FACULTY DEVELOPMENT DAY DETAILS ANNOUNCED

All TWU faculty are invited to mark their calendars and make their plans to attend the 1997 TWU Faculty Development Day on Tues., Aug. 26. The event will include information and training sessions, a luncheon and a guest speaker, according to Dr. James Galloway (library), the event's coordinator. Session description materials and registration forms were sent to all regular TWU faculty in early July. *Please return completed registration forms to the office of the vice president for academic affairs no later than Aug. 18, 1997.* (Please note that one session titled the "Merrill Lynch Investment Team" is part of the day's activities and also is free and open to TWU staff or members of the general public who may be interested in the topic.)

The featured speaker will be Dr. Cathy A. Trower, a senior researcher with the project "New Pathways: Faculty Employment Arrangements for the 21st Century." Her presentation begins at 11 a.m. in MCL auditorium. Trower previously served as senior administrator for the business degree programs at Johns Hopkins University and as chair of the business division and faculty member in business and marketing at Mount Mercy College in Cedar Rapids, Iowa. Her recent publications include "Tenure Snapshot" (1996) and "News from the Tenure Front" (1997); she is co-author of *Where Tenure Does Not Reign: Campuses without Tenure Systems* (1997).

Trower, who earned a doctorate in higher education from the University of Maryland and bachelor's and master's degrees in business administration from the University of Iowa, has consulted with colleges on employment policies and with corporations on high-performance teams, organizational culture and change, and strategic thinking. She has served as a consultant for the Philadelphia College of Textiles and Science; Management Frontiers Ltd.; Kutztown University; the Minnesota board of regents; Washington College; Elon College; and Mercantile Bank.

Session topics will include: the "smart" classroom; Internet resources; separate hands-on training for Windows 95, Excel and PowerPoint; a Colleague update; a Merrill Lynch investments review; distance education instruction; online full-text resources; surfing Web sites; and a SITE lab update. Several sessions also will be offered using videoconferencing format for all TWU sites on: PowerPoint for instruction; the office of research and grants online electronic resources; creating a positive learning environment for students; and an update on library research support services, with a focus on Venus e-mail communications.

The Merrill Lynch team visiting TWU will provide interested persons -- faculty, staff and the general public -- with an overview of current personal financial planning ideas and related topics. The Merrill Lynch speakers will include Carol Turnage, financial consultant; Mickey Trusty, estate trusts; Chris Luce, financial planning specialist; Kyle Lauricella, mortgage credit and homeowners law; and Tina Springer, investment portfolio service specialist. The program will be presented from 9 to 11 a.m., ACT 301.

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COMMENCEMENT APPROACHING

More than 540 degrees will be conferred during summer commencement exercises at TWU on Sat., Aug. 9, in Denton. Two ceremonies are scheduled -- 9 a.m. and 11:30 a.m. -- in Margo Jones Performance Hall. Students and family members with tickets are invited to attend.

A Texas higher education administrator and a Dallas businesswoman will help graduates and their families celebrate commencement. During Ceremony I, Dr. Fernando C. Gomez -- vice chancellor and general counsel for the board of regents, the Texas State University system -- will talk to candidates. During Ceremony II, Valerie Freeman -- owner of Imprimis Group Inc. -- will address students.

The number of diplomas earned during the summer 1997 semester includes approximately 290 undergraduate and 247 graduate degrees, according to Dr. Jim Stiles, registrar. (A total of about 385 students are expected to participate in their graduation ceremonies.) Times for commencement in Denton reflect candidate assignments, based on specific schools and colleges participating in the ceremonies listed below:

- 9 a.m. -- Ceremony I for candidates from the College of Arts and Sciences, College of Nursing, School of Physical Therapy and School of Library and Information Studies; and
- 11:30 a.m. -- Ceremony II for graduates from the College of Education and Human Ecology, the College of Health Sciences and the School of Occupational Therapy.

A reception for graduates, their families and guests who attend either ceremony will be held from 10 to 11 a.m. in the southwest dining room of Hubbard Hall. TWU President Carol Surles will preside at each ceremony, which includes an academic procession, certification of degrees and a commencement address.

Gomez, who earned his law degree from the University of Michigan Law School and his doctorate in American culture from UM as well, is a native of Gallup, N. Mex. As second-incommand to the chancellor of the Texas State University system, he serves as chief legal counsel to the board of regents, its executive officers, and the presidents and administration of a multi-university, nine-campus system. Freeman, who holds a master's degree in business education from the University of Houston, has received a long list of business and civic honors. Imprimis Group Inc. includes eight divisions that provide specialized temporary personnel and other staffing services, as well as bilingual and legal staffing; staffing using older workers; and other areas.

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MENTORS NEEDED FOR COLORS PROGRAM

The office of intercultural services again will sponsor the COLORS Mentors Program for TWU freshmen in 1997-98. COLORS (Creating Opportunities for Leadership and Obtaining Racial Support) addresses issues facing freshmen (protégés), especially minority freshmen, during their first two semesters of college. "Through interaction with faculty and staff, protégés are encouraged to excel academically, socially and culturally as they make a smooth transition to college life," said Patrick Vasquez (intercultural services).

"The goal of the mentor program is to maintain a high level of interest among the participants about college, academics and Texas Woman's University," added Vasquez. "We believe that, if this goal is met, the participants will feel more inclined to remain enrolled at TWU. COLORS is open to all TWU freshmen."

Vasquez needs at least five faculty mentors from all colleges and departments to meet the demands of the program. "Last year, 60 protégés represented all academic disciplines, and we are sure that this fall semester will be the same. You can make a difference by enrolling as a COLORS mentor today," he said. An effort is under way to help Mark Fearing, son of Dr. Joe Fearing (educational leadership), offset medical expenses and treatment following his battle with virulent meningitis; the virus claimed his arms, legs, hearing and memory. Mark, a former professor at the University of Houston, was living in New Zealand when he contracted the virus and became that country's only quadruple amputee. Medical care in New Zealand is socialized, so he incurred no medical expenses there. However, physical treatment was limited, and he was dismissed from the hospital with no further plans for care. Now in Houston, he is making tremendous progress, but the expenses are enormous. Fundraisers organized by friends, colleagues and former professors in Houston have been successful, but more help is needed.
