## SOLONS SPEAKING AT COMMENCEMENT

More than 860 degrees will be conferred during spring commencement exercises at TWU on Sat., May 11. Three ceremonies are scheduled -- 9 a.m., 11:30 a.m. and 2 p.m. -- in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Students and family members with tickets are invited to attend.

The number of diplomas earned during the spring 1996 semester includes 639 undergraduate and 229 graduate degrees, according to Dr. Jim Stiles, registrar. (Approximately 650 students are expected to participate in their graduation ceremonies.) Times for commencement reflect candidate assignments, based on specific schools and colleges participating in the ceremonies listed below:

- 9 a.m. -- Ceremony I for candidates from the College of Arts and Sciences;
- 11:30 a.m. -- Ceremony II for graduates from the College of Education and Human Ecology, the School of Library and Information Studies, the School of Occupational Therapy and the School of Physical Therapy;
  - 2 p.m. -- Ceremony III for the College of Nursing and the College of Health Sciences.

Three members of the Texas Legislature will speak during commencement exercises: Rep. Burt Solomons, Ceremony I; Rep. Mary Denny, Ceremony II; and Sen. Florence Shapiro, Ceremony III.

A reception for graduates, their families and guests who attend Ceremony I or II will be held from 10 to 11 a.m. in the southwest dining room of Hubbard Hall. Graduates and their guests participating in Ceremony II or III are invited to a second reception in the same location from 12:30 to 1:30 p.m. TWU President Carol Surles will preside at each ceremony, which includes an academic procession, certification of degrees and a commencement address.

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### GROUP INSURANCE NEWS ANNOUNCED

Good news for TWU employees who participate in the Texas Employees Uniform Group Insurance Program -- rates will not increase during FY 1997 (the 1996-97 academic year) for HealthSelect, dental indemnity, term life, disability, and voluntary accidental death and dismemberment. Participating rates will decrease approximately 15 percent for the dental maintenance plan following the selection of Prudential Dental Maintenance Organization as the plan's new administrator. Participating HMO rates also will decrease an average of 1.8 percent.

The Employees Retirement Systems of Texas board also approved a new HealthSelect option -- HealthSelect Plus -- that will be available to employees and retirees in several areas, effective Sept. 1, 1996. HealthSelect Plus premiums will be almost 15 percent less than those for HealthSelect, yet they will offer enhanced benefits, low co-payments and low out-of-pocket costs. Enrollment will not require evidence of insurability, and pre-existing conditions will be covered.

HealthSelect networks and HMO service areas will continue to expand into additional areas. Currently more than 105,000 state employees and retirees who are enrolled in HealthSelect have in-area network coverage; approximately 6,500 more will become "in-area" on Sept. 1, 1996. Fifteen of 16 currently approved HMOs were approved to continue in UGIP in FY 1997.

Summer enrollment for these plans (plus TexFlex enrollment and re-enrollment) is held annually during July; changes in coverage should be made during that time as well. Staff members may observe the following holidays by substituting vacation or compensatory time or another holiday (if possible) for one of the holidays shown: Fri., Sept. 13, 1996 -- Rosh Hashanah; Sun., Sept. 22, 1996 -- Yom Kippur; or Fri., March 28, 1997 -- Good Friday. Supervisors must be notified in advance. "This schedule is based on a five-day work week and allows the university to suspend operations (except for essential functions) for one week at the end of December and one week during spring break," said Carri Stephens (human

resources). "Maintaining essential functions only for extended periods of time reduces our utility usage and continues necessary cost-saving measures." For details, call ext. 3555.

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### CHEMICAL WASTE DISPOSAL SET

The TWU department of public safety will dispose of chemicals from various offices and departments on campus during the week of May 20, 1996, from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. *by appointment only* at the chemical storage building next to the physical plant, according to Vicki Byrd, TWU's environmental safety and health officer. The following guidelines must be followed: Call public safety at ext. 2924 to obtain chemical waste disposal tags. Complete the information on the tag and attach it to the product that will be removed. A complete list, using proper chemical names and absolute amounts, must be compiled before disposal and given to the safety officer. Items labeled as organic waste will *not* be accepted unless identification of *all* chemicals in the waste is listed on the disposal tag. Also remember to call ext. 2924 and make an appointment for the chemical waste removal.

