#### FALL ENROLLMENT SETS RECORDS AT TWU

Texas Woman's University's fall enrollment of 14,179 students has set records for first-time freshmen – up 31 percent to 1,100 students – and Hispanic students, up almost 9 percent to 2,226 students.

These increases have helped the university exceed both its 2010 strategic plan goal of 14,000 students and the state's 2010 Closing the Gaps goal for TWU of 13,605 students. TWU also is nearing its 2015 Closing the Gaps goal of 14,873 students. The Texas Closing the Gaps campaign is an initiative aimed at significantly increasing the number of students enrolling in universities and community colleges in the state by 2015.

"Not only are we beating our own goals and the state's, we are retaining and graduating more students, providing Texas with the educated workforce it needs for continued growth and success," said Dr. Richard Nicholas, TWU vice president for student life

Enhanced recruitment efforts, increased marketing, additional scholarship dollars, community outreach and an influx of new high school graduates and community college transfer students are among the reasons behind TWU's record-breaking enrollment, Dr. Nicholas said.

Gary Ray, TWU's new associate vice president for enrollment services, praised the efforts of the TWU admissions team for helping the university increase enrollment by 6.3 percent over last fall. "They should be very proud of their work, because they have done an excellent job," Mr. Ray said.

Overall, enrollment is up in both undergraduate and graduate students, and at TWU's campuses in Denton, Dallas and Houston. More importantly, TWU's total semester credit hours are up 7.6 percent from last fall to 139,136 hours – also a record. Student credit hours, not headcount, determine a university's state funding.

The Texas Legislature created the SECC in 1993 for employees of state agencies, junior and community colleges and universities throughout Texas to donate to their favorite charities through an annual workplace giving campaign. SECC is the only statutorily authorized workplace campaign for state agency and higher education employees throughout Texas. Beneficiaries include local United Way agencies and other charities to which the employee donor can choose to direct his or her donated funds.
