


ART BUILDING

Of all the new buildings, this is the largest—it covers almost a city block. Inside its walls are the best modern facilities to insure superior training in physical education for each of us.






SCIENCE BUILDING

BRALLEY MEMORIAL LIBRARY




HOUSEHOLD ARTS AND SCIENCE BUILDING

In charting the courses of the future we shall need, and depend upon, the same unswerving devotion to your alma mater that you showed in residence at TSCW as members of the Class of 1956.



About Becoming Educated

Here is the part of living at TSCW that increases our desire for knowledge, prepares us for our chosen careers, and keeps us up long past midnight on the night before a blue-slip quiz. Here, neatly categorized according to colleges and departments, is a reflection of our academic life during 1955-56.

But the categories are for the sake of convenience only. Although we major in one department, and identify ourselves with it, we are the products of many departments, and much of our most important knowledge comes as a result of required courses and electives in fields other than our major. When we study in a department, we become part of it and it part of us. The pictures on the following pages will remind each of us of many varied classroom experiences throughout our years at TSCW. It was with this goal in mind that the Colleges section was planned and produced.

TSCW has six colleges — those of Arts and Sciences, Fine Arts,

Education, Health, Physical Education and Recreation, Household Arts and Sciences, and Nursing—and the Schools of Library Science and Occupational Therapy. These divisions are relatively new; they were set up only last year. They are a graphic example of the evolution of our college into a State University for Women. Just as these eight divisions are integrated into a University, so our courses, selected from different departments in the Colleges, are integrated into an educational whole that stresses both professional training and a liberal arts background.


College of Health, Physical Education and Recreation




Teen-Age Nutrition Study

This fall the results of an exhaustive teen-age nutrition study, conducted by Dr. Pauline Beery Mack, dean of the College of Household Arts and Sciences, and a corps of TSCW research scientists, were announced to an audience that was nation-wide in its extent. The monumental study was begun three years ago when a hundred TSCW students were chosen as "guinea pigs" and placed on special diets. Scores of tests, to determine each girl's general physical condition before and after the experiment, were also part of the procedure.

The pictures here were taken at different stages of the study. At top are Dean Mack and President Guinn studying the many books of figures that reveal the scientists' findings. The girl in the middle picture was a "guinea pig" for the experiment and is being tested for basal metabolism. 

A large freshman nursing class at TSCW this year is visible insurance of the growing success of the College of Nursing.






School of Library Science


SENIOR BREAKFAST











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
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SHIRLEY ABBOTT

ring of white and yellow gold for her fiance.




JO ANNE BOYD




We all got back into the swing of Blue Jean Night at the UB on Tuesdays

The Dallas Symphony Orchestra


The Dallas Symphony Orchestra gave the first Concert and Drama program of the school year and opened its own season when it played for a large and enthusiastic audience here on November 11.


Herbert Philbrick
