## **OPEN FORUMS PLANNED**

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) has scheduled two open forums for the spring 1996 semester to date: with students on Mon., March 11, at 11:30 a.m., SC 207 and 208; and with faculty on Wed., March 27, at 4 p.m., MCL auditorium. Members of the executive staff will update participants on activities in their respective areas, and a question-and-answer period will be included. Other forums will be announced later.

Surles also asks vice presidents, deans, directors and chairs to nominate students for the 1996-97 President's Ambassadors, who serve as representatives of the university and the president at various social, business and civic functions throughout the year. #### "RESEARCH" THE POSSIBILITIES

All TWU faculty, staff, students and the general public are invited to "research" the possibilities during the university's first Research Days on March 6 through 8. A variety of activities, presentations and programs will give faculty and students engaged in research an opportunity to share their ideas and programs with the campus community and others. The three-day event will feature a keynote address by Dr. Vivian Pinn, director of the Women's Health Initiative at the National Institutes of Health, on Fri., March 8, at 10 a.m. in CFO 205. She will discuss "Hope for Tomorrow: Improving Women's Health through Research Today."

"The spotlight for Research Days is on research in its many forms -- basic or applied, quantitative or qualitative, in progress or completed," said Dr. Sondra Ferstl (research and grants). There is no registration fee; however, seating is limited at some programs, so registration is required. Contact Ferstl at ext. 3375. Three poster sessions are scheduled -- Thurs., March 7, morning and afternoon, and Fri., March 8, morning; approximately 40 projects will be displayed at each half-day session. # REQUIREMENTS FOR OUT-OF-STATE TUITION WAIVERS CHANGE

The legislative requirements for granting out-of-state tuition waivers through competitive scholarships have changed for the 1996-97 academic year, according to Governor Jackson (financial aid) in a recent memorandum to deans, department chairs and directors. Administrators should note the following changes:

■ The minimum amount needed to grant an out-of-state tuition waiver is \$1,000. The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board staff have taken the position that the \$1,000 award can come either from a specific fund or from a combination of several smaller awards totaling \$1,000. Additionally, no grandfathering of awards is allowed. (For example -- Competitive awards made now for the 1996-97 academic year still must be a minimum of \$1,000 in order to carry an out-of-state tuition waiver.)

In order for the tuition waiver to cover a 12-month period, the award must be paid over the fall and spring semesters. Again, for example, a \$1,000 competitive award scheduled to be paid \$500 for fall and \$500 for spring would carry a tuition waiver for the period of Aug. 22, 1996, through Aug. 9, 1997. A \$1,000 competitive award paid in fall only, spring only or summer only would carry the waiver only for one semester.

The law does not allow a \$1,000 award to cover enrollment period combinations, such as summer through fall or spring through summer. Such combinations require a total of \$2,000 -- including \$1,000 for spring and \$1,000 for summer, for example.

■ Tuition waivers now may be granted through non-academic competitive scholarships. The criteria no longer have to be at least 90 percent academic. Consequently, competitive awards based upon talent, financial need or athletic ability now may carry out-of-state tuition waivers. Any department that wishes to grant tuition waivers based on non-academic competitive criteria must submit their criteria to Jane Erwin (institutional advancement), chair of the TWU general scholarship committee, for approval.

The \$1,000 minimum does not apply to awards that are not intended to carry out-of-state tuition waivers. Departments may set the amount of these awards as they have in the past. For more information, call Jackson at ext. 3050.

### GULF WAR EXHIBIT FEATURED IN LIBRARY

The Woman's Collection in the TWU Blagg-Huey Library is honoring women who served during the Gulf War in Operation "Desert Storm" with a special display. Capt. Deborah McBee (Learning Resource Center) was asked to share some of her memorabilia as part of the exhibit, which will remain on display through Mar. 7 in the library's rotunda. "It's an exciting time for women in the military," said Dawn Letson, head of the TWU Woman's Collection. The showcase features books about the war, plus letters, cards and a Bronze Star, which was awarded to McBee for her combat service. McBee served overseas from Feb. 6, 1991, through Sept. 2, 1991. Her mementos, along with other donations from veterans, will become part of an archival project that McBee is assembling. "I am glad people are remembering it (the war)," said McBee, who also was interviewed for a book titled *Sand Storm*. "It's a real privilege to do something like this," she added. "It's a valuable piece of history."

### NEW SERVICE OFFERED TO EMPLOYEES

TWU will offer a new service to employees in Denton and Dallas beginning March 4. Staff members will be available to help employees and students with their income tax returns and will transmit electronically those completed forms to the Internal Revenue Service. "This service is a free benefit," said Colleen Sallee (payroll), " but *it is limited to those employees who do not have difficult tax situations*. It mainly is designed to help those persons who have straight-forward, basic returns. The tax volunteer will have the option of accepting or rejecting any return that appears too complex."

The new pilot program will be offered in March and may be extended, based on response. TWU will allow employees in Denton and Dallas to take the necessary time they need to visit the payroll office and complete their returns. Interested persons must call the payroll office to make an appointment. Houston employees and students have the option of sending their returns to payroll for electronic filing. "Next year we hope to set up a site in Houston for volunteers to help with returns and to file electronically," said Sallee. (Contact Sharon Hopkins in Houston.)

Employees who would like to complete their own forms or who have their returns done by an outside source may bring their completed returns to the payroll office, where they will be filed electronically with the IRS. "Returns filed electronically are processed more efficiently, and the error rate is significantly lower that with traditional filing of paper returns," said Sallee. "The result is the receipt of refunds in two or three weeks, depending on whether you elect direct deposit or have your refund check mailed." Balance due returns can be filed electronically, and payment is due by April 15, 1996.

"Before you make an appointment, please note that TWU and the tax volunteer hold no liability for the returns," said Sallee. "The employee remains responsible for the accuracy of all information." Call the payroll office at 8-1-3563 for more information.
