PRESIDENT'S OFFICE ANNOUNCES HOLIDAY GATHERINGS

TWU President Carol Surles would like to invite all faculty, staff and students to holiday gatherings that celebrate the season of friendship and giving. She will host two events on different days so that everyone on campus has an opportunity to enjoy one another's company before the campus closes for the break and 1995 begins.

A holiday coffee will be held from 8 to 10 a.m. on Wed., Dec. 7, in the southeast room of Hubbard Hall. The next day, on Thurs., Dec. 8, Surles will host an afternoon reception from 3:30 to 5:30 p.m. in the same location. "I hope that all of our faculty, staff and students can attend one or the other holiday event," said Surles. "We will celebrate the season in this way among the campus community, sharing the spirit of TWU."

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RECEPTION ANNOUNCED FOR PATRICIA SULLIVAN

All faculty, staff and students are invited to attend a reception honoring Dr. Patricia Sullivan (academic affairs) as she prepares to move to North Carolina and to assume the duties of chancellor of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro. The event will be held on Tues., Nov. 29, from 3 to 5 p.m. on ACT 2. Sullivan, who will assume her new duties on Jan. 1, 1995, is the first woman ever elected to the top job at UNCG, which was founded as a college for women in 1891 and opened its doors to male students in 1963.

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CHATER NOMINATED TO CONTINUE AS SSA CHIEF

President Bill Clinton announced last week (Nov. 15) his intention to nominate former TWU President Shirley Chater to continue as head of the Social Security Administration when it becomes an independent agency next year. "In the year since she was sworn in as the current commissioner, Dr. Chater has taken decisive steps to improve service to Americans with disabilities, to streamline the agency and make it more efficient, and to enact high customer service standards for the more than 49 million Americans who receive Social Security or Supplemental Security Income benefits," said Clinton. "I can think of no better person to protect and maintain the administration's commitment to Social Security." The Social Security Independence and Program Improvements Act of 1994 will establish SSA as an independent agency on March 31, 1995. Under the law, the commissioner will serve a six-year term.

The date for filing grievances under the TWU faculty grievance policy for occurrences between April 1 to Nov. 1, 1994, has been extended to 90 days after Nov. 1, 1994.

STREAM RECEIVES MARCH OF DIMES HONOR

Dr. Kathryn Stream (Houston Center) was one of seven outstanding volunteers honored on Nov. 16 by the March of Dimes Birth Defects Foundation, Texas Gulf Coast chapter, during its annual meeting. Stream, who received the "Award of Distinction," joined the March of Dimes Health Professional Advisory Committee in 1991. Under her leadership, HPAC now requires chapter grants to address transportation as a barrier to perinatal health care services. Stream, who also is a member of the March of Dimes board of directors, is a supportive member of the organization's volunteer corps, even though she lives in Denton and commutes weekly to serve as director of the TWU Institute of Health Sciences Houston Center.

"It is wonderful to have such hardworking, dedicated volunteers giving their time to help prevent birth defects and save the lives of many babies," said J.D. Epstein, chairman of the board of directors and a partner in the law firm of Vinson and Elkins. "With the continued support of these volunteers, we will be able to overcome the challenges set before us."

The TWU office of telecommunications now offers cellular services -- a rental-by-the-day plan for university offices and departments. Interested persons on university business may rent a Motorola portable cellular phone, including one hour of talk time between charges, for a \$5 per day rental fee. Calling charges within TWU's Metrocel coverage area (which includes the metroplex and Austin) are \$0.30 per minute. Calls placed to other areas in the U.S. involve a \$1-per-call surcharge, plus \$1-per-minute calling charges. 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PAYROLL ISSUES TIME SHEET REMINDER

The payroll office would like to remind all offices and departments on campus to follow several key steps when students and/or employees fill out time sheets:

- Be sure that time sheets have been signed by both the employee and the supervisor before they are forwarded to payroll;
- Check to see that the seven-digit department number is on the time sheet before it is forwarded:
- Anyone using a blank time sheet and who does not know their employee object class should write in their title, which will help payroll track the paperwork that goes with the time sheet;
- Time worked each day should be rounded to the nearest quarter hour. If seven minutes is worked in a quarter hour, that time is dropped. If eight minues of a quarter hour is worked, that time is rounded up to the next quarter hour.
- All time sheets must be completed in **ink**. Time sheets are run through an imaging system, and forms completed in pencil do not deliver a clear image.
- Anyone who uses a previous employee's time sheet for a new employee should white out the old name and social security number, and then fill in the new information.
- Those who work on a scheduled TWU holiday should write on their time sheets that they worked on that holiday. This information will be recorded on the computer system, and employees who have worked on a scheduled TWU holiday will have 12 months to take those holiday hours off.

