MEDICAL RESEARCHER TO LECTURE ON RETROVIRUSES

The TWU Multi-Ethnic Biomedical Research Support program will present a free lecture at 3 p.m. on Fri., May 5, in CFO 205. Dr. James Hildreth, a renowned medical researcher, will present "Adhesion Molecules, Lipid Rafts and Human Retroviruses." The program is free and open to the public and members of the campus community.

Hildreth is an associate professor of pharmacology, molecular sciences and pathology and the associate dean of graduate student affairs at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine. In his research, Hildreth analyzes the cell-to-cell transmission of HIV and other viruses, and his team recently demonstrated that specialized regions of the cell membrane -- lipid rafts -- play critical roles in the biology of retroviruses.

PURCHASE ORDER INFORMATION UPDATED

In a recent memorandum from the controller's office, budget supervisors have been advised that all purchase orders now are mailed directly to vendors unless one of two exceptions is documented in the unprinted comments on the requisition screen:

- A request to expedite an order is faxed directly to the vendor (the purchasing department sends the fax, and the university office provides 1) the reason that mail time must be eliminated; and 2) the vendor contact name, phone number and fax number);
- A request to return the purchase order to the university department (the department must provide a reason why the purchase order cannot be mailed directly to the vendor by purchasing).

The change benefits TWU by helping to eliminate duplicate shipments by reducing the risk of duplicate order processing. For more information, call purchasing at 8-1-3585.

The team played seven games in two days during the Irving-based tournament, and team coach Dianne Baker (intercollegiate athletics) said, "I am extremely proud of every single player on this team because of the commitment and desire they showed. I truly believe they put themselves on the line to win this (tournament) and they put their hearts and souls into each play."

- Two members of the Pioneers softball team recently earned three first-team selections in the Lone Star Conference all-conference team selections. They are: Monica Romero, sophomore, first-team catcher (her second honor for that position); Sarah Dokie, junior and transfer student from El Paso Community College, first-team honors at utility and Newcomer of the Year. - 5) Basketball -- June 25-28, instructional camp for girls ages 10 and older who want to improve their basketball skills (commuter camper fee is \$200 and resident camper fee is \$275).
