NEW AREA CODE WILL AFFECT DENTON

The Texas Public Utilities Commission recently approved a new telephone area code for Denton County -- "940" -- that will replace most of the northern portion of the current "817" area code, effective May 25, 1997. Denton County then will include three area codes: "940," as described; "254" for most of the southern portion of the current "817" area code; and "817" for metropolitan Fort Worth and surrounding areas (Azle, Grapevine, Keller, Reno and Springtown).

Beginning May 25, according to news from GTE, TWU in Denton will begin using the new "940" area code. Starting Sun., Aug. 24, only calls using the correct area code, when required, will be completed. In other words, calls placed to Denton using the old area code "817" after May 25 will be forwarded for only three months. Long distance charges will apply only to calls that were long distance calls before the area code split, and callers in Denton must dial the area code before the 7-digit local number to complete the call.

These changes will affect telephone registration, business calls and all printed materials for TWU. All departments, offices, colleges and schools should consider this change of information as they order new or re-order current envelopes, letterhead, business cards, labels and other items. When possible, request an amount that will be sufficient until the May 25, 1997, area code change; then order materials with the new area code imprinted.

THE ARTS "MARCH" ON

During the month of March -- even with spring break -- the visual and performing arts at TWU will offer faculty, staff, students and the general public a number of opportunities to enjoy a respite from their hectic lives. ■ Concert Choir -- The TWU Concert Choir will perform in the 1997 Texas Collegiate Women's Choir Festival, hosted by Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos, on Sat., March 1, at 7:30 p.m. The TWU choir -- with choirs from SWTSU, Texas A&M University, the University of Texas at Austin, UT-San Antonio and Our Lady of the Lake University -- will com-bine to form a 200-voice choir under the direction of guest director and clinician Dianne Brumley.

The festival, in its 16th year, will be held in Evans Auditorium at SWTSU. The event offers an opportunity for the TWU Concert Choir to perform with similar groups. "At regional and national conventions, only two or three women's choruses perform," said Dr. Thomas Brown (performing arts, music), director of the TWU Concert Choir. "Those choruses are a mixture of high school, college and professional vocalists. The choirs like to hear each other perform." TWU's group also will sing during the morning service of the First Christian Church of San Marcos on Sun., March 2.

- Opera Ensemble -- The TWU Opera Ensemble will perform Anima Mundi (Spirit of the World), a fully-staged opera comprising works by southwestern composers, on Sat., March 8, at 8 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Tickets are \$7 for the general public; \$5 for senior citizens, students and children; and \$3 for TWU students. Tickets also will be sold at the door. The production will feature the music of Simon Sargon, Robert Xavier Rodriguez, Mark Houston and selections from the works of Gilbert and Sullivan, Wolfgang Mozart, Vincenzo Bellini and Gioacchino Rossini.
- Faculty Showcase -- A "Faculty Showcase" concert featuring eight TWU faculty members from the department of performing arts music program will be presented at 8 p.m. on Tues., March 11, in Margo Jones Performance Hall. The concert is free and open to the public. Organist Thomas Brown, vocalist Nicki Cohen, violinist Norma Davidson, flutist Pamela Youngblood and pianists Mark Dal Porto, Nancy Hadsell, Herbert Holl and David Yeomans will perform music by Canadian, French, German and American composers.

- Guest artist recital -- A guest artist recital featuring mezzo-soprano Sheila Allen of Fort Worth will be staged at TWU on Mon., March 24, at 8 p.m. in Margo Jones Performance Hall. The performance, titled "Beyond Brahms: Songs for Mezzo-Soprano, Viola and Piano," is free and open to the public. Allen's recital is presented by the TWU department of performing arts. The guest artist, an associate professor of voice at Texas Christian University, will be accompanied by violist David Hermann from the Fort Worth Chamber Orchestra and TWU pianist David Yeomans. The program will include works by German composer Johannes Brahms, Czech composer Petr Eben, Spanish composer Jose Moreno Gans and Swiss-American composer Martin-Beatus Meier.
