SENECA FALLS CELEBRATION KICKS OFF NEXT WEEK

TWU's primary mission is clear: to educate students, primarily women. Its mission in 1998 also is clear: to celebrate the sesquicentennial of the women's rights movement, which began at a convention in Seneca Falls, N.Y.

The TWU campus community -- by intertwining the university's mission and the rich history of the women's rights movement in America -- will honor women throughout 1998 and 1999, beginning with a multifaceted program by Dr. Darlene Clark Hine of Michigan State University. Hine, author of a number of works -- including A Shining Thread of Hope: The History of Black Women in America -- will speak on Tues., March 10, during the university's inaugural Seneca Falls celebration event. She will discuss "From Seneca Falls to the Civil Rights Movement" at 9:30 a.m. in the MCL auditorium. The event is free and open to the public. She also will read from her book at 2:30 p.m., again in the MCL auditorium, and will participate in a book signing after the program.

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) will welcome participants to the morning program, and Dr. Suzann Buckley (Arts and Sciences) will provide an introduction about the Seneca Falls celebration before Hine begins her presentation.

Hine also is scheduled to share lunch with TWU students, followed by a teleconference with faculty, staff and students in Denton, Dallas and Houston in the university's College of Nursing. The guest speaker has written about and edited widely on African-American history, particularly on black women in the nursing profession and in the Middle West. A Shining Thread of Hope is her newest book, and she has spent most of 1998 on a book tour.

Hine, who in 1993 edited an award-winning two-volume set titled *Black Women in America: An Historical Encyclopedia*, is the John A. Hannah Professor of American History at MSU; she accepted that post in 1987. In 1997, she served as the Avalon Visiting Distinguished Professor in American History at Northwestern University in Chicago and also was named the Harold Washington Visiting Professor at Roosevelt University in Chicago in 1996. Previously, Hine served as a visiting distinguished professor of women's studies at the University of Delaware. She was an administrator and interim director of the Africana Studies and Research Center at Purdue University, where she also was vice provost. She has held faculty appointments at Arizona State University and South Carolina State College. Hine earned her bachelor's degree from Roosevelt University and her doctorate from Kent State University.

Hine has authored six other books and more than 50 research articles on black history. She has received a number of awards for her books and publications, as well as the 1988 Otto Wirth Alumni Award for

Outstanding Scholarship from Roosevelt University and the 1991 Special Achievement Award from the
Kent State University Alumni Association. She has received grant support from the American Council of
Learned Societies, the National Endowment for the Humanities and other prestigious groups. For details,

Members of the TWU Opera Ensemble will be singing a different tune when they hit the stage at 8 p.m. on Thurs. and Fri., March 12 and 13, in Margo Jones Performance Hall. The 20-member group will perform a revue of Broadway show tunes, drawing on such productions as *Chess, Rent, Into the Woods, Once on This Island, Les Miserables, Nine, Closer Than Ever* and *Miss Saigon*. In turn, the concert has been dubbed *On Broadway*.

According to Joan Wall (performing arts, music), TWU Opera Ensemble director, the shift in focus represents a desire to underscore the abilities of ensemble members. BORDERS: IN, OUT AND THE ISSUES -- LEARN THE DYNAMICS

The Federation of North Texas Area Universities will present a timely program -- especially pertinent to institutions in Texas -- on "Border Studies: Dynamics of Inclusion and Exclusion" on Fri., April 3, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. at TWU. Presented jointly by TWU and the University of North Texas, the conference will feature Dr. Hernan Vera of the University of Florida at Gainesville and TWU alumna Dr. Rosario Torres Raines of the Institute for Higher Education Policy. Several speakers from TWU, UNT and other organizations will present concurrent sessions to broaden awareness of the issues of inclusion and exclusion in American culture today.

The cost to attend is \$49 per person for members of the general public who register by March 23; after that date, the cost is \$59. Faculty who are federation members may attend for \$15, and students who attend FNTAU institutions (TWU, UNT or Texas A&M-Commerce) may buy tickets for \$10 each. Luncheon tickets are available for \$10, and reservations for that event are due by Mon., March 23. The keynote addresses are titled "Crossing Borders" and "Transculturation: A Faculty Development Model on the United States-Mexican Border" by Vera and Raines, respectively. Vera, a professor of sociology at UF, received his early education in his native country of Chile; he then went to the University of Notre Dame, where he earned his master's degree in sociology and anthropology, and to the University of Kansas, where he received both his master's degree and doctorate in sociology. He has written and published a number of works in the areas of race relations, multiculturalism and poverty, and he has been honored by UF as Teacher of the Year, among other awards.

Raines, currently serving as Scholar in Residence at the Institute for Higher Education Policy in Washington, D.C., is working on the New Millennium Project through 1998, which seeks to fund higher education into the next century. She earned her bachelor's and master's degrees in sociology from TWU and completed her doctorate through federation programs at TWU and UNT. A professor of sociology at Texas A&M University-Kingsville, she teaches courses on U.S.-Mexico borderlands politics and economics, social welfare services and legislation, human behavior and social environment (social psychology), women's studies and sociological theories. Her presentations deal primarily with Mexican-American women, U.S.-Mexico immigration, maquiladoras, and the residential segregation of Mexican-Americans in Texas and California.

Concurrent sessions will include: "Border Trade" by Dr. David Molina, UNT; "The Militarization of the Border" by Rosalva Rosendiz, TWU; "Exile Communities" by Dr. Mahmoud Sadri, TWU; "The Homeless on the Border" by Vera; "Environmental Racism" by Dr. Jennifer Cutrer, Parkland Health and Hospital; and "Health and Safety Issues at the Maquiladoras" by Sister Martha Ojeda, the Coalition for Justice in Maquiladoras.

UPDATE ON TWU ATHLETICS

TWU intercollegiate athletics is challenging the Denton and university communities to break the school's attendance record in Pioneer Hall arena at the March 5 gymnastics meet against Winona State University. "We are asking people to take the 'Pioneer Challenge' and fill the arena," said Judy Southard (intercollegiate athletics). The current TWU attendance record of 525 was set at the Jan. 30, 1998, quad meet -- the first gymnastics competition held in the new facility. TWU students, faculty and staff will be admitted free; admission for the general public is \$3 for adults, \$2 for students and \$1 for children age 12 and under.

"TWU is proud to have a premier women's gymnastics program and one of the most outstanding facilities in the north Texas area," added Southard. "This (meet) is a great opportunity for everyone to see our
