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TWU, DENTON LIBRARIES PRESENT SPECIAL PROGRAM

The TWU Blagg-Huey Library and the Emily Fowler Public Library in Denton will offer the campus and community free electronic access to a national conference on telecommunications networking Nov. 14-18. Sponsored by the National Telecommunications and Information Administration (NTIA), the Virtual Public Conference on Universal Service and Open Access to the Telecommunications Network will be conducted entirely through electronic networks using the Internet, dial-up bulletin board access, public information service providers and commercial service providers.

The NTIA will create a series of electronic mail discussion groups devoted to specific topics. Each topic will be assigned an Internet mailing list and a USENET newsgroup, and will be hosted by an expert in the field. The host will begin each day's discussion. Participants will be able to reply in two ways: a short response to the host that will be included in the conference's formal proceedings and by engaging in unmoderated discussion on the mailing list and newsgroup.

Discussion topics will include redefining universal service and open access, affordability and availability of the telecommunications network, intellectual property questions raised by the use of digital technology, personal privacy issues, and universal service and open access for individuals with disabilities.

Access to the conference will be available during regular library hours, and staff will be on hand to assist users. The Blagg-Huey Library is open from 8 a.m. to midnight, Monday through Thursday, and 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Friday. The Emily Fowler Public Library, located on Oakland Avenue, is open from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Monday, Wednesday and Friday, and 9 a.m. to 9 p.m. on Tuesday and Thursday.

TWU faculty and staff who have VENUS accounts may log in to the conference from their computers. The VENUS news items menu includes "NTIA Virtual Public Conference," which contains background information on the conference. Conference text will be posted daily in the bulletin board item on the main VENUS menu.

TWU's academic computing service is providing the public access account for both libraries. Working on the project are Dr. Don Edwards (academic computing), Elizabeth Snapp (TWU library) and Eva Poole, director of the Emily Fowler Public Library.
