# AUTHOR FROM "DOWN UNDER" IS "ON TOP" FOR KIDS

From "down under" to literally "on top," Australian children's author Mem Fox has conquered the hearts of children in the United States, Australia, England and the world with books that reach out to youngsters eager to journey to distant lands. Known in children's literary circles throughout the world for her books, Fox will visit TWU on Sat., Nov. 8, for the university's 32nd annual "Fall Forum in Reading." Sponsored by the department of reading and bilingual education and the College of Education and Human Ecology, the program is expected to be a "sell-out" -- no registrations will be accepted on site that day.

"We've received calls from teachers, parents and fans of Mem Fox from across Texas and throughout the country about her visit," said Dr. Rose Spicola (reading and bilingual education). "They just can't believe that Mem Fox is coming here to visit! We are so pleased and excited to welcome her to TWU and to share her thoughts about literature for children."

Fox will speak twice during the one-day program -- first on "The Role of Passion in the Development of Literacy" during the 8:30 a.m. general session and then on "Learning from Learning" during the 12:30 p.m. general session. Several breakout sessions with other experts in children's literacy will be held, as well as an autograph session and evaluation with Fox at 3:15 p.m. (limit two books per person). The cost is \$48 per person for registration and lunch; \$41 for registration only; and a \$10 late fee after Nov. 1. Call continuing education at 8-1-3408.

In the U.S., Fox's book Night Noises was named one of the 10 best picture books of 1989 by Redbook magazine, a "Notable Children's Book in Language Arts" and a 1990 Horn Book "Fanfare" selection. But Possum Magic, written in 1983, took Australia (and then others) by storm, becoming that country's all-time best-selling children's book. It was also named a "Highly Commended Book" by the Children's Book Council of Australia and the "Best Children's Book" in the 1984 New South Wales Premier's Literary Awards. Other children's books by Fox include Guess What?; Koala Lou; Time for Bed; and Whoever You Are, plus two books for adults.

Fox, a senior lecturer in education at Flinders University in Adelaide, South Australia, and her husband, Malcolm, have one daughter in college. The Australian author -- who spent time with her parents as missionaries in Africa and later studied drama in England -- studied children's literature as a nontraditional university student. She said, "Possum Magic (her first book) was rejected nine times over five years, but went on to become (and continues to be) the best-selling children's book in Australia. I still find it hard to believe that I happen to be the writer of this famous book." She adds, "Writing is my second love. My first is teaching, to which I admit an addiction so powerful that I'm already dreading my retirement on March 5, 2011!"

#### "BRIGHT DAY" LOOKS AT THE PAST

The crushing effect of Adolf Hitler's fascist regime on the lives of five friends in 1930s Germany -- all filmmakers and actors -- is the dramatic focus of A Bright Room Called Day, presented by TWU Theatre '97. The production will be staged at 8 p.m. on Oct. 31, Nov. 1, and Nov. 7 and 8, and at 2 p.m. on Sun., Nov. 9, in Redbud Theatre. Ticket prices are \$10 for general admission; \$7 for TWU faculty and staff, senior citizens and other students; and \$5 for TWU students and children. Written by Pulitzer Prize and Tony Award winner Tony Kushner, A Bright Room Called Day retells the story of a group of friends living in Germany in the 1930s at the end of the Weimar Republic and the beginning of Hitler's rise to power. The drama is relived through a woman who is a screenwriter living in a Berlin apartment that once belonged to Agnes Eggling, a film actress whose warm hospitality made her home the favorite meeting place for her friends. The powerful drama reveals how the lives and relationships of the artists were affected by political turmoil that accompanied the rise of the Third Reich. Audiences will learn about courage and difficult choices as they watch the characters deal with hope, love, frustration, humor, despair and conflict, and try to cope with events they cannot influence.

