
"We can be proud of our campaign statistics. In Denton, the amount donated was \$37,415.28; the goal was \$36,000, and the total represents a 7 percent increase over last year. In Dallas, employees gave \$13,864; their goal was \$12,000, and that total is 22.9 percent more than last year's donations. In Houston, faculty and staff donated \$4,899, a 1.7 percent increase over last year's total. Our participation rate in Denton was 35.9 percent, compared to 22 percent last year. Dallas and Houston participation

rates were 70 percent and 30 percent, compared to 72 percent and 18.7 percent in 1999-2000. Congratulations!"

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REP AWARDS ANNOUNCED

Eight new faculty members have received funds from the TWU Research Enhancement Program for their research and creative activities. "The research support committee recently evaluated proposals to the Research Enhancement Program that they received from new faculty -- those within their first three years of their appointment at TWU," said Dr. Sondra Ferstl (research and grants). "A total of \$40,831 in funding will support their projects."

Faculty members and their projects are listed below.

- *Dr. Kyle Biggerstaff* (kinesiology) -- \$5,969 for "Influence of Serum Triglycerides and Exercise on Insulin Responses Following an Oral Glucose Challenge;
- *Dr. Ellina Valerievna Grigorieva* (mathematics and computer science) -- \$2,812 for "Optimal Control of Microeconomic Models";
- Dr. Brenda Hail (Nursing, Houston) -- \$6,000 for "Inner Strength in HIV Infected Men";
- *Dr. Misty Hook* (psychology and philosophy) -- \$4,812 for "Let Me Show You: Mentors, Role Models and Multiple Role Planning of Young Women";
- *Dr. Ann Malecha* (Nursing, Houston) -- \$6,000 for "Barriers of Screening for Domestic Violence in the Workplace: A Study with Occupational Health Nurses";
- *Dr. Toni Roddey* (Physical Therapy, Houston) -- \$6,000 for "The Power of Touch: How Much Influence Does Physical Contact Have with Patients with Shoulder Impingement Syndrome over Those Receiving Standard Care? A Pilot Study";
- *Dr. Mary Snyder* (Library and Information Studies) -- \$5,900 for "Interactive HIV Prevention Education for Adolescents: A Meta-Analysis and Evaluation Study"; and
- *Dr. Kathryn Tart* (Nursing, Houston) -- \$3,338 for "Critical Thinking and the Nursing Care Plan: Measurement of Outcomes Impacting Nursing Practice."

"The Research Enhancement Program is the university's support of the research and creative activities of the faculty," added Ferstl. "The primary purpose of the program is to provide seed money so that a faculty member will be able to compete more successfully for larger grants from outside sources for continuation of the research project or creative activity."

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FACULTY GRANTS ANNOUNCED

Several TWU faculty members have received grants this fall from local, state and federal agencies for research or teaching, according to Dr. Sondra Ferstl (research and grants). Recipients and their projects are described below.

- *Dr. Linda Marshall* (sociology and social work) received \$121,756 from the Texas Department of Protective and Regulatory Services for the project titled "Strengthening the Bachelor of Social Work Program at TWU" from Sept. 1, 2000, through Aug. 31, 2001. The project contract between TWU and TDPRS provides specialized child welfare training to undergraduate social work students as they complete their Bachelor of Social work degrees, as well as field practicum experiences at the state agency in Child Protective Services. "The project should increase the number and qualifications of BSW graduates who enter child welfare practice, ultimately increasing the number and qualifications of practitioners who are well-prepared for CPS work," said Marshall.
- *Dr. Vicky MacLean* (Institute for Women's Health) was awarded a \$7,001 grant from United Way of Denton County Inc. for a project titled "Planning for Community-Oriented Health Systems" that began on Sept. 1, 2000, and continues through Jan. 15, 2001. The project assesses the health

utilization patterns of Denton community residents who are not covered by traditional forms of insurance (uninsured or underinsured).

- "The research will assess and summarize agency-level data from the major health providers in the larger Denton area who are partnering on this project -- Denton Community Hospital, Denton Regional Medical Center, the health department, MHMR and the Denton Independent School District nurses program," explained MacLean.
- *Dr. Jim Alexander* (history and government) has received a grant of \$400,460 from the Bill Blackwood Law Enforcement Management Institute of Texas for the "Law Enforcement Management Institute 2000-2001," beginning Sept. 1, 2000, through Aug. 31, 2001. TWU has provided instruction through LEMI to law enforcement managers for a number of years and is a partner with several other universities in the institute.
- *Dr. Charlotte Sanborn* (Institute for Women's Health) has been awarded a \$61,620 grant from the Public Health Service of the National Institutes of Health for the project "Effect of Exercise and Calcium on the Growing Bone." The grant period began April 1, 2000, and ends on March 31, 2001. "An important aspect of preventing osteoporosis is to increase peak bone mass. It would appear that the most critical time and best opportunity for increasing peak bone mass would be in children," explained Sanborn. "However, to date, the impact of an exercise and/or a nutrition education program specifically geared toward increasing bone mass in children is not known. Our overall goal is to prevent the occurrence of osteoporosis through lifestyle changes in exercise and nutrition."
- *Dr. Michael Droge* (Center for Student Research Support) received a grant of \$203,700 from the U.S. Department of Education for the project "TWU McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program," effective Oct. 1, 2000, through Sept. 30, 2001. With the grant, TWU will establish a Ronald E. McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program. "The first program goal is to improve the academic preparedness of low-income, first-generation TWU students and underrepresented TWU students so that they can become competitive for admission to graduate schools," said Droge. "The second goal is to increase the number of students who make a successful transition from undergraduate to graduate studies that lead to the doctoral degree." A

total of 20 students from six academic disciplines will be served during each year of funding. Those disciplines initially targeted for the program include English, family sciences, history, government, psychology and sociology/women's studies.

- *Dr. Jeffrey Huber* (Library and Information Studies, Houston) has been awarded a \$25,000 grant by the National Network of Libraries of Medicine for the project "Facilitating Access to Consumer Health Information," beginning Sept. 1, 2000, and ending July 31, 2001. The project will leverage the combined resources of TWU and the Dallas Public Library to facilitate access to consumer health information in the Dallas area.
- *Dr. Jeffrey Huber* (Library and Information Studies, Houston) also received a grant of \$39,978 for the project "Dallas AIDS Information Network"; the grant period began on Sept. 30, 2000, and ends on March 31, 2002. Funding from the grant will create the Dallas AIDS Information Network. DAIN will supply work stations at three community sites frequented by individuals who are affected by HIV/AIDS and those at risk for infection. "The project also will provide extensive training for members of the community on the use of electronic information resources," said Huber.


to 80 persons because of the cabaret-style theater arrangement. Reservations are required; for reservations, call the TWU theatre box office at 8-1-2020.
