The leader in a remarkable era of growth and development of the Texas Woman's University is Dr. John A. Guinn who assumed the office of president of the University in September, 1951.

His latest accomplishments have been the obtaining of funds for the construction of Nelda C. Stark Hall, a 21-story dormitory; the science research building, and a classroom-office building. Plans are also underway for the construction of a new student union building.

In November, a portrait of Dr. Guinn was unveiled in Guinn Hall, the residence hall dedicated in his name in 1965.

President Guinn is a member of the 1967 executive committee of the Southern Regional Education Board. In September, he and Mrs. Guinn attended a formal dinner honoring West German Chancellor and Mrs. Ludwig Erhard in Washington, D.C.

An active speaker, Dr. Guinn is listed in Who's Who and is a leader in community affairs. He received his bachelor of arts, master of arts, and doctor of philosopy degrees from the University of Texas.





#### Board of Regents Decides Character of TWU

The Board of Regents makes decisions about the construction of new buildings, activities sponsored by the University, and any changes in the University policies.

Decisions of the Board of Regents are important to students because they determine the physical appearance and the educational character and atmosphere of Texas Woman's University.

The newest residence hall, a 21-story building to be ready for occupancy in 1967, is named for Mrs. Nelda C. Stark, a member of the Board of Regents, for her service to TWU.

A university president has said, "I would feel personally safe in asserting that no college or university—public or private— can hope to become a truly great institution unless it enjoys the encouragement and active support of a sound and forward-looking alumni organization."

Any former student in good standing with the University who has completed six hours of credit is automatically a member. Graduates are urged to keep in touch with the Alumnae office so that their names and addresses will always be current and they will receive the Alumnae Bulletin and other mailings from the University.

TWU graduates are urged to support the TWU Foundation with a contribution of at least five dollars of more each year, and the Foundation in turn supports the various projects of the Alumnae Association, such as mailing and publishing the Alumnae Bulletin, promoting class reunions, and maintaining a current file of names and addresses.



#### Over 4,000 Students Register for Fall Semester



During registration, the long, long, long lines move ever so slowly.


TWU broke the 4,000 student enrollment mark for the first time this fall. The freshman class totaled 1,387 students, the largest class. Sophomore students numbered 890; juniors, 667; seniors, 529; post-graduates, 48, and graduates, 527.

The number of students from foreign countries increased to 79. Twenty students registered from Taiwan, 10 from Hong Kong, 11 from Panama, six from Korea, four from Japan, and several from other countries.

A new course in human geography was offered by the Department of Sociology, and new courses were added to the physical therapy program. Three oneweek nursing refresher workshops were also opened. Other departments planned new courses to be offered a few at the time, beginning in the spring.

Freshmen and new students had a chance to meet informally their first Monday night on campus. At the SUB Swim Party, they could relax after a long day at orientation.







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


A silver distinguished service plaque was presented to the governor by Robert A. Hall, chairman of the TWU Board of Regents, who also made the dedication address.















The freshmen did justice to their first stunt by striving for originality and purpose. Both the music and lyrics were written by a member of the class.

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
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## Demand for Biologists Is Increasing




## Facilities for Chemists Excellent



The Department of Chemistry in the CAS has excellent physical facilities and professors for the student who majors in this field. The department is accredited with the American Chemical Society.

At present there are 10 full-time staff members, all of whom have earned Ph.D. degrees from 10 different universities. A new research building is presently underway, and students have available for their own use many special items of equipment.

Courses in the Department of Chemistry lead to either the B.A. or B.S. degree in chemistry or general science, with options depending on a student's interest. A graduate degree program is also offered in the department, leading to the M.A. or M.S. degree in any of the basic areas and to the Ph.D. degree in radiation chemistry.





The department also offers special courses in connection with the Honors Program which was begun in the Spring of 1966.




## Physics Curriculum Emphasizes Foundation











## College of Nursing Degree Program Outstanding

The purpose of the College of Nursing is to prepare nurses who can care for the sick, aid in rehabilitating the handicapped, and promote health. The curriculum is designed as an integrated general and professional one throughout the four years, balancing offerings in the nursing major with offerings in general education.