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## TWU PROGRAM RECEIVES ACCREDITATION FROM APA

The doctoral program in counseling psychology at TWU recently was awarded accreditation by the American Psychological Association's committee on accreditation; the next site visit will be done in 1998. From now until that year, TWU's program will be listed annually among accredited programs of professional psychology in the *American Psychologist*.

The committee's decision was based on its review of the program's application self-study report, the report of the site visit team and the program's response to the site visit report, according to Dr. Paul Nelson, director of program consultation and accreditation for APA. "The program demonstrates substantial compliance with the APA 'Criteria for Accreditation,' implemented in a manner consistent with its publicly stated goals and objectives," said Nelson. "The program enjoys strong support from central administration and is in the process of developing a comprehensive plan for the recruitment of a culturally diverse faculty and student body. In addition, theory and practice are well integrated throughout the program. Well articulated, the training model is unique in the counseling program."

This meeting provides under-graduate and graduate chemistry majors with an opportunity to present the results of their research to both their peers and professional chemists. Fifty students from 10 colleges and universities competed for cash prizes in the graduate and undergraduate categories; TWU students **Debra Dolliver** and **Rachal Vermillion-Salsbury** won second and third prizes, respectively, in the graduate division, and **Nora Morales** placed third in the undergraduate division.

Brown and Elliott's participation was supported by the TWU Minority Biomedical Research Support (MBRS) grant.

Faculty and students in the department of dental hygiene have participated in two major events recently. Faculty **Pat Fallon** and **Carolyn Ray** attended and presented poster sessions during the annual session of the American Association of Dental Schools in San Francisco, Calif. Their poster sessions were based on research findings in the department. Fallon presented "A comparison on the effectiveness of two wooden interdental cleaners," based on an article and abstract which she co-authored with faculty member **Chris French Beatty**, who was not able to attend the conference. Ray's poster presentation, "Chart evaluation as a student preparation for treatment of a periodontal patient," was based on research she co-wrote with Beatty. Beatty and Ray also co-authored an article and abstract titled "The effects of repeated experiences with problem-based learning," which was displayed as a poster presentation as well.

The department hosted the Texas Student American Dental Hygienists' Association annual session, in cooperation with the Texas Dental Hygienists' Association in Dallas April 12 and 13. More than 300 students and faculty, who represented all 15 dental hygiene programs, attended. Several persons from TWU presented a workshop on diversity titled "Country A to Country Z": Annise Wycoff (housing), Lee Sewell (Occupational Therapy), Dr. Evelyn Curry (Library and Information Studies), Joyce Parmentier (Academic Advising Center), Dr. Sinah Goode (kinesiology), Jean Yale (career services), Gail Williams (student life, Dallas), Debbie Wegmann (Nursing, Dallas), Dorothy Irelan (institutional advancement), Linda Robinson (library), Dr. Glenda Simmons (student life), Dr. Barbara Cramer (health studies) and Dr. Susan Ward (health studies). Dr. Eva Doyle (health studies) coordinated the workshop, facilitated a small group and spoke at lunch after the workshop concluded.

During the program's second day, dental hygiene faculty members from TWU -- Fall, Beatty, Ray, **Bettee Andrews, Dr. Nancy Glick, Jan Schoen** and **Leslie Shaw** -- served as

facilitators at a Dental Hygiene Course Fair for other faculty who attended the conference. The course fair comprised round table discussions related to courses that are common to all Texas dental hygiene programs. Participants received information on teaching strategies, laboratory and clinical experiences, and evaluation methods.

Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) has agreed to serve as a member of the state affairs committee for the Council of Public University Presidents and Chancellors. The committee, chaired by Dr. Glenn Goerke, president of the University of Houston, attempts to identify issues that can be addressed best through collective efforts during legislative sessions, working with suggestions from various support organizations in higher education.
