


The CAMPUS VIEWS this year are something to be proud of, something to be thankful for. They represent the college in one of its best mo-



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
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THE PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



The girls here in the cartoon are funny looking—but not nearly so funny as those in the pages which follow. Look pleasant, please! One! Two! Turn!







The College Orchestra, under the direction of Mr. David C. Hansard, is composed of students of the music department.





Maurine Staley had been telling her kindergarten children the story of "Ali Baba and the Forty Thieves." When she reached the end, she proceeded to question them regarding the story.



On landing, the pilot congratulated him. "I didn't think you could do it," he said.