Emphasis is placed on the student's learning to think critically, to communicate purposefully, and to relate to others effectively. Courses in clinical nursing are offered in the hospitals of the Dallas County Hospital District and the Texas Medical Center in Houston.

The program of the TWU College of Nursing is pointed toward the development of a superior professional nurse. Opportunities for graduates are limitless. Upon the completion of the four-year bachelor of science program, a student is prepared to accept a staff position in any field of nursing.

## Practical Nursing Students Learn Bedside Care

Students learn there are many phases of work involved in providing proper patient care.



The Practical Nursing program prepares qualified candidates to give basic bedside nursing care as trained practical nurses. The curriculum is designed to enable the student to gain an understanding of the principles applicable to basic nursing and to develop skill as a practitioner in caring for the sick.

The vocational or practical nurse is a member of the health team who assumes responsibility for direct nursing care such as giving treatments, bathing and feeding patients, and working in a team relationship with registered nurses and physicians.

In the second and third semesters, the student is assigned to clinical practice at Flow Memorial Hospital and Denton State School. The courses are related directly to the clinical practice in the patient area.

After satisfactory completion of the oneyear course, the practical nurse is eligible to take the examination offered by the Board of Vocational Nurse Examiners.

The School of Occupational Therapy at TWU is the only accredited school of OT in the Southwest. It is also one of the top-rated schools in the United States.


The professional occupational therapy courses are integrated with a broad background of liberal arts studies. The curriculum is comprised of courses in biological sciences, behavioral sciences, treatment media, theory and principles of occupational therapy, and medical

Medical courses and correlated occupational therapy courses are given in the Texas Medical Center, Houston, utilizing the University's own residential and instructional buildings and many other medical center resources.

Actual experience with patients is planned on an individual basis for each student's clinical internship. Students spend nine months in various approved Texas hospitals and upon the successful completion of all academic and clinical course work are eligible to take the American Occupational Therapy Registration Examination.

## School of OT Only One Accredited in Southwest | Each Phase of Physical Therapy Program Planned

The Physical Therapy program at TWU stresses fundamental courses in basic behavioral and communication sciences to prepare the graduate to meet the challenge of increasingly complex health care needs of a growing population. Clinical sciences are offered early in the curriculum to provide a foundation of practical experience for the appreciation and integration of basic principles.

Every phase of the physical therapy program is carefully planned. Part of the curriculum is conducted in the modern facilities of the TWU Houston Clinical Center. The last semester of the senior year is devoted to clinical education in physical therapy programs in Texas where the student has the opportunity to synthesize technical skills and basic knowledge under the supervision of qualified physical therapists.

The bachelor of science degree is awarded after successful completion of the program. A wide variety of practice is available to the graduate physical therapist.



## Library Science Graduates Fill Numerous Positions ALA Rates Bralley Library 141 Per Cent Adequate



Library science students have their own building facility and library.

Graduates of the School of Library Science are filling positions of importance and responsibility nationally and internationally.

All members of the faculty are experts in their field, having had training and experience in the best universities and libraries in this country and abroad. The library has personal collection of more than 10,000 books, a wide variety of pamphlets on professional subjects, and microcard and microfilm machines for necessary readings.

A bachelor's degree, a master of arts degree, or a master of library science degree are available. The first two years are spent in acquiring a general education and in getting an overview of librarianship as a profession.

In professional preparation, students have actual experience in a public college, school or special library in Denton or in a nearby city. An extra-curricular organization in library science is Alpha Beta Alpha, a national library science fraternity.

Students utilize the LS library which contains numerous reference works, biographies and other volumes used in their courses.

Bralley Memorial Library was placed in the top echelon among the 22 libraries of tax-supported institutions in Texas this year by the American Library Association. TWU was rated 141 per cent adequate, with only one other school, the University of Texas, being rated higher with 150 per cent.

