ONE-CARD ACCESS SYSTEM COMING IN STAGES

The first stage of installation for the one-card/entry access system at TWU, which will allow students to use their ID cards to enter housing and purchase meals, is nearing completion. The system eventually will allow card holders to make bookstore purchases and will serve as a debit card for other payments and purchases on campus. It has been installed in the Denton residence halls, and Dallas and Houston will be completed soon, according to Beth Lewis (student life), who is administering the contract for the system.

The system will provide better service for students, said Lewis. "For example, we now put stickers on identification cards to indicate whether a student is enrolled at TWU. By using the new (security) system, the student's status will be verified with one swipe of the card, which features a magnetic strip on the back that contains information about the user," she explained. All students living in Denton residence halls and half of the student body on the main campus have received new cards (or have been "re-badged"). Students on the Dallas and Houston campuses will be "re-badged" as soon as staff training is completed.

"This (system) is an additional security measure," said Dr. Richard Nicholas (student life). "The new card must be carried the same as anyone carries her or his key at all times." The system's final security stage -- the 24-hour, card-access-only system -- will be implemented after the 1997 fall semester begins.

Although individual rooms in Reagan Houston and Mary Hufford halls will not be part of the entry access system, the lounges, laundry rooms, computer labs and recreation rooms have been wired. "Proximity readers also have been installed for handicapped students who have difficulty using a key," said Nancy Murphy-Chadwick (housing). "The system gives us more flexibility and security. Now, if a student loses the card, we can void the card and issue a new one instead of changing the lock."

The system for food purchases has worked with few problems, Nicholas said. "Although the debit portion of the system is not on-line, we hope to test it soon. The debit card will be available first for use in the bookstore. Card users will have the option of using it for the laundry, vending machines and retail food purchases. At other universities with similar systems, sales have increased. This is one way the university can earn more revenue," he explains. "Also, since the system has been on-line, it means that some students don't have to go to payment settlement to purchase their meals."

Several of the one-card services also will be offered to faculty and staff. "The card can be used to make purchases at printing services, to pay for parking permits at public safety and to buy tickets for a variety of events," said Lewis. Academic buildings will be fitted with the system at a later date. All TWU faculty and staff must replace their current picture ID cards with the new "video image" identification cards; those dates, times and instructions (plus information about the same procedure in Dallas and Houston) will printed in *TWU Update* when details are available. TWU, TI MENTOR FUTURE ENGINEERS

"13" really *is* a lucky number for TWU students in the 3+2 engineering program that includes Texas Instruments Inc. and Texas A&M University. Thirteen TWU mathematics and computer science majors were given an opportunity to choose a mentor from TI; seven pairs of students and mentors have been matched to date, and those persons recently met each other this month. While mentors and TWU students enjoyed a pizza party, they also began to develop professional relationships that will contribute to the growth of engineering in general.

TWU students participating in the mentoring program with TI include sophomore Sylvia Benavides, sophomore Cathy Reiber and junior Crystal Smith of Denton; freshman Kelly Nance of Sanger; freshman Brandy Parrish of Lewisville; junior Amber Simpson of Carrollton; junior Theresa Kubis of Gainesville; sophomore Danielle Ford of Dallas; sophomore Tiffanie Norris of Arlington; junior Tonia Crockett of Forestburg, Texas; sophomore Kimberly Gaines of Port Arthur; freshman Gabriela Ruanova of Mexico; and junior Tai-Chun Wei of Taiwan.

"In mid-April, we sent letters to these 13 students, who had expressed an interest in having a mentor in the engineering field," said Dr. Frances Thompson (mathematics and computer science). "Students read the biographies of mentors who had volunteered to help; they then sent back their top three choices, plus an autobiography. We then matched the students and engineers, and our pizza party was the first time the group had a chance to meet."

Student/mentor pairs who are meeting include: Benavides and Kathy Morse, mechanical/materials engineering/equipment engineer; Gaines and Ann Stewart Runge, software engineer; Nance and Jeanne Kamman, software design engineer; Norris and Jerri Crowley, electrical engineering/programming, electronic design automation; Reiber and Sylvia Pas, electrical engineering/technologist; Ruanova and Carolyn Glass, electrical engineering/field applications; and Simpson and Wendy Elmore, software design engineer.

"We have asked our students to learn from their mentors -- to look for a different perspective and to learn more about their fields," said Thompson. "We've also suggested that they contact their mentors when the course work may be rough...not for tutoring, but for a pep talk that will remind them the effort is worth the work. And we want them to discuss career-related topics, like dual income marriages and job interviews."

The 3+2 dual degree program between the TWU College of Arts and Sciences and the Dwight Look College of Engineering at Texas A&M University allows students to earn two degrees -- one in mathematics and the other in engineering -- simultaneously. Under the joint program, students who complete the TWU and A&M curricula will receive the appropriate bachelor of science degree in mathematics from TWU and in engineering from Texas A&M.

Students also have an opportunity to participate in an internship at Texas Instruments. Last year, TI funded a new computer laboratory for TWU mathematics and computer science majors who will participate in the 3+2 program. For details, call Thompson at ext. 2166.

- All purchase orders and/or equipment requests that require written bids must be received by the purchasing office *no later than May 30, 1997*. This deadline includes all orders and/or equipment requests that total **more than \$5,000 but less than \$15,000**.
- All purchase orders that involve **STATE OPEN** (orders **totaling \$15,000 or more**) must be received in purchasing *on or before June 26, 1997*.
- All purchase orders for **STATE CONTRACT** items that will be purchased with funds budgeted from the 1996-97 fiscal year must be received by purchasing *on or before Aug. 8, 1997*.
- All other purchase orders for direct purchases from vendors using 1996-97 funds (less than \$5,000) must be received by the purchasing office *no later than Aug. 15, 1997*.
