ALUM'S FAMILY ESTABLISHES ENDOWMENT AT TWU

Children and young people were a top priority for long-time Denton resident Helen Norgaard. Her works attested to her devotion -- from directing the Denton City-County Day Nursery to leading Girl Scouts for more than 25 years to raising two children of her own -- Richard and Elsa. Now her family wants to extend that outreach to Texas Woman's University -- her alma mater (and daughter Elsa's, too) -- by establishing an endowment for more than \$100,000 that once again will help others, especially single parent students who need help paying child care tuition fees at either the TWU Child Development Center or the Clubhouse children's recreational program in Mary Hufford Hall.

Former Denton physician Dr. Hal V. Norgaard, a heart specialist who now lives in Dallas, and his son, Dr. Richard Norgaard, have established an endowment of more than \$100,000 -- the Helen Coniglio Norgaard Endowment Fund. Through the gift to TWU, Dr. Norgaard is honoring his wife's memory by helping the university assist single-parent students and their children...an effort that reflects the caring nature of its namesake.

While Dr. Hal Norgaard served as physician to many heart patients in Denton and as president of the Denton County Heart Association, Helen Norgaard helped the community by sharing in health care efforts and by serving in organizations.

"We are pleased and honored to accept this gift from Dr. Hal Norgaard and Dr. Richard Norgaard in honor of a Denton resident who devoted her life to family and community service," said Kathleen Gigl, vice president for institutional advancement at TWU. "Helen Norgaard's caring spirit will continue as we help our TWU students who are single parents and who need financial help for child care as they seek to better themselves for their families."

The family moved to Denton in 1947, and Helen almost immediately was involved with the Denton Medical Auxiliary. During the next decade, she was elected chairman of the advisory committee for the Kress Foundation School of Practical Nursing at Texas State College for Women (now TWU) and also served as chairman of the city's Park Board; training chairman of the Denton County Girl Scouts; first president of the Denton Girl Scout Leaders Club; chairman of recreation for the Youth Development Council; chair of a Cancer Crusade for Denton County; and organizer and first director of the Pan American Round Table in Denton.

During the 1960s, Helen Norgaard's involvement in the community expanded to include the Denton City-County Day Nursery -- which continues to serve children today. Beginning in 1961, she served as house chairman 7 years for the school and also was acting director. The Cross Timbers Girl Scout

"Mrs. Norgaard was a role model for many people of the Denton community," added Gigl. "We believe, through her endowment, that our students, too, will graduate and serve as role models in their own communities and for their own family members. As a result, Helen Norgaard's caring, giving spirit will live on through others."

Council recognized Helen Norgaard's 25 years of service and dedication with the Thanks Badge in 1976.

"THREE SISTERS" WILL BE STAGED AT TWU

The TWU department of performing arts program in drama will present *The Three Sisters* at 8 p.m. on April 17, 18, 24 and 25, and at 2 p.m. on Sun., April 26, in Redbud Theatre. Tickets, which go on sale April 12, are \$5 for TWU students and children; \$7 for other students, TWU faculty and staff, and senior citizens; and \$10 for general admission. Originally written by Anton Chehkov, *The Three Sisters* has been adapted by author, screenwriter and playwright David Mamet. The play is set in a provincial Russian town in the 1900s and centers on Olga, Masha and Irina Prozoroff, as well as their brother, Andrei; his wife, Natalya; and their friends. Sharing a desire for a better life, the sisters crave the sophistication of Moscow. However, over the course of the play's four-year span, their plans to go to Moscow are altered by their brother's marriage and their passionate relationships with the men in their lives.

Directed by Jeanne Everton (performing arts, drama), *The Three Sisters* features TWU graduate students Lindy Benton, Honey English and Sonya Worden as Olga, Masha and Irina, respectively. Andrei is played by junior Bill Owen, while senior Laura Owens portrays Natalya. The 15-member cast features sophomore Paul Munson, senior Patrick Watson, graduate student Chase Perrett, senior Samuel Brian Beck, graduate student Nathan Cole, senior Josh Olkowski, senior Stephanie Kopp, freshman Nic Davis and sophomores Amy Cruz and Chris Shelton.

Shelton is assisting Everton with directing, while senior Susan Bryson is handling scenery design, sophomore Jonathan Starr has designed costumes and sophomore Jennifer Bernard is managing sound design. Lighting is done by guest designer Miles Chick. Call 8-1-2500.

Fisk said that staging these pieces in a venue like Margo Jones Performance Hall can serve as a challenge to student choreographers. STUDENTS' ARTWORK SHINES

Ten years ago, the work of north Texas artist Ron Watson was featured in a one-man show at TWU. On April 3, Watson -- now chair of the art department at Texas Christian University -- returned to Denton to jury the annual student art competition. Watson said he looked forward to the opportunity. "I really enjoy looking at artwork, so I think I gave everybody a really good, fair look at their work," he said. "Plus, TWU is famous for some really good work -- whether it's photography, weaving, or drawing and painting."

As in past years, the competition is sponsored by Voertman's bookstore, which awards \$600 in prize money. Work in any medium was accepted, as long as the piece was done by TWU students for a class at the university; pieces chosen for inclusion are on display through April 30 in the student gallery of the Fine Arts Building. Hours are Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 4 p.m.; the show is free and open to the public. Call 8-1-2530 for information.

Corky Stuckenbruck (visual arts) said that entering a competition like this (one) is an important step for a young artist. "In the art world, you build a reputation by entering shows," she explained. "Entering this show serves as a sort of training for these students because the pieces must be finished completely and ready to hang, and they must be submitted for judging on time. And one-half of the work submitted won't be juried. As a result, the competition serves as a good preparation for dealing with being turned down as well." Stuckenbruck received more than 100 entries; prizes are awarded April 7.