The accrediting standards of the ALA are based on a ratio of the number of books to the number of students. According to Dr. Ivan L. Schulze, the library had a total of 288,160 volumes in August, 1966, to an approximate enrollment of 4,000 students. Periodical subscriptions total 1,350 and the figures have been steadily increasing.

Two special book collections are also a part of the library. The largest of these is the Woman's Collection which contains biographies and stories about women and their accomplishments. The Texas Collection is not as large, but it includes many valuable or rare volumes dealing with Texas history.

A reciprocal agreement for use of the libraries also exists between TWU and North Texas State University, whereby students may use either library.

## Research Institute Conducts Numerous Projects

The Texas Woman's University Research Institute is staffed with a group of scientists, technologists, and graduate assistants who carry on fundamental and applied research in the field of nutrition, textile sciences, and houshold furnishings and equipment. The research, which is sponsored by federal, state, and commercial agencies, includes approximately 25 individual projects.


Nutrition research has many facets — the growth and development of children, the best plans for maintaining good health in the entire family, methods of feeding institutional subjects properly, ways of maintaining physical and skeletal integrity of the astronaut, and the proper composition of the ration for the American fighting man.

Nutrition research projects are sponsored by such agencies as the federal government, through the Head Start program; the National Aeronautics and Space Administration and the United States Army; the State of Texas through special legislative appropriations, and various commercial associations in fields of general interest.

The nutrition faculty includes, along with graduate assistants and technologists, Dr. Pauline Beery Mack, director; Dr. Fred B. Vogt, professor of space medicine; George P. Vose, professor of radiological research; Dr. Ralph E. Pyke, assoc. professor of nutrition research; Dr. Alice Milner, assoc. professor of clinical nutrition; Dr. Betty Alford, research associate in nutrition and dietetics, and Dr. Elsa Arciniegas Dozier, research associate in bionutrition. Dr. Conrad L. Kinard serves as a visiting professor in internal medicine and cardiology, and Robert M. Lockwood as visiting professor in radiology.











Leo Wade, M.S., administers a blood volume test to a bed rest subject following a 30-day period of bed rest recumbency.














Research in Textile Science at the TWU Research Institute is a very extensive enterprise, including the conducting of projects on cotton, man-made fibers, and the newer textile finishes for fabrics.

TWU has had a twelve-year association in cotton research with the Southern Utilization Research and Development Division of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. Of three studies conducted under this sponsorship, all have been in the area of outdoor cotton fabrics. For six years the institute has been involved in a research project on men's white shirts, which has included wear and laundering. The study of permanent press or durable press finish has involved research on men's and boy's pants and women's dress fabrics, conducted in the Cotton Utilization and Finishing Laboratories at the institute.

TWU research in laundry methods has gained world wide fame.

The TWU Laundry Test Assembly is used by more than 1,300 commercial laundries in the United States, by the U.S. Navy, and by three foreign countries. The test assembly consists of standardized test pieces for measuring strength preservation, whiteness retention, and soil removal efficiency, sewn together with a numbered fabric for keeping track of the number of launderings which have been given to the group of test fabrics.

The staff for textile research includes the following faculty members: Dr. Ramon M. Esteve, professor of textile research; Dr. Elizabeth Thomas, assoc. professor of textile research; Dr. Esther Roberts Broome, associate in textile science research and Dr. LaVerne Bandy Thomas and Charles Cawley, associates in textiles and detergency research.

Along with numerous other grants awarded the TWU Research Institute this year, a research contract at an estimated cost of \$95,000 was awarded to them by NASA in March for the continuation of the program of research designed to determine the effect of weightlessness and the confinement associated with the cockpit of an Apollo spacecraft on the status of bone demineralization of the astronauts.


Hundreds of schools across the nation participate in the program. Thus the honor is twofold: the distinction is recognized nationally and locally.




### Priscilla Lovelace








Pi Lambda Theta is an honorary fraternity for women in education who have been recognized for superior scholastic achievement and high potential for professional leadership.






Jones Hall is named for the late Mary Gibbs Jones of Houston, who was noted for her generous interest in higher education and for her benefactions to deserving students.
















