The Texas State College for Women, a multi-purpose institution created by an act of the Legislature in 1901, formally opened its doors to students September 23, 1903. The aim of the state's university of women is to provide superior educational opportunities for its students in an environment adapted to their distinctive responsibilities of living as well as leadership in a society growing daily more complex.

The Texas State College for Women is fully accredited by all appropriate agencies, including the Southern Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools and the Association of Texas Colleges.

It embraces six component colleges:

College of Arts and Sciences College of Education College of Fine Arts College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation College of Household Arts and Sciences College of Nursing

The seventh and last major unit is the Graduate School, which correlates and coordinates the graduate sequences available in each of the component colleges. In addition to the usual Master's degree, TSCW offers advanced professional programs in several divisions, and doctoral degrees in the Household Arts and Sciences and in Health, Physical Education, and Recreation. - NOTE: By Texas law, out-of-state girls add an additional \$50.00 tuition each semester. This sum is payable at registration.

You will take your meals in the large airconditioned Central Dining Hall where food is served cafeteria style so that you may choose what you like.

TSCW is in the Dallas-Fort Worth metropolitan area. These cities offer many additional cultural and social advantages as well as laboratory facilities in Nursing, Public Health Training, Social Welfare, Merchandising, Fashion, Art, Music, Radio, Television, Speech Therapy, Recreation Administration, Occupational Therapy, etc.

A survey has shown that TSCW graduates marry earlier with greater permanence than do women graduates of coed institutions.

Education Philosophy and Psychology

High School graduates are urged to consider teaching as a profession. For years to come, this will be one of the most rewarding and attractive professions in American life. Rewards will be especially great to those who enter the profession not only with the technical training but also with the leadership-scholarship traits that are a special product of TSCW.

The teacher preparation work by the TSCW College of Education provides a superior liberal arts background . . . you learn both what you will teach and how to teach.

Specialized sequences are offered in General Education, for students who select Education as an academic or cultural subject; Kindergarten-Primary, to prepare you to teach in the kindergarten and primary grades; Upper Elementary, to prepare teachers for these grades; Secondary, to prepare teachers for positions in high school; Special Education for Exceptional Children, meeting the requirements for the special certificate in the field; Education for the Deaf; Counseling and Guidance Education: Philosophy, and Psychology for those interested in academic psychology as such and those desiring professional training in one of the applied fields of psychology.

Model demonstration schools on the campus and off-campus public schools give laboratory experience.

TSCW graduates are sought by schools throughout the state and nation; their records as teachers are unsurpassed.

Art

Household Arts and Sciences (Home Economics)

Biggest, best, oldest, most advanced degrees, most graduates--all these describe the TSCW College of Household Arts and Sciences.

Any girl planning to study home economics should consider the facilities and opportunities at TSCW.

Objectives of this division are twofold: to train you for better personal and family living, and to equip you for rewarding careers in the home economics fields.

TSCW had the first organized curriculum for home economics in Texas and one of the first in the nation. It is one of the four in the nation offering the Doctor of Philosophy in subject matter fields of home economics.

The major curricula that will prepare you for the varied rewarding careers are: Child Development and Nursery Education, Clothing and Costume Design, Textiles and Textile Technology, Foods and Nutrition, Home Economics Education, Home Demonstration, Institution Management, Home Economics and Journalism, Home Economics and Speech, Home and Family Life, Home Management, Housing and Household Equipment. Laboratories for all courses are most modern and com-

This TSCW division has a new fourstory building, plus a large separate building for its extensive research. The second building houses the Nelda Chiders Stark Laboratory for Human Nutrition Research. which contains a large portion of the nation's material on this vital subject.

You will observe and profit by the rich and continuous program of research in many of the problems of the home.

The facilities for research include the laboratories for human nutrition research, and for nutrition studies using experimental animals; modern laboratories for experimental cookery and food analysis; textile and clothing laboratories equipped for advanced study, including a constant temperature and constant humidity research laboratory; laboratories for the study of detergency which are unique in many respects; laboratories for study of household materials and equipment; a nursery school; and facilities for measuring the effectiveness of teaching techniques and procedures.

Health Service

TSCW maintains a health service, which gives a health examination to every new student and which provides medical treatment and care at the College Hospital, staffed by a full-time resident woman physician and a corps of professional nurses.

This free health examination is given through the cooperative efforts of personnel of the Hospital staff, the faculty of the College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation, and the faculty for Corrective Speech.

The health record for each student received from her home physician is examined by the college physician, and each student is given posture, height-weight, vision, and hearing tests. Individual conferences follow.

