GENERAL ASSEMBLY KICKS OFF A NEW ACADEMIC YEAR

A filled-to-capacity auditorium in the MCL Building last Monday signaled the beginning of a new academic year for new and returning TWU faculty, as well as administrators, regents and the Faculty Senate during the 1998 fall faculty general assembly. Hosted by Dr. Basil Hamilton (psychology and philosophy), speaker of the Faculty Senate for 1998-99, the event provided participants with an overview of the year ahead, including comments from Sheila Whitaker-Kellagher, chair of the TWU board of regents; Dr. Carol Surles (president's office); Dr. Beverley Byers-Pevitts (academic affairs); and an upbeat musical reminder about the continuing need for TWU faculty and staff to support others through the State Employee Charitable Campaign.

At Hamilton's invitation, Kellagher welcomed the faculty and described the group as "...a faculty for all seasons." She congratulated those who had earned tenure, promotion or emerita/ emeritus status in the spring, and she stressed the need for every faculty and staff member to contribute to the university's enrollment by helping with the recruitment of new students and the retention of those already at TWU in class. Kellagher added, "Our students' experiences on campus are influenced by student life and also are based on their classroom interaction with faculty. Faculty, working with staff, give life to our university. You are the reason that students are in the classroom and will return in semesters to come."

After making several introductions, Surles discussed the need to increase faculty salaries and reported that those who had received "satisfactory" or above on annual performance reviews would receive a 1.5 percent increase this fall. She described it as "moderate" and said "...in 1994, I pledged to increase faculty salaries over a period of time, phasing them in to remedy deficiencies. Although our salary increase this year is modest, it will be the fifth one since my arrival."

Surles also updated the audience on progress for the university's strategic plan and noted a number of achievements that illustrate efforts by faculty and staff to achieve their goals, including literacy efforts and funding in the College of Education and Human Ecology; increased health care outreach in the College of Nursing (MCARES and TWU CARES Health Center, for example); national graduate program rankings in dance, occupational therapy and physical therapy; national honors in storytelling for the School of Library and Information Studies; advances and partnerships in distance education; and more.

She also announced that she would hold three "brown bag" open discussion lunches this fall -- Sept. 30, Oct. 28 and Nov. 24 -- and invited faculty and staff to attend and participate. Surles concluded her remarks with a brief discussion of shared governance, research, teaching and scholarly activity. "I invite you to become engaged. You have much of which to be proud, and TWU is vibrant," she said.

Byers-Pevitts introduced new faculty members (see separate story in TWU Update on page 2) and talked

about a "year of continuings and beginnings." She discussed problems associated with two disabled electrons in MCL (see separate article on page 6) and thanked faculty, staff and students in advance for their cooperation.

She shared a list of several accomplishments in each college and school and discussed enrollment management's plan to involve each area in efforts to recruit new students. Byers-Pevitts announced the addition of a new director of student outreach in the office of enrollment management -- Juanita Duenez-Lazo (formerly director of student activities) -- and partnering efforts with the division of student life as well. She added that the new advisory board for the School of Management met as a group for the first time last week; they set up a process and a timeline for the school, identifying the summer semester in 2001 as an operational date for the new school -- complementing the university's centennial celebration

Hamilton finished the program with some comments about the Faculty Senate. He identified three major issues facing the group this year: post-tenure review (already under review), merit pay (a proposal) and the annual faculty review framework. The TWU Daughters of the Pioneer prompted applause and toe-tapping fun with several songs designed to encourage giving for the SECC campaign, which will kick off Oct. 1 and continue through that month.

UPDATE ON TWU ATHLETICS

Seven members of the 1997-98 TWU softball team recently were recognized for their academic achievements and were named National Fastpitch Coaches Association All-America Scholar Athletes for maintaining a 3.5 or better grade point average. They were: Blaire Beaty (3.567 GPA); Karen Butterworth (3.818 GPA); Nickie Engelbrecht (3.655 GPA); Cathy Jacobson (3.704 GPA); Tiffanie Norris (3.571 GPA); Michelle Rogers (3.5 GPA); and Jamie Slagle (3.514 GPA). Jacobson, Norris and Slagle earned the award for the second consecutive year; each of the honorees is a kinesiology major, except Norris, whose major is mathematics/pre-engineering.

- TWU tennis coach Amy Ables (kinesiology/intercollegiate athletics) conducted a USA Tennis 1-2-3
 program on Aug. 29 to teach new players of all ages the basic skills of the sport. All proceeds went
 to the TWU Athletics Scholarship Fund.
- Four new assistants have been added to the staff, beginning this fall: Michael Burch, assistant volleyball coach; Bambi Ferguson, assistant basketball coach; Christy Johnson, assistant gymnastics coach; and Frank Ceresoli, assistant athletic trainer. The appointments were announced by Judy Southard.
- New admissions and season ticket pass prices were announced. Admission to all volleyball matches, basketball games and gymnastics meets in Pioneer Hall are \$4 for adults, \$3 for students and \$2 for children (ages 12 and under) -- a \$1-per-ticket increase, the first in 15 years. All TWU faculty, staff and students with valid ID may attend free. Season tickets include a five-event pass -- \$15 per adult, \$10 per student, \$5 for children age 12 and under; 15-event pass -- \$45 per adult, \$30 per student and \$12 per child, age 12 and under; individual season pass -- \$75 per adult, \$50 per student and \$25 per child, age 12 and under; season family pass -- \$125 (admits four persons to all TWU athletics regular-season events).
- The 5th annual Pioneer Golf Tournament benefitting TWU intercollegiate athletics scholarships will be held on Sat., Sept. 19, at the TWU golf course. The day begins at 8 a.m.; registration is \$75 per person and includes a number of contests and prizes. (More information will be provided in the Sept. 7 issue of TWU Update.)

TWO MCL ELEVATORS DOWN FOR THE YEAR

Following an elevator-shaft fire in TWU's MCL Building last June, two elevators are inoperable because the control systems for those units were destroyed. The overall process of restoring service in both elevators will take approximately one year, according to Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration) in a memo to all faculty and staff in August. "Restoring service is a very high priority for the university," said Floyd. "Nevertheless, we anticipate that the time for preparing the specifications, bidding the work and completing the work will be close to a year. We have contracted with an engineering firm to determine what repairs we need and to prepare the bid documents. We will do everything we possibly can to speed up the process."

She added, "We know that this is an incredible inconvenience for our students, faculty and staff, and we regret that there is no 'quick fix' for the problem. This situation will create a number of problems as students go to and from their classes. We ask for your cooperation as we assist students and make the opening of classes this fall run as smoothly as possible." Floyd provided a timeline for the project: design completion -- October 1998; contract award -- December 1998; construction completion -- December 1999.
