COME ONE, COME ALL...TO HONORS CONVOCATION

Honors Convocation, the day on which outstanding faculty, staff and students are acknowledged, will be held on Thurs., April 18, at 10:30 a.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Dr. Carol Surles (president's office) has announced that all classes on the Denton campus will be dismissed from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. on Thursday for the ceremonies. Offices that can be closed during this period may post a notice indicating when they will reopen, and offices that cannot close should arrange for coverage during the convocation.

Former TWU President Mary Evelyn Blagg-Huey will deliver the keynote address. Huey, the seventh president and first woman to serve as TWU's chief executive officer, is an alumna of the university and holds three graduate degrees. She was named to TWU's presidency in 1976 and led the university in that capacity for 10 years; previously she served as dean of the TWU Graduate School and a professor of government. During her administration, Huey accomplished her goals of boosting and stabilizing enrollment, improving academic standards, building a new library (which was named in her honor) for the Denton campus and bolstering an endowment fund. She currently is involved in the Denton County Sesquicentennial, the All War Veterans Memorial and a host of other activities. She travels widely and continues to support TWU.

Huey was inducted into the first Texas Women's Hall of Fame by Gov. Mark White in 1984 in recognition of her contributions to higher education. She also was awarded the Secretary of Defense Medal for Outstanding Public Service after serving as chairperson of the defense advisory committee on Women in the Services in 1983, and she was instrumental in getting the U.S. Army to reverse its decision not to promote women. Huey helped establish the first ROTC unit in the nation at a women's university. She also is a TWU Distinguished Alumna.

The general public is invited to attend this event, and the TWU National Alumnae Association will host a picnic for everyone on the Pioneer Woman Circle after the program.

The line of march for the academic procession will form at 10:20 a.m. on the circular drive immediately in front of the Music Building and will move into MJPH promptly at 10:30 a.m. Program participants, honorees and others who will be seated on stage will precede the academic procession into the hall. SUMMER WORK SCHEDULE ANNOUNCED

The 1996 summer work scheduled has been announced by the office of the vice president for fiscal affairs. A memorandum by Don Henry was distributed April 9 and included the following information:

"Last fall, the president appointed faculty and staff to serve on a study committee to review the summer four-day work week schedule. The committee concluded that although there is a high degree of employee satisfaction with the four-day summer schedule, there are operational concerns that need to be addressed.

"With this in mind, the summer schedule of May 13 through Aug. 23, 1996, will require university offices to be open from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday. As in the past, selected offices will have extended hours in order to meet the needs of students and the public.

"When the size of the department work force permits, supervisors may allow flex time for employees who wish to work a schedule of four 10-hour days during the summer. However, it will still be necessary for these offices to schedule employees to cover each work day from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday." TWU Theatre '96 closes its spring season with a contemporary adult comedy by David Ives titled "Words, Words, Words..." at Redbud Theatre April 19-24 at 8 p.m. each night (except Sunday), plus a 2 p.m. show on April 21. CHOIRS WILL OFFER JOINT CONCERT

Both the TWU Concert Choir and the TWU Flute Choir will share the stage for the first time in a joint concert on Mon., April 22, at 8 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Conducted by Dr. Thomas Brown and Dr. Pamela Youngblood, respectively (both performing arts, music), the Concert Choir will be accompanied by David McClinton; Leah Johnston is assistant director.

The Concert Choir program will feature selections that the chorus sang for the American Choral Directors Association Southwest Division Convention in Dallas last month. The choir was selected to perform after auditions of women's choirs from a seven-state region. Included among the pieces will be the 1982 TWU Choral Composition Competition winner "Daylight and Moonlight" by John Corine; John Leavitt's "Cantatel"; and Hey Nonny No" by Crystal Kowelski.