The health examination and daily supervision of deviations from normal health in the physical education classes are augmented by health instruction for all freshman and sophomore students in these classes. Such instruction is based on scientific knowledge pertaining to healthful patterns of living and is related directly to the needs and interests of college wo-

Students are urged to maintain good health at all times and are advised to seek medical attention promptly when such attention is indicated.

Health, **Physical Education** and Recreation

The professional opportunities for TSCW students preparing for leadership in Dance, Health Education, Physical Education, Recreation and Recreation Therapy are not excelled by any other college or university in the country. Many graduates go directly into college teaching.

The College of Health, Physical Education, and Recreation also offers an allaround program of fun and recreation for all TSCW students. TSCW students are recognized for their good posture, correct walk, personal charm.

Facilities include indoor and outdoor pools, large sports fields and areas, an 18-hole golf course, outing and camping areas. The most modern and complete Gymnasium for women in the state now is under construction.

You may select courses leading to skills for leisure time in a wide variety of activities, including all forms of Dance (Ballroom, Folk, Modern, and Tap); Individual, Dual, and Team Sports; all phases of Aquatics, including Swimming, Diving, Water Safety, Boating, Canoeing, Life Saving and Water Ballet; Corrective and Restrictive Exercises for postural defects; Body Conditioning, with emphasis on beauty of line and proportion, and Modified Sports including Archery, Bowling, Colf; and Health Instruction adapted to the needs and interests of young college women with the emphasis upon the physical, mental, social, emotional, and spiritual aspects of a vibrant quality of good

There are clubs for every girl, whether beginner or expert. These include the Modern Dance Group, which tours the Southwest each year; Caperettes, Water Ballet, Rifle, Tennis, Colf, Basketball, Softball, Badminton, Archery, Fencing, Bowling, etc. There is both inter-dormitory competition and matches with other colleges

health

Graduate degrees, including the doctorate, are given.

Bible and Religion

You may elect Bible in any group of courses not to exceed twelve semester hours of credit. A major in this subject is not offered.

Bible Chairs are maintained by the Texas Methodist Student Movement, the Baptist Church of Texas, and the Presbyterian Church. The instruction given, however, is entirely non-sectarian and aims to secure for the student the benefits to be gained from a broader culture and a deeper spiritual life.

TSCW is widely known for its wholesome spiritual climate. Students conduct non-denominational services each Sunday in the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods and the weekly vesper services in the dormitories. They also participate extensively in the work of the Denton churches.

History and Government

The TSCW History and Government Department in the College of Arts and Sciences gives students a background for present-day thoughts, and problems, and an understanding of how they developed.

The members of the department sponsor the International Relations Club and the Campus League of Women Voters for students interested in current affairs and as a training for leadership in community life.

There are excellent library facilities for the study of History and Government, including files of magazines and periodicals, books relating to the field, and special collections.

Graduates have become teachers, government career workers, or used the courses as background for prepaartion for Law, Library, Science, Journalism, etc.

English

The TSCW English Department in the College of Arts and Sciences specializes in developing the individual student through a program uniting literary training with creative activities.

During your first two years you will concentrate upon the achievements of mankind in the humanities, the arts, philosophy, science, mathematics, and the social sciences, learning to think in these fields and to express yourself effectively in both written and oral communication.

Special features include the Writer's Conference directed annually by a writer of national distinction, the Freshman Writers' Program, the English Honors Session for upperclassmen, and the English Workshop on Current Trends in English (summer session) for teachers and advanced students.

You also will have opportunity to publish your literary work in The Freshman Writer and the Daedalian Quarterly, the TSCW literary magazine. TSCW's courses in English rank with the best nationally.

Library Science

TSCW has both a four-year and a five-year degree in Library Science. As an undergraduate you may either major or minor in Library Science; the fifth year is a professional program leading to the Master of Arts or Master of Library Science degree.

TSCW is one of the few institutions in the South offering the M.L.S. degree. A new Library Science Building now under construction will be the only one of its kind in the nation.

Mathematics

The demand for women trained in mathematics for industrial, civil service, and teaching positions far exceeds the supply, and the salaries are good. For example, oil and aircraft companies use an increasing number of computers each year. The Mathematics Department in the College of Arts and Sciences at TSCW prepares you for these positions and also for further study in the field of mathemat-

ics.

Library Science is another field in which TSCW leads; educators say that approximately half of all the librarians in The department is fully accredited by the American Library Association and offers the courses that will give you the thorough preparation so many schools and

A student who majors in mathematics has time to round out her education by taking courses in other departments.

