#### TWU CARES OPEN HOUSE CELEBRATES PARTNERSHIPS

TWU CARES about the community by helping others, especially citizens of Denton and surrounding areas who need health care and who often cannot afford to see a doctor. The primary care health clinic, located in the Phoenix Apartments at 312 S. Ruddell Dr., has provided health care screenings, referrals and education to medically underserved residents for more than 10 years. That decade of service includes partnerships with a number of organizations that enhance the services TWU CARES provides.

An open house celebrating TWU CARES' service to the community and collaborations with eight partners will be held on Wed., May 17, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. at the health clinic on South Ruddell, near the COPS office in the apartment complex. The general public and other interested persons are invited to attend. Entertainment and refreshments will be provided.

"About a year and a half ago, we began scheduling regular weekly visits by a representative from the greater Fort Worth chapter of the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America," said Paul Hill (Nursing), a registered nurse who manages the TWU Health Care Center. "Pearl Jones, their executive director in Fort Worth, will attend the open house, which she helped us plan. We also welcome representatives from AIDS Services of North Texas, who assist clients at TWU CARES almost daily."

TWU CARES has formed collaborative partnerships over the years with the Texas Department of Health, AIDS Services of North Texas, the City of Denton, United Way of Denton County, the Flow Health Care Foundation, the Denton Housing Authority, the Denton County Commissioners Court and the greater Fort Worth chapter of the Sickle Cell Disease Association of America. Representatives from those organizations will attend the open house, and free printed information will be available.

From a few hundred appointments during its first year to more than 1,400 in 1999, TWU CARES Health Center continues to serve more citizens of the Denton area annually. Last year, 619 individuals made 1,428 visits to the clinic, and that total number of visits represents a 14 percent increase over 1998, according to Hill. Mike Voy, a credit analyst with Jefferson Heritage Bank, chairs the clinic's advisory board, and Pat Jones joined the center in 1999 as the center's family nurse practitioner.

TWU CARES Health Center, a United Way agency, began as a health education, referral and assessment unit. CARES offered immunizations and health education for children during back-to-school fairs; health information and referrals for older residents during programs at facilities for senior citizens; and onsite assessments conducted by TWU nursing faculty and students who volunteered to staff the center. Those students then benefited by participating in that learning environment.

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### GRADUATES MARCHED TOWARD THEIR FUTURES LAST WEEK

More than 740 students from TWU celebrated the end of their academic careers and the beginning of their professional lives when commencement exercises were held on Sat., May 13, in Pioneer Hall. The ceremonies were held at 9 a.m. and 1 p.m. Commencement speakers were Texas Rep. David Farabee of Wichita Falls and Texas Rep. Dianne White Delisi of Temple for ceremonies I and II, respectively. Farabee discussed "Diversity to Interdependence," and Delisi talked about "Shakespeare.com." The number of degrees earned during the spring 2000 semester includes 546 undergraduate and 203 graduate degrees, according to Dr. Jim Stiles (registrar).

Ceremony I, at 9 a.m., included candidates from the College of Education and Human Ecology, the College of Nursing, the School of Library and Information Studies, the School of Occupational Therapy and the School of Physical Therapy. Ceremony II featured graduates from the College of Arts and Sciences and the College of Health Sciences. Dr. Ann Stuart (president's office) presided at both ceremonies, which included an academic procession, certification of degrees and a commencement address. Students, faculty, staff and friends of communication sciences major Amanda Fleming of Tyler remembered her accomplishments and applauded for family members who accepted her diploma during the afternoon ceremony. Fleming was killed in a four-vehicle accident on Highway 377 near Roanoke

last Thursday -- two days before graduation. Fleming had planned to start graduate studies at TWU next week. The department has begun efforts to establish a scholarship in Fleming's name; call 8-1-2025 for details.

Farabee, who represents District 69, is a native of Wichita Falls and attended public school and college in that area; he graduated from Midwestern State University with a bachelor's degree. A former Eagle Scout, he has served on a number of civic and community boards of directors, including Hospice of Wichita Falls, Leadership Wichita Falls, United Way and others. In the Texas House, he serves on the higher education committee and the county affairs committee. Farabee, the second son of former Texas Sen. Ray Farabee and the late Helen Farabee, will return to the House for the legislature's 77th regular session in 2001; he is married and has three children.

Delisi, who represents District 55, was first elected to the Texas House of Representatives in 1990. Currently serving her fifth term, Delisi is a senior member of the House committee on appropriations' education subcommittee. During the last legislative session, she chaired the House appropriations' subcommittee on tobacco settlement disbursement. She also has served on the House committee on public health and chaired the I-35 Legislative Task Force. Delisi currently serves as vice chair of the Veterans and Military Affairs Coalition, and she is actively involved in a number of other civic and community organizations. She is a fifth-generation Texan who graduated from Temple High School, earned a bachelor's degree from Southern Methodist University and a master's degree from the University of Colorado. Delisi has two children and two great-grandchildren.

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### TWU HOSTS CW2K CONFERENCE FOR THE HI-TECH WRITER

Get with the program. That, it would seem, is what the Computers and Writing 2000 Conference (CW2K) is all about -- programs.

Hosted by TWU, the annual international conference will be held May 25-28, 2000, at the Worthington Hotel in Fort Worth; the event's official theme is "Evolution, Revolution and Implementation: Computers and Writing for Global Change." Focusing on the teaching of computer-assisted writing in school and work environments, the conference features "threads" such as virtual/distance learning, publishing, computer-mediated communication, pedagogy, development through advanced composition,

English as a second language and technology theory.

Special events will include education and small business workshops, a technology product design competition, a "Web Across the World" contest for K-12 students and a special "Teachers and Administrators Day" for public K-12 teachers and administrators.

Dr. Dene Grigar (English, speech and foreign languages) serves as chair of the CW2K conference. "This entire event is really about advocating the use of computers in teaching," Grigar said. "Our mission is to teach teachers about how to use the technology effectively." Keynote speakers at the conference are: Miquel de Icaza of the "Gnome Project" in Mexico City, Mexico; Dr. Hugh Burns (English, speech and foreign languages); and the Russianwebgirls, five female Russian web professionals who live and work in New York.

The other featured speakers will include: Mark Amerika, an Internet performing artist from Boulder, Colo.; Pat Cadigan, an award-winning "Cyberpunk" author from London, England; Ellen Datlow, fantasy book author, former fiction editor for *Omni* Magazine and current editor of SCIFI.COM, the Science Fiction Channel website; and Victor Vitanza, editor and publisher of *Pre/Text* and author of *CyberReader*.

In addition to technology training outreach programs, and both onsite and online workshops, the CW2K conference also will feature a variety of "strands," or special sessions devoted to one particular area of study or concern. Strands will include: teaching with computers, communicating across the curriculum, feminism and technology, professionalizing and publishing.

Teachers and administrators from the realms of public and private K-12 schools and higher education are invited to take part in CW2K. Business professionals, especially those from the arenas of technical and professional writing and publishing, are also strongly encouraged to attend.
