### NOMINEES SOUGHT FOR ANNUAL STAFF AWARDS

TWU is seeking nominations for candidates who will be considered for the Outstanding Achievement Awards and the TWU Award of Excellence. - Demonstration of outstanding personality traits such as loyalty, dedication, enthusiasm, initiative and reliability; and
- Demonstration of that individual's support and understanding of the university's activities and mission.

# TWU JOURNEYS TO PLAY OF THE MIND, SETS CONFERENCE

TWU representatives will make their second annual trek to a national event for women's colleges -- *Play of the Mind* -- scheduled Jan. 22-25 at St. Mary's College in South Bend, Ind. The program, developed in 1991, explores both intellectual life and leadership at women's colleges across the country. Last year, TWU was one of 23 institutions that participated. The purpose of the annual conference is to combine interaction, creative thinking, fun and intellectual engagement in a way that reminds each person that intellectual life presents itself in a variety of shapes, colors and experiences. The 1997 conference was the largest to date.

"I am proud to announce that Texas Woman's University was selected to participate in the *Play of the Mind* conference at Saint Mary's College for the second year in a row," said Dee Siscoe (student life). We will share thoughts and ideas once again with other women's colleges, such as Marymount, Mary Baldwin, Mills, Seton Hill, Mount Holyoke and others -- and we are the only public institution chosen for this event."

TWU's representatives will include: Dr. Betty Adams (Nursing); Kim Lahart (student development); Dr. Vivian May (women's studies); and students Meredith Bieker and Tori Nunez.

## LIBRARY ANNOUNCES ACQUISITIONS, SERVICES

The TWU Blagg-Huey Library offers a number of services and acquisitions to students, faculty, staff and community members. Several of those new services are discussed below.

- The library recently received a new reference book titled *Healthy People 2000 Review*, 1997, published by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, National Center for Health Statistics. This volume is the fifth in a series which tracks the progress of the *Healthy People 2000* national prevention strategy designed to significantly improve the health of the American people. - The library's spring 1998 training schedule offers 52 workshops on various research resources, such as Carl UnCover; CD-ROM databases; FirstSearch; full-text articles; IRIS (online catalog); searches on the Internet; Internet resources for women; and library sources for the home computer. TWU reference librarians also offer 19 general library tours. The schedules are available by contacting the library's information desk or by checking the TWU library web site at http://twu.edu/library/res.html and then by clicking on "training schedule." If the listed schedule times do not meet someone's needs, individual or small group appointments can be arranged with any reference librarian. Appointments also are available for classes to demonstrate library and Internet resources. Interested persons are advised to register early for workshops.
