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SUMMER ENROLLMENT UP

Enrollment for Summer I and III 1994 is showing a 2.5 percent increase over the same time last year, according to preliminary figures (Day 5) released by the TWU office of research and statistics. Compared to last year's final and official enrollment of 5,500, this year's unofficial comparison indicates an increase of 135 students. "We are really excited about the numbers," said Dr. Paul Travis, dean of enrollment management. "Counselors and recruiters in the office of admissions worked closely with students this spring, encouraging them to attend classes during the summer. Of course, many of our summer students attend TWU to work on teacher certification or other professional education needs."

Increases have occurred in the number of incoming undergraduate students, particularly freshmen (58 more than the same time last year), as well as African American and Hispanic students (an increase of 32 and 57 students, respectively).

Travis attributes part of the increases to the work of admissions counselors, as well as a new advertising campaign -- "Be Summer Smart" -- that encouraged students (transfers, nontraditional, high school and traditional) to consider summer school at TWU this year.

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NEW STUDENTS TO ATTEND MANDATORY SUMMER ORIENTATIONS

Three separate orientation sessions have been scheduled for new students at TWU: June 23-25, July 15-17 and July 22-24. Beginning this summer, orientation is mandatory for all first-time college applicants, as well as transfer students who have less than 30 semester credit hours and who have received an offer of admission to TWU. If these students do not attend orientation, they will be "blocked" from registering for fall classes until fall orientation, which will be held in August.

"Summer orientation is a special three-day program designed to introduce new students and their families to the unique educational experience that is Texas Woman's University," said Dr. Glenda Simmons, vice president for student life. "Participants will learn about academic programs, financial assistance, housing and meal plans, as well as the many services, facilities, and recreational and cultural activities at TWU. They will take placement tests, tour the campus, visit Denton and have a good time!"

Parents and other family members are encouraged to attend orientation programs, too. Special sessions will be offered to provide guests with information about university life, financial aid, registration, student services, class scheduling and other topics. Students, families and guests can pick up their orientation packets in the Student Center at the beginning of each three-day session.

A \$55 registration fee is required for each orientation participant -- including students, parents or guests. The fee includes a social, two breakfasts, one luncheon, one dinner, two

refreshment breaks and all orientation materials. (An additional fee is charged for housing.) Orientation registration and housing reservations, plus payment, must be received by July 1 for the July sessions. (A June 10 deadline has already passed for this month's program.) A \$10 late registration fee will be charged after that date, and any reservations received after the deadline will be accepted on a space-available basis.

Special one-day orientation sessions will be offered before the beginning of the fall 1994 semester for graduate students (Aug. 22), nontraditional students (Aug. 23), transfer students who have more than 30 semester credit hours (Aug. 24) and international students (Aug. 25). 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THEATRE '94 PRESENTS SUMMERFEST WITH DLOC

Summer stock comes to Denton this year with two theatrical treats, "The House of Blue Leaves" by John Guare and "Little Shop of Horrors" by Howard Ashman and Alan Menken. Presented by TWU Theatre '94 Summerfest and the Denton Light Opera Company (for "Little Shop"), these two presentations mark the university's inaugural season of summer-fare plays. "With the assistance of the Denton Light Opera Company, this summer's venture marks the second tim that our two companies have teamed up to entertain the community," said Charles Harrill, chair of the drama program in the department of performing arts. "We are excited to be able to bring four weeks of summertime fun and contemporary drama to North Texas audiences."

"Blue Leaves" will be presented on Fri. and Sat., June 24-25 and July 1-2, at 8 p.m. and on Sun., July 3, at 2 p.m. All performances will be held in Redbud Theatre. Tickets are \$7 for adults (non-students); \$5 for students, children, senior citizens and TWU faculty/staff; and \$3 for TWU students with valid identification.

Directed by Susan Jordan of Greeley, Colo., "Blue Leaves" is a dark comedy set in the 1960s. The play focuses on Artie Shaughnessy, a middle-aged zoo attendant who wants to be a songwriter. In October 1965 (on the day that the Pope makes his first visit to New York), Artie's mistress persuades him to call an old school friend — now a big Hollywood producer — and ask him about a job writing music for films. That same day, Artie's son returns home AWOL (absent without leave) from Fort Dix with a bomb, planning to blow up the Pope in Yankee Stadium.

"Blue Leaves," winner of the 1971 Critic's Choice Award and the Obie Award as best American play, was recently revived on Broadway. "The play has a special relevance for today's audience," said director Jordan. "The characters and themes, familiar to us in the '90s, play on many levels. The play especially examines the American condition and upheavals of the 1960s."

