TWU IMPLEMENTS SINGLE-STREAM RECYCLING ON DENTON CAMPUS

TWU has begun a single-stream recycling program on its Denton campus that adds aluminum, tin cans, plastic, glass and cardboard to TWU's paper recycling program.

All TWU office and classroom buildings have received large green recycling bins to collect single-stream recycling items. Paper will still be recycled in existing blue recycle bins, while the green bins will be for other recyclable items. For academic and office buildings, recycling will be collected Tuesdays and Thursdays, and trash will be collected Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays.

Custodians now will pick up paper recycling from the blue deskside recycling bins located in offices.

The TWU residence halls have received large blue recycling bins that will collect all the recycling for the residence halls, including paper. Residence hall recycling will be collected Tuesdays and Thursdays, while trash will be picked up each day.

The City of Denton has placed six blue recycling dumpsters throughout campus to collect the recycling. These are located at the TWU Physical Plant, Hubbard Hall, the TWU Library, the Old Main Building, the Bralley Annex and the Student Union.

TWU RECEIVES \$50,000 FOR NEW DALLAS CENTER

A \$50,000 grant from the Unrestricted Fund of The Dallas Foundation is helping Texas Woman's University come closer to its fundraising goal for the new TWU T. Boone Pickens Institute of Health Sciences-Dallas Center.

TWU has raised more than \$53 million to date toward a \$55.5 million fundraising goal for the new Dallas building, which is scheduled to open in 2011.

Construction currently is under way on the new TWU T. Boone Pickens Institute of Health Sciences-Dallas Center, located at 5500 Southwestern Medical Drive. The 190,000-square-foot, eight-story facility combines TWU's Parkland and Presbyterian sites into a campus-in-one building at the Parkland location. The building will include the renowned TWU Stroke Center, a mock ICU, nursing simulation labs and physical and occupational therapy labs. The facility is being built for possible LEED (Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design) certification.

The TWU Board of Regents also recently approved plans to build a 600-space parking garage in 2011. The new garage will be built where the current Parkland education building sits and will include two-stories for future parking or classroom expansion.
