The award consists of a diploma and a \$100 check. The abstracts for presentations are published in the *Texas Journal of Microscopy* (www.texasmicroscopy.org). Other TWU student presentations included Dibyendu Dutta, a graduate student mentored by Dr. Mills, presenting "Effects of different fixatives on TUNEL staining in rat testes" (Gladis Shuttlesworth and Nathaniel Mills, additional authors) and Pearly George, an MBRS undergraduate research student in Dr. Maier's laboratory, presenting "Effects of mulberry dimorphism on the structure and properties of silk" (Camelia Maier, additional author).
