MORE THAN \$3.7 MILLION IN GRANTS RECEIVED TO DATE

TWU's Office of Research and Sponsored Programs reports that 48 grants and contracts have been funded to date in Fiscal Year 2007 for a total of \$3,702,815. Highlights of May awards include two projects that were awarded more than \$235,000 in federal funding.

"Phosphorescent PLEDs" by Dr. **Manal Omary** (chemistry and physics) was awarded a \$150,000 Department of Defense grant. Dr. Omary's research will use innovative strategies to increase the light output of PLEDs (polymer light-emitting diodes) by chemically reacting the polymers with carefully-designed metal precursors to make the resulting polymers inherently luminescent. Actual PLED devices will be fabricated based on the brightest polymers produced in the first phase of the project.

"Algebra in the Middle Schools" by **Catherine Banks** (mathematics and computer science) was awarded an \$86,994 U.S. Department of Education grant. The project will provide support for 17 middle school teachers and three pre-service teachers to attend a state mathematics conference and two graduate courses focused on teaching algebra in middle school.

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board approved \$93,008 in funding for a TWU-Dallas ISD High School Bridge Program. The project, proposed by Dr. **Judith Bean** (academic affairs), will provide 75 Dallas Independent School District high school students free access to instruction to improve their readiness for college during a fourweek summer program.

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FACULTY, ADMINISTRATORS TO ATTEND SUMMER INSTITUTE

A team of six TWU faculty and administrators has been selected to attend the 2007 SENCER (Science Education for New Civic Engagements and Responsibilities) Summer Institute Aug. 3-6 in Portland, Maine. SENCER is a comprehensive faculty development and science education reform project funded by the National Science Foundation.

The SENCER Summer Institute is one component of a national dissemination program designed to improve undergraduate science education and stimulate civic engagement through the design and development of courses that teach basic science through complex, unsolved public issues.

Participation in the institute is by invitation only, with support from the NSF. TWU participants are Dr. **Ann Staton** (College of Arts & Sciences), Dr. **Don Edwards** (math and computer science), Dr. **Barbara Lerner** (TWU P-16), Dr. **Sarah McIntire** (biology), Dr. **Richard Sheardy** (chemistry and physics) and Dr. **Richard Jones** (chemistry).