"Feed me, Seymour!" Many audiences will remember this line from the "Little Shop of Horrors," directed by D. Gregg Martinez...the "gleefully gruesome," off-Broadway hit musical with books and lyrics by Ashman and music by Menken. Set in 1958, the play tells the story of Seymour, a lowly florist's asssistant, whose popularity grows when an adorable but unearthly plant comes to the shop to "reside." His happiness turns to panic when he learns that the plant has a voracious appetite for humans. Seymour tries to win the love of Audrey, who also works in the flower shop, while he keeps the singing and dancing plant satisfied.

"Little Shop" will be co-produced by TWU Theatre '94 and DLOC, and the play will feature the actual Audrey II from the original off-Broadway production designed by Martin B. Robinson. FACULTY RECEIVE GRANTS

Several faculty members have recently received federal and state grants to fund research projects in education, library and information studies, chemistry and physics, and a number of other areas. The grants were announced by Dr. Sondra Ferstl, associate dean for research in the office of research and grants.

- Dr. Peggy Drapo and Charlotte Patrick (Nursing) were awarded a \$161,552 grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services, Health Resources and Services Administration, for their project, "TWU CARES: Nurse Managed Center for Underserved Clients." The grant period begins Sept. 30, 1994, and ends Sept. 29, 1995. The overall purpose of the project is to expand nursing practice arrangements in order to increase clinical experience in a non-institutional setting -- the TWU CARES Health Center. The center was developed and is managed by the TWU College of Nursing to demonstrate methods that improve access to primary health care in a medically underserved community (in Denton).
- Dr. Irma Guadarrama (reading and bilingual education) has received a federal grant from the U.S. Department of Education for her project, "Short Term Training -- DUAL2: District-University All Experiential Second Language Teacher Short Term Training Program." The \$129,022 award includes the period from Sept. 1, 1994, to Aug. 31, 1995. The goals of the DUAL2 Project are to implement a training program for 90 teachers a year who work with language minority students, mostly Spanish-speaking with some southeast Asian students, in the Fort Worth Independent School District and to develop a curriculum guideline appropriate for the target population.
- Dr. Elizabeth Protas (Physical Therapy-Houston) was awarded \$71,110 from the National Institutes of Health, Child Health and Human Development, for her project, "Post Doctoral Research Fellowships." The federal grant, which begins July 1, 1994, and ends June 30, 1995, will be used to train two post-doctoral fellows in physical therapy and geriatric research. The 36-month program includes coursework in physical therapy, with a special focus in geriatric rehabilitation and specialized research experience with the elderly.
- Dr. Keith Swigger (Library and Information Studies) has received two federal grants from the U.S. Department of Education: \$66,000 for "Meeting the Critical Needs of New Librarians" (Aug. 1, 1994, to Oct. 31, 1995) and \$48,000 for "Doctoral Fellowships -- Library Career Training Program" (Aug. 1, 1994, through July 31, 1995). The new librarians project will provide support for three students to earn the MLS or MA in library science. This group of new librarians will address the profession's critical needs for a more diverse work force and for specialists in the areas of children's services, cataloging and science reference. The fellowships grant will educate persons fully prepared to join the ranks of faculties of programs in library and information studies by enabling two fellows from previous awards to continue their doctoral studies, according to Swigger.
- Dr. Carlton Wendel (chemistry and physics) and Dr. Ruth Caswell (reading and bilingual education) have received a grant from the Texas Education Agency for their project, "Coordinated Thematic Instruction Program," for \$15,608. The grant period began Jan. 31, 1994, and extends through May 31, 1995. TWU, the Region IX Educational Service Center and TEA have formed a collaborative group to provide professional development in the teaching of coordinated thematic science to science teachers in Region IX. The program will broaden the

science content background of the teachers, will model the descriptive/experiential/semiquantitative approach to science teaching, and will assist teachers with preparation of classroom materials to teach coordinated thematic science. Up to 28 public and private school teachers will participate.

■ Dr. Michael Wiebe (Education and Human Ecology) was awarded a state grant from the Texas Education Agency for "Mentor Teacher Training Project." The \$15,000 grant began on Jan. 14, 1994, and will conclude on Aug. 31, 1994. This project is designed to expand the pilot project phase of a mentor teacher training program. The need to implement a field-based, pre-service pilot program at TWU requires that a critical mass of trained mentor teachers from member school districts be in place before this fall, according to Wiebe.
