FLOYD ISSUES MAIL SCREENING CHECKLIST

In light of recent anthrax-related incidents and scares around the country, Dr. Brenda Floyd (finance and administration) has provided the TWU community with the following mail screening checklist:

Individuals responsible for processing incoming mail should be aware of the possibility of anthrax threat letters, even though the threat to the university is very remote. This checklist outlines common features of suspicious letters.

- No return address
- Excessive postage
- Hand written or poorly typed addresses
- Misspelling of common words
- Restrictive markings such as "Confidential," "Personal," etc.
- Excessive weight and/or leaking of a powdery substance
- Shows a city or state in the postmark that does not match the return address

If you receive a letter or note threatening anthrax contamination, remain calm. Although any threatened use of a biological agent must be treated as though it is real, experience has demonstrated that these are likely to be a hoax. If the suspected biological agent is reported as anthrax, be assured that it is NOT contagious, from person to person, and that treatment is readily available when administered before the onset of symptoms.

What Should You Do

If it is a letter that you have opened, set it down gently at the location where you first read it, then move to an area that will minimize your exposure to others. Avoid contact with others when possible, and remain in the area. Public Safety and EMS responders will come to you.

- If it is a note that you happen to find, LEAVE IT ALONE. Call the TWU DPS office immediately.
- Do not allow others into the area. If anyone enters, they should stay until instructed to leave by Public Safety or EMS responders.

 Remain calm. Exposure does not mean that you will become sick. EMS responders will provide specific information and instructions about the symptoms and effective treatment to prevent illness.

What Should You Not Do

- Do not pass the letter or note to others to look at.
- Do not disturb any contents in the letter or note. Handling the letter may only spread the substance inside and increase the chances of it getting into the air.
- Do not ignore the threat. It must be treated as real until properly evaluated.

If You Receive A Threat By Telephone

What Should You Do

- Call the TWU DPS immediately.
- Remain calm. Similar threats have all proven false, and this is likely to be a hoax as well.

What You Should Not Do

- Do not ignore the threat. It must be treated as real until properly evaluated.
- Do not argue with/or antagonize the caller.
- Listen carefully to the caller so you can recall the details later. Listen for background noises.

"The celebration of the Centennial of TWU seemed an ideal time to reflect on our century of service and to assess our contributions and plan for our future endeavors," Dr. Bridges said. TWU was established in 1901 by the Texas Legislature.

There have been several histories of TWU written over the years. The major comprehensive history of the first 75 years of TWU was authored by the late Dr. Joyce Thompson, professor of English, and published in 1982. That work - *Marking A Trail* - has been a valuable resource for all of TWU for the past 20 years.

"The Centennial history draws upon the earlier works about TWU and brings us up to date. The title for the Centennial history - *Marking A Trail: The Quest Continues* - was chosen to honor the work of the past and to affirm that TWU perseveres in the goal to provide outstanding educational opportunities in the same spirit as the founders described a century ago," Dr. Bridges said.

Dr. Bridges has been a member of the TWU faculty for 30 years and was named an honorary alumna and was awarded a medallion for meritorious service to the university. She has served on many TWU committees, and currently serves on the TWU Alumnae Board and as chair of scholarships for the Alumnae Association. She is a member of the Faculty Senate representing arts and sciences, and is chair of the board for campus publications. She also helped secure funding for TWU's new library in the 1980s.

CELEBRATION TO CENTER ON CHAPEL, GARDENS

The Celebrating A Texas Treasure symposium will be Nov. 1-2 at TWU's Denton campus. Among the activities to be held at the two-day event include a lecture about Little Chapel-in-the-Woods architect O'Neil Ford by Dallas Morning News architecture critic David Dillon, a discussion about the

renovation of historic homes, a celebration of the Little Chapel's restoration, discussions on xerioscaping by accomplished gardener Neil Sperry, and a lecture about former first lady Eleanor Roosevelt.

Mrs. Roosevelt was involved in the dedication of the Little Chapel in 1939. Blanche Wiesen Cook, professor of history and women's studies at John Jay College and the Graduate Center of the City University of New York and biographer of Mrs. Roosevelt, will discuss the life of the former first lady. Her lecture is underwritten by the Joyce Thompson Endowed Memorial Lecture in American Literature and Culture.

As part of the University's Centennial Project, TWU also is celebrating the beauty of the gardens. In 1930, TWU faculty began the transformation of a seven-acre "weed patch" into what is now the Botanical Garden area. A self-guided walking trail, which focuses on the identification of trees and shrubs, will be marked during the two-day symposium.

SECC CAMPAIGN NEARS END

A progress report on TWU's State Employee Charitable Campaign shows the Denton campus is more than halfway toward its \$50,000 goal. The campaign ends Oct. 31.

Dr. Evelyn Curry (library science) and Dr. Lynda Murphy (graduate school) report that \$30,416 had been donated as of Oct. 18, reaching 61 percent of the goal thus far. The participation rate stood at about 25 percent, with 212 out of 858 employees participating.

The SECC 2001 theme is 50 + 50 = 100 in honor of the university's Centennial year. The goals for the campaign are \$50,000 in donations and a 50 percent participation rate. The campaign ends Oct. 31.

BIKE RALLY TO RAISE SCHOLARSHIP FUNDS

Bicycle riders will take to the streets Saturday, Nov. 3 to raise funds for a TWU scholarship endowment and youth at-risk scholarships for city of Denton Parks and Recreation programs, as well as to welcome Jim Damico, who is pedaling 8,500 miles to benefit the TWU endowment fund.

The Show Me America Bike Rally will include a 25-mile rally course and a 10-mile family fun ride through Denton. Rally and fun ride participants will receive T-shirts and can participate in post-ride activities on the TWU campus. Activities will include live musical entertainment, face painting and refreshments.

Early registration for either ride is \$25 per person by Oct. 26. Families of four or more can register for \$15 per person. Registration will take place at the Denton Civic Center, 321 East McKinney St. through Nov. 2. For registration information, call (940) 349-8125. Registration also will be available the day of the event beginning at 7 a.m. on Bell Avenue near Pioneer Hall on the TWU campus.

A portion of the proceeds from the Show Me America Bike Rally will benefit the Nancy Johnson Coyle Endowment Fund, established at Texas Woman's University for master of arts degree Women's Studies scholarships. Proceeds also will benefit youth at-risk scholarships for Denton Parks and Recreation programs.

Nancy Johnson Coyle died in 1998 at the age of 41 after a long illness. She lived in Denton since 1968, was married at the Little Chapel-in-the-Woods on the TWU campus in 1990, and was in the process of earning a degree at TWU when she died. Mrs. Johnson-Coyle's family established the Nancy Johnson Coyle Endowment Fund in her memory, and to date two scholarships have been awarded.

To help keep Nancy's memory alive and raise additional funds for the endowment, her cousin, Jim Damico, is making an 8,500-mile bicycle ride across the United States. Jim is scheduled to complete the ride, which will end at the TWU campus in Denton, on Nov 3. He will join rally participants and complete his trek with them.
