HOUSTON EXPLORES HEALTH CARE THROUGH LECTURESHIP

While the realm of medicine, managed health care and the health care industry in general are experiencing upheaval and debate, nursing and allied health professionals -- in both academe and in practice -- are affected as well. The College of Nursing at TWU's Institute of Health Sciences Houston Center has established a distinguished lectureship designed to explore the changing health care market by presenting experts in health care management, research and innovation to deal with the far-reaching consequences of those changes.

The new lectureship, held in conjunction with the Sigma Theta Tau Beta Beta International Nursing Honor Society's Founder's Day, will kick off on Wed., Nov. 11, with a presentation featuring Dr. Angela Barron McBride. She will discuss "Sustaining Optimism in Changing Times" from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. in MGJ 206; the program is free and open to all interested persons. During her discussion, McBride will emphasize personal and institutional strategies for maintaining both enthusiasm and a balanced perspective during turbulent periods. The guest speaker is a Fellow of the American Academy of Nursing, dean and distinguished professor at Indiana University and past president of Sigma Theta Tau. She currently serves on the advisory committee of the National Institutes of Health, Office of Research on Women's Health. She is the author of five books and has contributed to 40 others; she also has published extensively in both professional journals and general circulation magazines. McBride recently was elected as a member of the Institute of Medicine, National Academy of Sciences, and has received distinguished alumna awards from both Yale and Purdue universities.

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WOMEN'S STUDIES ENDOWMENT PART OF SENECA FALLS PROGRAM

Several programs are scheduled this week in conjunction with TWU's Seneca Falls celebration, including a look at who the leaders were in the early women's rights movement, how social work is part of that movement and how an effort has begun at TWU to raise funds for the creation of a new endowment in women's studies.

On Tues., Nov. 3, Dr. Brenda Phillips (women's studies) will discuss "Women's Rights Conventions of the 1850s" at 9:30 a.m. in ASB 306. Prior to the beginning of that presentation, Phillips will announce an opportunity for donors to help create the Nancy Johnson Coyle Endowment Fund. "The TWU women's studies program is honored to announce the establishment of its first scholarship fund for our

new Master of Arts degree in women's studies," she said. The fund has been established by her family in memory of the TWU student who died in late July 1998, following a long illness.

"The Nancy Johnson Coyle Endowment Fund also is the first named scholarship for a women's studies degree in the state of Texas and is an appropriate legacy for a memorable woman," added Phillips. Coyle, a native of Minneapolis, Minn., and a graduate of Denton High School, worked at the Denton Municipal Airport and Boeing Electronics; she married her husband, Doug, in the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods in 1990, and the couple lived in Sanger with several pets. (Doug currently is completing a master's degree in health studies at TWU.) She volunteered her time in the community as an instructor for the Denton chapter of the American Red Cross and was a member of the Missouri Genealogical Society and Immaculate Conception Catholic Church. "She was in the process of pursuing her degree at TWU when she took her first women's studies course," recalls Phillips. "Nancy is remembered by family and friends as a person with a sense of humor and as someone who was enthusiastic about what she learned in her class."

The second Seneca Falls program this week will feature a presentation on Wed., Nov. 4, titled "Women on the Move: God Helps Those Who Help Themselves....Celebrating the 100th Anniversary of the Profession of Social Work." The free event will feature Dr. Arlene Kaplan Daniels, emerita professor at Northwestern University and visiting professor in the department of sociology at the University of California at Berkeley. He has been a Fellow at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences and is a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, the American Psychological Association, the American Psychological Society and the American Association of Applied and Preventive Psychology. Before he joined BC, Lerner was a faculty member and held administrative positions at Michigan State University and Pennsylvania State University. He is the author or editor of 32 books and more than 250 scholarly articles and chapters.
