CONGRATULATIONS -- SECC A SUCCESS!

The spirit of charitable giving definitely has taken root at TWU as the 1997 State Employee Charitable Campaign has drawn to a close. Not only did faculty and staff again meet their goal in 1997, but they also topped giving for last year's campaign as well. "We want to congratulate everyone who participated in the SECC effort this year," said Dr. Joyce Williams (sociology and social work) and Elizabeth Snapp (library), co-chairs for this year's campaign. "As of Friday (Oct. 31), our SECC had raised \$27,286." Last week, the amount rose to more than \$31,000.

"We are extremely pleased to have surpassed our goal of \$24,000 this year," said Williams, who added that faculty and staff had surpassed last year's contributions which totaled more than \$27,000. "Everyone should be proud of their efforts. The SECC signifies an important way in which we can give back to the communities in which we live. Helping others who have a variety of needs is critical to our communities, and TWU is proud to be an important part of that process."

A special tree planting ceremony celebrating TWU's successful campaign will be held on Mon., Nov. 24, at 2:30 p.m. between ASB and GRB. Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) will attend, and members of the 1997 SECC steering committee are donating a plaque which will read: "TWU: A Caring, Planning and Giving Community -- SECC 1997." Members of the physical plant also are building a small stand for the plaque. Dr. James Galloway (library), a member of the steering committee, had pledged to donate a tree for the ceremony when TWU met its SECC goal this year. OUTSTANDING GRADUATE STUDENT NOMINATIONS NEEDED

"The purpose of the awards is to honor at least one TWU master's student and one doctoral student for excellence in scholarship and service," said Donna Ryan (alumni relations). To be eligible, students must be projected to graduate in December 1997, May 1998 or August 1998 (the 1997-98 academic year), and they must have an overall minimum grade point average of 3.50. At the master's level, a nominee must document an approved thesis prospectus, a professional paper topic or -- in the performing arts -- a projected required graduate professional presentation. At the doctoral level, a nominee must document an approved dissertation prospectus or -- in the performing arts -- a projected required graduate professional presentation.

Criteria considered for award selection include: graduate grade point average; three letters of reference that address professional accomplishments and potential; a statement of professional goals; professional presentations, performances or exhibits; publication in professional journals; professional societies, university committees or student associations; volunteer or other work experience; and other services to profession, school or community.

Send letters of nomination to Dr. Rose Nieswiadomy (Nursing, Dallas) in care of the TWU National Alumnae Association, by Dec. 15. Graduate students may nominate themselves or their peers. CHEROKEE CULTURE IS FOCUS OF PROGRAM AT TWU

Serving as the only physical therapist for the Cherokee Nation, Walisi Bowen has experienced Native American culture through her patients -- and through her own family life. Bowen, herself Cherokee by birth, will speak at TWU on Thurs., Nov. 20, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m., SC 207, as the university observes Native American Month. The program, which is free and open to the public, is sponsored by TWU organization Native Pride, SOAP (Student Organization for Activities Programming) and the office of intercultural services. A reception will follow the event on SC 2.

"Walisi Bowen's presentation will include an informative look into the Native American culture, both past and present," said Juanita Duenez-Lazo (student activities). "Our speaker, who holds a master's degree, will address a number of topics during her visit at TWU." Those topics will include the changing roles of women in the traditional Cherokee culture; challenges Bowen faced as she became a physical therapist; the speaker's experiences as a physical therapist with the Cherokee Nation; traditional Native American regalia descriptions and explanations; some differences in Native American tribes; clans and family systems of traditional Cherokee society; and a description of balancing traditional Cherokee culture with Caucasian culture.

Bowen served as Miss Cherokee, a prestigious title for the Cherokee people and a title which she held while the tribe was under the administration of Chief Wilma Mankeller, the first woman chief of her tribe. The guest speaker has lectured and made a number of appearances to promote Native American culture,

and she continues to stay involved in her own culture through activities such as dancing at both Pow
Wows and the spiritual stomp grounds of the Cherokee people. She also participates in a number of
banquets and receptions held by dignitaries of the Cherokee Nation. For more information, call ext. 3611.
