy and the College of Professional Education. A reception will take place from 1:30-2:30 p.m. on the second floor of the Student Center.
- 3 p.m. Ceremony III for candidates from the College of Health Sciences, College of Nursing and the School of Physical Therapy. A reception will take place from 4:30-5:30 p.m. on the second floor of the Student Center.

The Houston commencement ceremony will take place at 2 p.m. Sunday, Dec. 16, in the Edwin Hornberger Conference Center in the Texas Medical Center. Bob Lanier, former mayor of Houston, will be the guest speaker. A reception will follow the ceremony.						
TWU Chancellor and President Ann Stuart will preside at each ceremony, which includes an academic procession, certification of degrees and a commencement address.

WEATHER INFORMATION PROCEDURES PROVIDED

When bad weather hits the Denton and Dallas areas, TWU faculty, staff and students can learn as early as 6 a.m. whether the university will be closed. (The Houston Center follows a separate procedure for that location.) Area radio and television stations carry information about closures after they are notified by the university.

After receiving weather and road condition information from John Erwin (public safety), Dr. Ann Stuart (chancellor's office) and Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration) determine whether a closure is necessary because of inclement weather. Dr. Floyd then notifies the news and information staff in the office of marketing and communication about the closure; they then call area news media to announce that the university will not be open due to bad weather. Faculty, staff and students should follow the procedures listed below when inclement weather is a threat.

Listen to or watch the following mass media outlets for information about closings or delayed openings: Charter Communications in Denton (channel 25) or Dallas-area stations WFAA-TV (channel 8), KXAS-TV (channel 5), KTVT-TV (channel 11), KDFW-TV (channel 4) or KXII-TV

(channel 12, Sherman/Denison). They also may tune to the following radio stations: WBAP (820 AM), KERA (90.1 AM), KRLD (1080 AM), KVIL (1150 AM) or KNTU (88.1 FM).

Please note: Radio stations can put information on the air more quickly and repeat it more frequently. Television stations take longer, based on the number of calls they receive.

Call the university's information line for weather closings. In Denton, call (940) 898-3430 after 5:30 a.m. In Dallas, call (214) 689-6631. In Houston, call (713) 794-2310.

The office of information technology services will post the announcement on voice mail, which each faculty and staff member can access from his or her home telephone. Each school, college, department or office is encouraged to designate one person who can call in and change the departmental/college/school/office message to indicate a closing or delayed opening for that day after he or she has verified the closing or delayed opening announced on TWU's weather line.

PROFESSOR'S CORNER SCHEDULED

Dr. David Anderson, an English professor at the University of North Texas, will present a discussion of Texas writer John Graves during Professor's Corner, scheduled from 7-8:30 p.m. at the Denton Public Library South Branch. The branch is located at 3228 Teasley Lane, just south of the Teasley/Lillian Miller intersection.

John Graves is one of Texas's best-loved writers. The presentation will focus on his background as a Texas writer as well as a Southern writer; his emphasis on the land and nature; and his continual interest in how humans interact with the natural world. The selection is from his book, *Hard Scrabble*.

The purpose of this monthly series is to provide area English professors and doctoral students an opportunity to share their special interests with the general public through informal presentations that allow for discussion. Monthly announcements are available

- Have been employed at least three consecutive months by the start of the spring 2002 term;
- Be a student in good standing if you previously have enrolled at TWU. New students must meet normal admission standards and should submit an application in addition to the scholarship request form, if one has not already been submitted.

The scholarship will pay \$250 toward one three-hour course. The course may be at the graduate or undergraduate level. Only one scholarship per person per semester will be awarded.

Scholarships will be awarded on a first-come basis. If a scholarship recipient withdraws from the course before the 12th class day, the scholarship must be repaid.

Scholarship request forms should be returned to Dr. Nicholas as soon as possible.

Dr. Ann Stuart (chancellor's office) invites the university community to join her for a holiday celebration Thursday, Dec. 6, from 11 a.m. until 12:30 p.m. in Pioneer Hall.

Dr. Mary Evelyn Blagg Huey will present "TWU Memories" from 12:15-1 p.m. Friday, Dec. 7, during the Courthouse Lecture Series on the second floor of the Denton County Courthouse-on-the-Square Museum. The presentation by Dr. Huey, TWU's seventh president, will conclude a yearlong series of lectures and exhibits celebrating TWU's Centennial year.

Dr. Carolyn Bednar and **Dr. Junehee Kwon** (nutrition and food sciences) recently were awarded a \$131,054 grant for a project titled, "Development of a Consumer Food Safety Education Program for WIC Participants." The grant from the U.S. Department of Agriculture is from a period beginning Sept. 15, 2001 and ending Sept. 30, 2003. The project proposes to assess food safety education needs of low-income women who are participants in WIC, a popular government-operated community nutrition program. Educational materials to be developed will include a videotape, interactive CD, training booklet and handouts. These educational tools will be field-tested with WIC participants to determine learning effectiveness.

Vince Thompson (intercollegiate athletics) has announced that the Student-Athlete Advisory Council is selling T-shirts to raise money for a college scholarship fund for the children of the September 11 tragedy. The shirts are white, cotton, long-sleeved shirts with four-color artwork on the front and back. The front includes a picture of the Statue of Liberty and an American flag with the phrase "Stand Beside Her." The back of the shirt reads, "TWU backs the red, white and blue." The shirts are available in the TWU Athletics office and at all Pioneer sporting events. The cost is \$20 for each shirt, with all proceeds going to the college scholarship fund for the children who lost a parent or guardian in the tragedy.