A Bright Room Called Day -- TWU's entry in the American College Theatre Festival's annual competition -- is directed by TWU graduate student Bradley Campbell. Senior Susan Bryson designed the scenery, and sophomore Jonathan Starr designed costumes. #### SERIES OF WOMEN AUTHORS INCLUDES THOMPSON LECTURESHIP

The TWU Blagg-Huey Library's fall series featuring women authors will continue and will focus next on the 7th annual Joyce Thompson Lectureship in American Literature and Culture with Dr. Emily Toth on Thurs., Nov. 13, at 2:30 p.m., ACT 301. Toth, professor of English and women's studies in the department of English at Louisiana State University, will present "The Gossip about Kate Chopin." Presented by the Friends of the TWU Libraries, this annual lectureship is funded by an endowment established by friends of Dr. Joyce Thompson in 1991 and the Friends of the TWU Libraries. Thompson was a professor of English at TWU from 1977 to 1992. She held a bachelor's degree in mathematics and master's and doctoral degrees in English from Texas Tech University. Thompson's areas of academic specialization included American literature and women's studies, and she wrote Marking A Trail: A History of the Texas Woman's University, Ladies' Firsts: A Miscellany and more than 30 published articles.

The former TWU professor, who delivered many papers during scholarly and professional meetings, was a patient and inspiring teacher who enabled students to gain insights into literature and their own humanity. Thompson suggested the quotation from Edith Hamilton that was inscribed on the bronze dedication plaque for the TWU Blagg-Huey Library, which reads: "To be able to be caught up in the world of thought -- that is to be educated."

The featured speaker for this year's lectureship is the author of Kate Chopin, a biography, and editor of A Vocation and a Voice: Stories by Kate Chopin. She currently is completing Kate Chopin's Private Papers, which will be published next spring by the University of Indiana Press. Her book Ms. Mentor's Impeccable Advise for Women in Academia was printed earlier this year by the University of Pennsylvania. She also is well known for The Curse: A Cultural History of Menstruation with Janice Delaney and Mary Jane Lupton — a work of literary and social criticism—and for a novel titled Daughters of New Orleans.

Toth served as LSU's first director of women's studies from 1988 to 1990, where she currently is a faculty member. She has published a number of articles in journals and magazines, including *Belles Lettres*, *Southern Studies*, *Massachusetts Review*, *Johns Hopkins Magazine*, *Louisiana Literature* and *Ms. Magazine*. She has received many awards for her teaching, publications and association work. Her biography of Kate Chopin was nominated for both the 1990 Pulitzer Prize and the 1991 John Hope Franklin Prize. Toth has served as a film consultant on several projects, including "Kate Chopin: A Re-Awakening," produced for the Louisiana Public Broadcasting Service.

Aside from the annual lectureship, Thompson also is honored at TWU by the Endowment for the Joyce Thompson Scholarship in English, which was established under the leadership of Dr. Frank Longoria (English, speech and foreign languages). The scholarship is awarded annually to an English major.

**The CARL Uncover system** on Venus and the World Wide Web can provide users with lists of journals by subject. Research journals indexed in the CARL system are arranged in at least 40 subject lists; simply click on any displayed subject term -- such as biology or education -- to look at the list of journal titles.

"You may, from the TWU home page, in sequence, click on the Library, TWU library resources and then CARL Uncover. Then click on Web access to see the 'Uncover Title and Subject Lists.' Click on any subject term displayed under 'Subject Classification Lists' to look at a specific journal. If you use CARL through the Venus main menu, select 'LI,' then 'CA,' and then make your subject list selections," said Dr. James Galloway (library). These journal subject lists may be useful to TWU faculty who use the CARL Reveal service -- for example, to automatically receive tables of contents e-mails, as they are issued, to see which titles on specific subjects are available for tables-of-contents alerts. The author added that the book is the first of its kind that focuses on occupational therapy leadership.

Dr. Judith McFarlane (Nursing, Houston) was invited by the office of the Secretary of Health and Human Services, office on women's health, to present nursing research on "Policy and Programs to Prevent Abuse to Women" at the National Nursing Summit on Violence Against Women on Mon., Oct. 20. A total of 75 presidents, deans, representatives and experts from schools of nursing, clinical nursing, government agencies and offices, nursing organizations and domestic violence experts were convened to develop coordination among nursing organizations and DHHS agencies and offices. Participants discussed how to improve the quality of education, prevention and intervention strategies, university screening and workplace initiatives regarding violence against women. The goals of the summit were to reach consensus about violence against women; priorities for the nursing profession; and the development of new strategies to improve education, prevention and intervention.
