

MUSIC BUILDING SCENES

The Music Building was completed in 1936 at a total cost of \$325,000, giving Texas State College for Women one of the most adequately equipped instructional units in the Southwest. The new building has more than 50 soundproof studios and practice rooms, three concert and recital halls, fully equipped classrooms, and a large record library.



COLLEGE SYMPHONY



The College Symphony Orchestra is composed of seventy-five selected students and has complete symphonic instrumentation.

It appears in the college artists' series, in radio broadcasts, and in out-of-town concerts.

The Texas Federation of Women's Clubs has designated this group as its official orchestra.

STUDIO AND CLASS ROOM ACTIVITIES

Music students may select four year courses in piano, violin, voice, and organ under a large faculty of artist-teachers.

Public appearances, recitals, and broadcasts are arranged for music students.

Music courses are open to all students of the college.

Elementary and advanced classes are offered in harmony, counterpoint, music appreciation, history of music, conducting, orchestration, and practice teaching.

A comprehensive four year course is designed for thorough training of school supervisors and teachers of instrumental and vocal methods.

Special radio training is available in a fully equipped studio.


Regular weekly broadcasts are presented over WFAA, Dallas.

Special broadcasts are arranged over national networks.

The Campus Serenaders play for college dances and for out-of-town programs.

Trios, small ensembles, and soloists appear in radio broadcasts, in campus programs, and give special programs over the state.





COLLEGE CHOIR

Musical students are offered opportunities in three choirs: The Classic Choir of 45 voices, the Modern Choir of 27 voices, and the Chorus of 250 voices.

Each year the choirs sing in many of the principal cities of Texas in addition to concerts with the College Symphony.

Graduate students may acquire the master's degree in music at T. S. C. W.

The music department offers a wide variety of graduate courses and has an adequate library for advanced study.
