JOINT CONCERT RINGS IN THE HOLIDAY SEASON

The sound of bells, percussion instruments, flutes and song will blend during a seasonal concert at TWU on Mon., Nov. 24, featuring the TWU Concert Choir and Flute Choir. The concert, which is free and open to the public, will feature folk, holiday and traditional choral music at 8 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Directed by Dr. Thomas K. Brown (performing arts, music), the TWU Concert Choir will be accompanied by Julia Nelson. Dr. Pamela Youngblood (performing arts, music) will direct the TWU Flute Choir.

Selections by the Flute Choir, which will open the pre-Thanksgiving concert, will include the newly-published work "Simple Gifts," arranged by Ricky Lombardo; "Greensleeves Fantasia," arranged by Anne McGinty; and John Wheeler's lively setting of A. Liadov's "Round Dance." The group also will perform "Variations on a Pastoral Theme" by Kathleen Mayne and "Christmas Fantasy," arranged by Ed Dickinson.

Selections highlighting the TWU Concert Choir's performance will include the haunting Appalachian folk song "Every Night When the Sun Goes In," arranged by Suzanne Paterson; "John's Gone to Hilo," arranged by Michael Neaum; and Aaron Copland's American favorite, "Zion's Walls." Another selection will feature a French folk song "J'entends le moulin," sung in French, set by Canadian composer Donald Patriquin.

Other choral selections will include the 16th-century "Salvum mea fac Deus" by M. Tornioli; Orlando di Lasso's "Musica est Dei donum optimi"; Douglas Wagner's setting of "My Love Is Like a Red, Red Rose"; "Think on Me" by James Mulholland; and John Leavitt's "A Jubilant Song."

The closing selection for the Monday evening concert will ring in the holiday season when both choirs perform "Caroling, Caroling" by Alfred Burt; "Night of Silence" by Daniel Kantor; "Masters in This Hall," arranged by James McKelvy; and a perennial favorite, "Ding Dong! Merrily on High," arranged by David Willcox.

The TWU Concert Choir, comprising music and non-music majors, has a long history of performing choral masterworks with the Men's Chorus at Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary in Fort Worth. The group also has sung at the Myerson Symphony Center with the Women's Chorus of Dallas and at the Southwestern Division conference of the American Choral Directors Association as a featured choir. They will perform in February 1998 for the Southwestern Division conference of the Music Educators national conference, and they are planning an out-of-state tour next year as well.

The TWU Flute Choir frequently performs for community organizations, such as the Women's Shakespeare Club and Denton Regional Medical Center, in addition to programs on campus. The group -- only in its fourth season -- was selected as the outstanding undergraduate ensemble at the Texas Flute Society's annual festival in May 1997. UPDATE ON TWU PEOPLE

Dr. Rose Spicola (reading and bilingual education) was honored by TWU faculty members and her peers in the education community during the 32nd annual Fall Forum in Reading. Spicola, Cornaro professor emerita, co-founded the forum, which was renamed the Rose F. Spicola Forum in Reading. A special proclamation was signed by Dr. Carol Surles (president's office).

The TWU Multi-Ethnic (formerly Minority) Biomedical Research Support (MBRS) program was represented by faculty and students from Denton at the 1997 National Minority Research Symposium in New Orleans, La., in October. MBRS undergraduate student Vilma Garza (chemistry) presented research findings as first author of a poster titled "Synthesis of Bisand Trisamidoximes"; the poster was co-authored with C. Cavallo, Dr. James Johnson (chemistry and physics), and S. Bott from the University of North Texas. TWU's MBRS program also sponsored graduate student Nora Morales (chemistry), who attended the annual meeting. The symposium was conducted by the National Institutes of Health and the National Institutes of General Medical Sciences' Minority Opportunities in Research division.

Patty Dowdell (intercollegiate athletics) has been named Lone Star Conference north division "Coach of the Year" by league coaches and sports information directors. Dowdell, who has been at TWU for two years as head volleyball coach and has served overall as a head coach for five years, recorded her 100th career victory earlier this season.
