

GOOD NEWS MARKS GREAT STRIDES!

Several academic programs at TWU recently received recognition either statewide or nationally for student achievements and quality. A list is provided below.

- *School of Occupational Therapy* -- The *Princeton Review* has rated TWU's School of Occupational Therapy among the best distance learning graduate schools in the United States. TWU's OT programs were profiled among the top 195 accredited graduate schools in the country.
- *Bachelor's and doctoral programs* -- *In Taking Women Seriously*, issued by the American Council on Education and printed by Oryx Press this year, has recognized TWU twice for producing *Who's Who* leaders in the U.S.....The university is among the top 10 baccalaureate institutions and doctoral institutions producing Latinas in *Who's Who*. The top 10 baccalaureate institutions, in alphabetical order are: Barnard College, Barry University, Bryn Mawr College, Incarnate Word College, University of Miami, New Mexico Highlands, Our Lady of the Lake University, Pomona College, Texas A&I University and TWU. The top 10 doctoral institutions are Barnard College, Barry University, Bryn Mawr College, Incarnate Word College, University of Miami, Our Lady of the Lake University, Pomona College, Texas A&I University, TWU and the University of Texas-Pan American.
- *College of Nursing* -- In January, the Board of Nurse Examiners for the State of Texas has granted continuation of full accreditation for TWU's nursing program. The board commended TWU faculty and administration for the performance of graduates on the NCLEX-RN examination for the 1998 examination year and also congratulated the program for obtaining continuing NLNAC accreditation until 2005. Also....The Texas Department of Health Breast and Cervical Cancer Control Program recognized TWU CARES Health Center with the Milestone Award during the first quarter of 1999. The award recognizes organizations that provided mammograms to the highest portion of women ages 50 to 64. TWU, a "small provider," won its category with 100 percent; the medium and large providers recognized were South Texas Hospital-Harlingen with 100 percent and Planned Parenthood of Cameron and Willacy Counties-

Harlingen with 93 percent.

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GO AHEAD...EAT MY DUST! (OR A TIRE...OR AN AXLE!)

It's that time again...when enquiring minds want to know, mechanical minds want to build and curious onlookers want to cheer them on -- "they" are racers in TWU's annual edible car contest during Engineering Week! The contest, scheduled Fri., March 5, pits mind over matter, angle with engineering and determination with imagination. Held for the first time last year, TWU's edible car contest involves designing, building and racing cars made from edible materials. The event, sponsored by Raytheon and the TWU department of mathematics and computer science, brings creativity, science and teamwork together with fun and learning in mind.

The contest will be held from 9:30 a.m. to 1 p.m., SC 207-208, including an awards luncheon; all car entries must be submitted to the judges by team members between 9 and 9:30 a.m. at that location. The registration deadline for a team to submit paperwork is Wed., Feb. 24; forms must be delivered to CFO 809 by 5 p.m. on that date or faxed to the department of mathematics and computer science at 8-1-2179. For aspiring racers, the rules are: each team must comprise three students -- at least one female student per team -- or university teams must have at least two TWU students. The team members will design and build a car using only edible materials (either raw or cooked/prepared foods -- but *all* foods must be edible for humans!). The final car must "look like" a car and may not exceed the following dimension: four inches wide (including wheels and hubcaps); four inches tall (including windshield, car roof, people, etc.); and 12 inches long (including front and rear bumpers and any other extensions). The car must operate on four rotating "wheels" and roll successfully down a ramp that is eight to 10 feet long and is inclined at an angle of about 20 degrees. (The car must be able to survive three runs down the ramp, if necessary.) The total cost for materials used to build the car should be estimated at less than \$10.

Judging will be done in three categories for the top three scoring teams: engineering design -- for correct size, total edible structure, variety of materials, rotating wheels, effective axle design and durability; creativity -- for the use of car accessories and attachments, overall attractiveness and degree of creativity; and speed down incline. Prizes will be presented at the awards luncheon.

SPRING "BRAKE" -- STOP TO LEND A HAND

Spring break, to many, means time to rest, relax and recuperate...so how can work play a part in TWU's spring break this year? An alternative proposed by TWU Helping Hands and the Center for Student

Development will provide an opportunity for students to visit the Texas Hill Country and learn about volunteer and community service. The trip is scheduled March 12 to 18 and the cost is \$70 per person, which helps pay for transportation, groceries purchased for group meals, plus expenses associated with an incentive activity on the last day of the trip. A deposit of \$25 (check or money order) is required by 5 p.m. on Fri., Feb. 19; no refunds on deposits will be made after that date. TWU staff and faculty -- or students, faculty and staff from other institutions -- may participate on a space-available basis. "Our alternative spring break will give students a chance to help others," explained Green. "When we travel to the Hill Country, we first will stay overnight at Heart 'O the Hills Camp at the invitation of our alumna, Jane Ragsdale, who operates the camp. (Her mother, Cathy Ragsdale, owns the camp and is a TWU distinguished alumna). "We are grateful for their support and look forward to our Sunday-night visit. Then we have a really busy -- but rewarding -- week in store. Our students voted on the geographic area that they wanted to visit, and then we set out to find community organizations that need help with projects this spring."

On Friday and Saturday, participants will stay in separate bunkhouse accommodations for women and men at the Texas Lions Camp; on Saturday, they will help Texas Lions Camp staff celebrate 50 years of service to the state's children. On Sunday, TWU students -- with members of Salvation Army visitation teams -- will socialize with and encourage patients and clients from area hospitals. On Monday, they will accompany underprivileged youth from Salvation Army boys and girls organizations to a major area attraction (either in San Antonio or Austin). They then will spend two days (Tuesday and Wednesday) building erosion dams on park trails in the Hill Country State Natural Area near Bandera. On Wednesday afternoon, participants also will accompany patients from Kerrville State Hospital to a St. Patrick's Day party on the grounds.

"The primary goals of TWU's alternative spring break trip this year are to demonstrate the meaning and impact of volunteer or community service and to have fun with other participants," added Green. "We urged everyone to sign up now!" (Note: Participants also should plan to bring \$50 for on-the-road meal expenses, plus additional money for souvenirs and other personal expenses. They also need to bring a bedroll with two blankets, sheets -- or a moderate sleeping bag, and pillow; bath towels and washcloths; and soap, shampoo and other toiletries.)

The workshop will provide participants with specific "how to" instructions for turning data into tables and figures that effectively communicate findings. Topics include: when to use figures or tables; what kinds of information should be placed in columns or in rows; how to footnote properly; how to make tables "stand alone"; how much data to include in tables; when to use different types of figures; how to properly size figures; and how to keep things simple -- don't mislead the reader. Cherry, who holds a doctorate in genetics from the University of California at Berkeley, has more than 20 years of experience in biomedical writing and publishing, including 15 years as a faculty member with the University of Texas; she also is a board member with the American Medical Writers Association.