Chemistry and Physics

The Departmnts of Chemistry and Physics are excellently equipped and well staffed to train students in the phyiscal sciences.

Three distinct degree programs are offered in Chemistry, preparing you for: (1) research positions or analytical or technical work in industrial, government, or university laboratories; (2) technical secretarial or librarian positions in the chemical industry; (3) and teaching science in secondary schools.

One degree program is offered in Physics, of particular value to those who wish to teach or carry on industrial work. The TSCW curriculum in General Science is well suited for the girl wishing

to prepare for an engineering career. Our country needs scientifically trained women. TSCW offers the best of such training.

Foreign Languages

The Foreign Languages Department in the College of Arts and Sciences offers excellent class instruction, with emphasis on the ability to speak and understand the language.

A variety of advanced courses enable you to choose those best adapted to the career you wish: courses in commercial Spanish for majors in foreign trade, for example; courses on cultural lines to prepare for research and advanced studies.

The Foreign Languages Laboratory is well equipped with special machines, records, and materials that will give you oral training as well as ear training. Many students also enroll in special

conversation classes. Majors are in French, and Spanish; other courses in German and Portuguese.

Biology

You can train thoroughly and soundly in the Biological Sciences at TSCW. Medical technologists educated here are in great demand, as are women biology teachers. Many TSCW pre-medical students have distinguished themselves as physicians. Research laboratories welcome women biologists, as shown by the records of TSCW graduates.

Frequent requests also come for graduates from departments of public health. Medical art, combining Biology and Art, is another career field to be considered.

The courses of the Biology Department in the College of Arts and Sciences also provide sound basis for graduate study.

Nursing

Your completion of the four-year program provided by the TSCW College of Nursing, in cooperation with Parkland Memorial Hospital means that you are assured a career for life . . . opportunities in Nursing are limitless.

The program of the TSCW College of Nursing is pointed toward the development of a superior professional nurse. You receive the best preparation in the techniques of your profession, and at the same time learn to act intelligently and effectively as a citizen and leader in your community.

The program combines the finest teaching with the finest of physical resources. After enjoying for 11 months the facilities of TSCW, you receive, in the next two and one-half years, the major part of your professional instruction in the new \$11,000,000 plant of the Parkland Memorial Hospital in nearby Dallas. The proximity of this magnificent teaching hospital to the TSCW campus allows full integration of your program and continuous participation in many campus activities. While at Parkland, the expenses for room, board, uniforms, medical care, hospitalization, and laundry are borne by the hospital.

In your fourth, or senior year, you will return to the TSCW campus for a final semester and join your class to receive your Bachelor of Science degree in the regular June Commencement. Thus, within four calendar years, you will meet all requirements for your baccalaureate degree and for your professional nursing program and be ready to take the examinations of the State Board of Nurse Examiners.

New classes will be registered in September, and registration is limited to 100 students. It is suggested you apply for admission as soon as possible.

Journalism

TSCW Journalism students receive thorough professional training which qualifies them for good positions; graduates are sought by newspapers, magazines, radio-TV stations, advertising agencies, department stores, and public relations firms.

Typical positions now held by last year's graduates, include feature writer, Texas daily; reporter, large Mid-West daily; advertising and promotion, large Texas department store; assistant editor of magazine (at first in Dallas, now in New York City); copywriter, Texas advertising agency; assistant public relations director, Texas college, and radio-TV work, Texas advertising agency.

Students publish The Daily Lass-O, only women's college daily newspaper, as part of their journalism work. The Journalism Building has complete facilities for photography, advertising, typography, and news and feature courses.

The studentes have their own engraving machine, for example, and learn to do any or all of the work in the College Press. located in the building. There is a full leased United Press teletype service.

The department sponsors the Texas High School Press Association, which convenes annually at TSCW. More than 100 high schools send delegations.

As an indication of the quality of journalism work at TSCW, the department was one of the first in the nation to be accredited by the National Council for Education in Journalism. TSCW cooperates with the Texas Daily Newspaper Association in the latter's summer internship program, a plan which gives outstand. ing junior students a summer's work on leading Texas daily newspapers.

Career fields are News Writing and Editing, Advertising, Home Economics Journalism, and Radio-TV-Journalism.

Occupational Iherapy

TSCW is the only college in the Southwest offering undergraduate training in Occupational Therapy.

This is an important field to be considered, since the American Occupational Therapy Association reports a need for 6,-000 additional trained persons. (TSCW has just issued a new bulletin explaining this field and its career opportunities. Write for your copy.)