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DEBUT CONCERT SET FOR UNIVERSITY CHORUS

The TWU University Chorus will present its debut concert, directed by Dr. Janice Killian (performing arts-music), on Wed., Nov. 30, at 8 p.m. in the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods. The program is free and open to all members of the campus community and the general public.

The fall concert will feature a variety of choral literature, including traditional folk songs ("Danny Boy"), Romantic period works ("Wenn ich ein Voglein war"), spirituals ("Joshua Fit the Battle") and some popular standards ("You Made Me Love You"). The University Chorus also will be joined by selected soloists who are enrolled in "The Choral Experience," a fine arts core curriculum option in which students enroll in both University Chorus and in a solo voice class during the same semester.

"This semester marks the first time since 1972 that University Chorus has been in existence," said Killian. "The mission of the University Chorus is to provide as many TWU students as possible with an opportunity to make music by performing a wide variety of choral literature."

The chorus is designed for women who want to develop or maintain their singing skills, but who are not able to commit to the performance schedule maintained by the TWU Concert Choir and the TWU Choraliers. "The chorus also serves as a training ground for the more rigorous musical demands of concert choir," added Killian. "Singers this semester include graduates and undergraduates with such diverse majors as government, music therapy, education, music and nursing. Because University Chorus is open to anyone at TWU without audition, the women of the chorus hope that even more students join them next semester in their enjoyment of creating choral music." 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FACULTY SENATE DISCUSSES REPORTS

The TWU Faculty Senate met on Fri., Nov. 11, and received a number of reports from officers, President Carol Surles and committee representatives.

Speaker Ron Fannin (family sciences) reported attending a two-day program, the Council of Faculty Governance Organizations, in Austin. He said participants heard from keynote speakers and others that higher education needs to convince legislators and the general public that "we are good problem solvers" and that we are "contributing solutions to society" -- ideas that are directly related to the issue of accountability. Speaker Pro Tem Janice LaPointe-Crump (performing artsdance) attended the conference as well and shared some of her experiences, including a discussion of non-instructional activities that faculty engage in and how such involvement is difficult to quantify and report.

Both officers of the Faculty Senate added that the executive committee had met with Dr. Carol Surles to discuss, among other issues, the role of the Senate in governance, peer review and faculty procedures for the review of administrators.

Surles, who addressed the Senate, shared her recent activities -- visits, dinner out with the Houston Center faculty, alumni meetings and other efforts -- and talked about the campus master plan. The next phase of the plan is almost ready for review, and she invited everyone to attend presentations (which will be announced), hear about the plan and provide feedback. She added, "I feel very strongly that a new president must have a vision concerning the campus climate -- an open one...that encourages the academic process. Everything I can do to enable that, I will do."

Surles also discussed inclusiveness -- placing representatives from Dallas and Houston on the university's committees so that everyone is represented. "Funds have been allocated to accommodate faculty visits to Denton and service on university committees," she said. Surles then spoke on academic leadership and announced that she would name the interim vice president for academic affairs and the chair of the search committee for that position within approximately one week. She welcomed suggestions from faculty but stressed that any ideas or names had to be submitted the first part of the following week. She added that the TWU board of regents would

meet on Dec. 9 and that they might discuss the university's admission policy at that time. Surles also said that budget and state appropriations are major concerns as the next legislative session approaches, and she discussed with Senate members the issue of faculty productivity.

Several standing committee reports were offered. A revision of the "Policy on Adjunct and Part-Time Faculty" was distributed, but no action was taken. A document for the evaluation of administrators is available for faculty review; the job descriptions also are available in each department, the Faculty Senate office and on the faculty bulletin board on VENUS. (Cycles and frequency for evaluating administrators were discussed as well.) A document for tracking faculty activity was distributed, and senators talked about the method for using the form and surveying faculty each semester.

Gary Washmon (visual arts), who is secretary for the Senate this year, will write a synopsis of each meeting in newsletter form, and he also will submit full minutes for meetings. Interested faculty should contact the Faculty Senate office for copies.
