TWU, TEXAS A&M SIGN COOPERATIVE AGREEMENT

Thanks to a new dual degree program between the College of Arts and Sciences at Texas Woman's University and the Dwight Look College of Engineering at Texas A&M University, students preparing for a career in engineering will have a stronger, more diverse education. The program, which was announced at a reception on Thurs., May 9, at the Zachry Engineering Center in College Station, allows students to earn two degrees -- one in mathematics and the other in engineering -- simultaneously. The memorandum of agreement was signed by Dr. Beverley Byers-Pevitts (academic affairs) and Dr. Roland Haden, vice chancellor and dean of engineering at Texas A&M. Under the joint program, students who complete the TWU and A&M curricula will receive the appropriate bachelor of science degree in mathematics from TWU and in engineering from Texas A&M.

Students will attend TWU for three years as a mathematics major, taking a broad range of courses in mathematics, computer science, humanities, social and natural sciences and the basic introductory courses needed to enter studies in engineering. They will continue their education at Texas A&M's Look College of Engineering for approximately two years. Participants must maintain a minimum 2.25 grade point average during the first three years at TWU before transfer admission to TAMU will be considered. Students also may earn academic credit and income while gaining on-the-job experience through TWU's cooperative education program. The dual degree program will be monitored by both institutions and may be revised at any time by either school.

"This agreement will help us recruit students at TWU," said Byers-Pevitts during an afternoon reception. "We are doing this because of our commitment to our students and our efforts with Texas A&M." Both institutions are encouraging students to consider careers in engineering, and such an agreement with TWU will bring more women into the field -- an area in which they traditionally have been underrepresented. 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UPDATE ON TWU ATHLETICS

Several TWU student-athletes were honored at the annual awards luncheon in Hubbard Hall on April 26 for their athletic and academic accomplishments. Brandi Bosley, a four-year letter winner in basketball, team captain, honor student and recipient of TWU's Outstanding Senior Award was named recipient of this year's President's Award. She and three other student-athletes - seniors Misty Brever (volleyball) and Monique Taylor (gymnastics) -- were selected to their respective GTE Academic All-American District VI teams.

The Kitty Magee Award, which recognizes the most dedicated student-athlete, was given to fifth-year senior gymnast J.J Shanks. The Jo Kuhn Award, which honors outstanding leadership, was given to sophomore volleyball player Chantelle Clegg. Freshman softball player Catherine Jacobson was selected by TWU's athletic trainers for the Golden Cast Award, given to the athlete who is the most conscientious about the treatment and rehabilitation of her injuries. She currently is rehabilitating from shoulder surgery. One individual in each of the athletics programs received an award for outstanding student-athlete. They were sophomore Shaughnessy Bland (tennis), Shanks (gymnastics), senior Kerri Sheppard (athletic training), junior Sarah Steinmetz (volleyball) and junior Rhonda Wilson (basketball).

Two individuals from the Denton community were inducted into the Order of the Redcoats, an honor that recognizes individuals inside and outside of the university community who support and demonstrate outstanding service to the Pioneer athletics program. The recipients were Lori Golden, former TWU basketball player, who has served as the official statistician for volleyball and basketball programs for several seasons; and Jimmie Lankford, a TWU graduate student who volunteered as an assistant volleyball coach for the past two years and also served as a bus driver for all road trips.