The major at TSCW was set up more than 10 years ago according to the plan of the American Occupational Therapy Association and the American Medical Association and has continued with their approval. The program is affiliated with the Southwestern Medical College in Dallas, which supplies the medical lecturers.

The training at TSCW consists of courses in the theory of occupational therapy, basic sciences, various medical subjects, psychology, and design and crafts. Music, drama, and sports games often play a big part in the healing process, and you will take part of your work in divisions offering such courses.

Sociology

The student who majors in Sociology in addition to obtaining a broad background in general education essential for citizenship and community participation, generally selects one of a number of professional goals and plans her course of study to prepare her for that objective.

The principal vocational goals which a major in Sociology may lead are: (1) commercial and industrial work where a fundamental knowledge of human relations is required; (2) social work, which includes family case work, child welfare, probation work, child guidance, clinics, school social work, and social work with the handicapped in children's institutions and homes; (3) religious work: directors of young people's work, directors of religious education, pastor's assistants, etc.; (4) social welfare, which includes group work, public welfare, and work with other health and welfare agencies and institutions; (5) teaching sociology or social science at either the high school or college level.

The Sociology Department in the TSCW College of Arts and Sciences has sequences of courses covering all of these careers.

Speech

Exciting careers in Speech arts and sciences develop from study at TSCW.

The Speech Department in the College of Arts and Sciences emphasizes study and practice in Dramatics and Interpretation, Radio, Television, Speech Teaching, and Speech Therapy.

At the TSCW radio station you will obtain experience in all phases of radio writing, programming, performing and managing.

You will do professional radio and televison work in the studios of and KRLD-TV, in nearby Dallas.

TSCW also leads in Speech Therapy work in Texas. Your clinical experience will include work in the Denton Public Schools, the TSCW Speech Clinic, the Dallas Cerebral Palsy Clinic, Shadybrook School for Exceptional Children, Pilot School for the Deaf in Dallas, and the Fort Worth School for the Deaf. This work at TSCW has highest clinical certification

Other departmental features include a College Theater, an air-conditioned Theater-in-the-Round, a Children's Theater, student recitals, story hours and student teaching.



Your First Year At TSCW

Just as important as the first step you took in your life or your first date--will be your first year at college. When you decide to attend Texas State College for Women, what will your first year be like?

Before class registration begins in the fall, you will take part in Orientation meetings. The purpose is two-fold: to acquaint you with TSCW and to give the College information about you and your capabilities. In reality, Orientation continues throughout the entire first week, with social gatherings and all-college affairs schduled each night. There are also tests-not entrance tests; you have already been admitted to the College by the time you arrive on the campus. The results of these tests help your advisers place you to your best advantage and ability in courses if you are undecided as to what line of study to pursue.

You will discover that college will be quite different from high school. You will not be in class steadily from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m. daily, nor will your schedule follow the same pattern.

You will find that some of your classes met only once or twice a week while others, such as typing and shorthand, may meet five times. You will be in class (if you have a typical schedule) from 16 to 25 hours a week, depending upon the number of laboratory courses in which you have enrolled.

A typical freshman schedule may include 8:15, 9:15 and 10:15 classes on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, one or two classes on alternate days and perhaps a laboratory one afternoon a week. So, you see, you will have ample time for the study which will be required and for recreation and extra-curricular activities.

There are many interesting extra-curricular activities. If you like sports, you may join the Aquatics Clubs, Modern Dance Club, or any of the Women's Recreation Association teams such as fencing, tennis, canoeing, riflery, golf, and the many others. If you are musically inclined, there are other groups: for singers, the Modern Choir, Singing Stars, and Chorus; for musicians, the Symphony Orchestra, Serenaders, and the Band. There are organizations for every activity. In addition to these, Regional Clubs, Departmental Clubs and Honorary and Professional Fraternities are open for active participation. The life of a TSCW girl is a wholesome balance of study, activities and fun.

The TSCW General Catalogue lists courses available in the various divisions of the College. In general, first semester courses for freshmen are numbered 111. 121, 131, and 141. The first number of each indicates the course is for freshmen. the second gives the number of semester hours credit, and the third indicates whether the course is offered the first or the second semester. For example, you would study English 131 during your first semester and English 132 during your second semester. You would receive three semester hours credit each semester, a total of six in your first year of English study.

Th normal course load is 16 semester hours, plus physical education. Firstyear students also take the unique onehour orientation course in Personality and also may select an hour of applied music, choral speaking, modern dance, freshman drama, home economics, French or Spanish. You must take at least 12 semester hours unless the Dean of the College gives you special permission to carry less.
